Those who like to think of Tahoka as one of the best towns in the West will be pleased to note that none of the adjoining county seat towns except Lubbock are able to pay their own preacher, but must depend on Tahoka to help pay the deficit in the salaries of these self-sacrificing missionaries, so that they may be enabled to preach the gospel from a Methodist standpoint without their families suffering want; for Tahoka not only pays all of one Methodist preacher's salary, but pays up its home mission assessments in full, which money is then used to help these needy towns. The Baptists, do at least as well as the Methodists, while the Primitives, Presbyterians and Christians do handsomely by their ministerial and other religious obligations of a financial nature, although they are not very strong numerically or in money matters.

Paying the preacher is not only a moral obligation, but it gives the outside world a good impression of us. When anyone is seeking a new place to move to, one of the first things they want to know about is what sort of churches they will find there. Tahoka has nothing to apologize for in this respect, but will compare favorably with any town anywhere in West Texas or anywhere else.

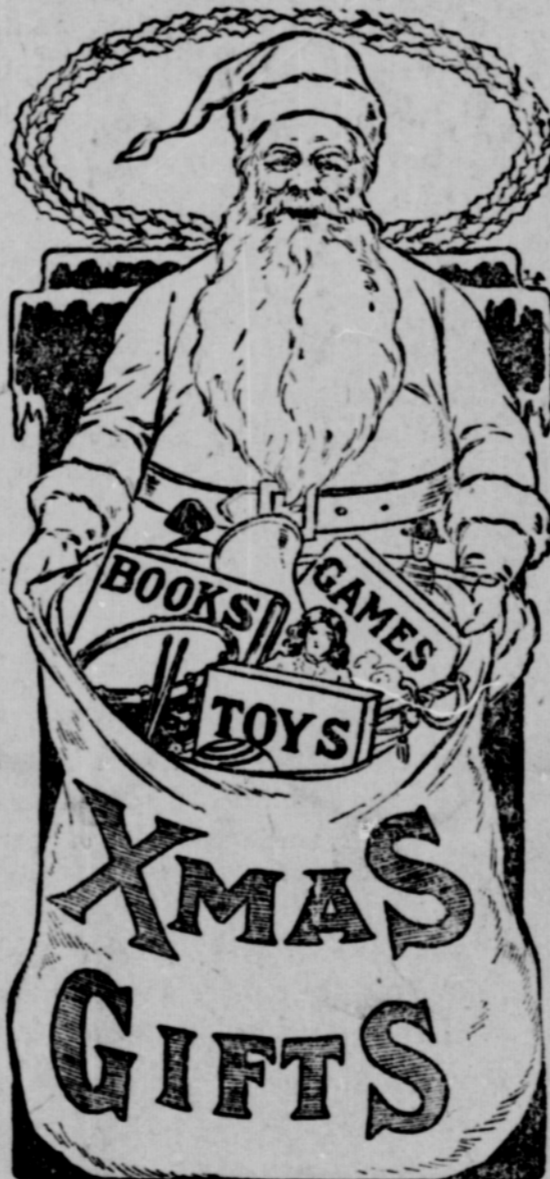
