### Norris Not To Line Up With A Third Party

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—Senator Norris said today he did not "suppose anybody seriously thinks I will lead a third party movement."

The Nebraska Republican independent, however, reserved until later in the day detailed comment on the letter he received from John Dewey, the League of Independent Political Action, suggesting that he leave Republican ranks and form a third political party.

Dr. Dewey's proposal followed Norris' differences with Robert H. Lucas, executive director of the Republican National Committee and the latter's efforts to read him out of the party.

### Texas Deaths Total Fifteen For 24 Hours

#### Nine Additional Fatalities In State By Violence

(By The Associated Press)

Two hundred or more deaths occurred in Texas during the 24 hours ending yesterday as accidents took a heavy toll from coast to coast.

In the middle west, about eighty of the fatalities were recorded. Farmers trapped in a rooming house at Whiting, Ind., and seven men died. Gun fights claimed five lives in the south, one victim was a woman.

Person injured, claimed between five and ten lives in New York. In California three were believed to have drowned when a launch capsized. In Missouri two died when a bridge collapsed. Two children were fatally burned in Montgomery, Pa., when their father poured gasoline on the kitchen fire. A man froze to death in Indiana and another in Pennsylvania.

Hundreds were injured in accidents.

San Antonio, Dec. 26 (AP)—A bandit held up five men in a store here today, losing \$15 in the process. The bandit, who was wearing a mask, entered the store at about 10:30 p.m. and demanded money from the men. The men, who were customers of the store, complied with the bandit's demands. The bandit then fled with the money. The store owner reported the incident to the police. The police are searching for the bandit.

### Garner Seeks Aid For Vets

#### Favors Paying Present Value Of Certificates

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—The Democratic leader of the House, Representative Garner, today was championing legislation for payment to veterans of the present value of their government certificates.

He advocated a plan giving the veteran option to turn in his certificate now and receive the original settlement value plus four per cent interest or to hold it to maturity.

It would cost about a billion dollars, Garner defended, which would be repaid by the government by borrowing at between one and seven per cent.

"I don't believe if the treasury ever again will be able to raise money at such a low rate for the discharge of this obligation."

The Texas advanced his belief that not more than 60 per cent of the veterans would present their certificates at this time. But he argued the release of them represented by time disposition would contribute materially to restore the economic balance.

"A more propitious time for payment of this debt to veterans could not be conceived," he contended. "Every state, city and hamlet would feel the stimulating effects."

Other plans for paying off the veterans' certificates have been opposed by Senators Mellon and Treasury Secretary Mellon, who would be of a temporary nature.

### \$100,000 Fire In Corsicana Razes Stores

#### Half Block of Buildings Destroyed or Badly Damaged

CORSICANA, Texas, Dec. 26 (AP)—Fire last night destroyed or seriously damaged half a block of buildings here. Loss was estimated by Fire Chief Elmer Keith at approximately \$100,000.

Originating in the ceiling of the Jolech shoe company building, according to Keith the flames quickly swept down a row of buildings fronting on Benton Street, the main business thoroughfare of the city.

The McPherson Drug Company, the Golden Brothers Dry Goods Company, the Red Front Dry Goods Store and the Jolech Shoe Company buildings were destroyed. Five other businesses suffered loss, and virtually all the stores in the block were damaged somewhat by water and smoke.

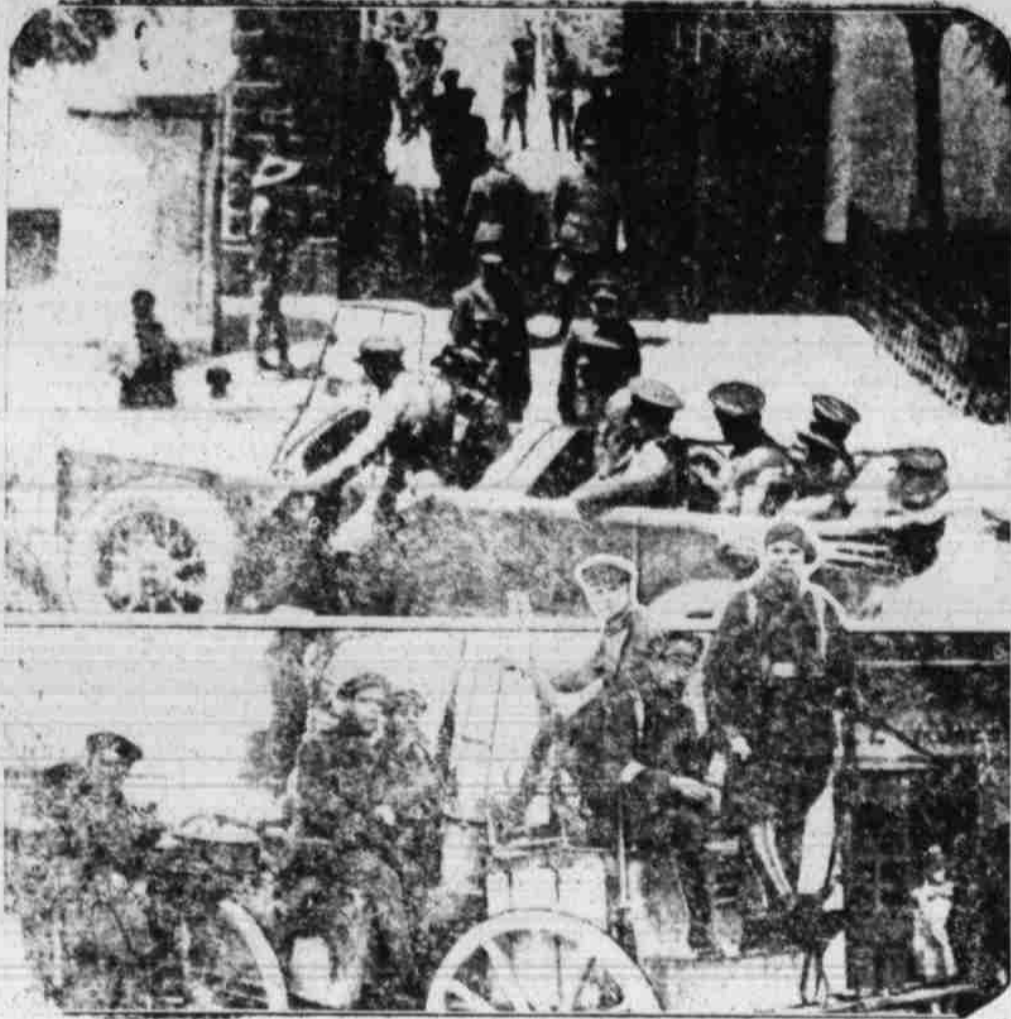

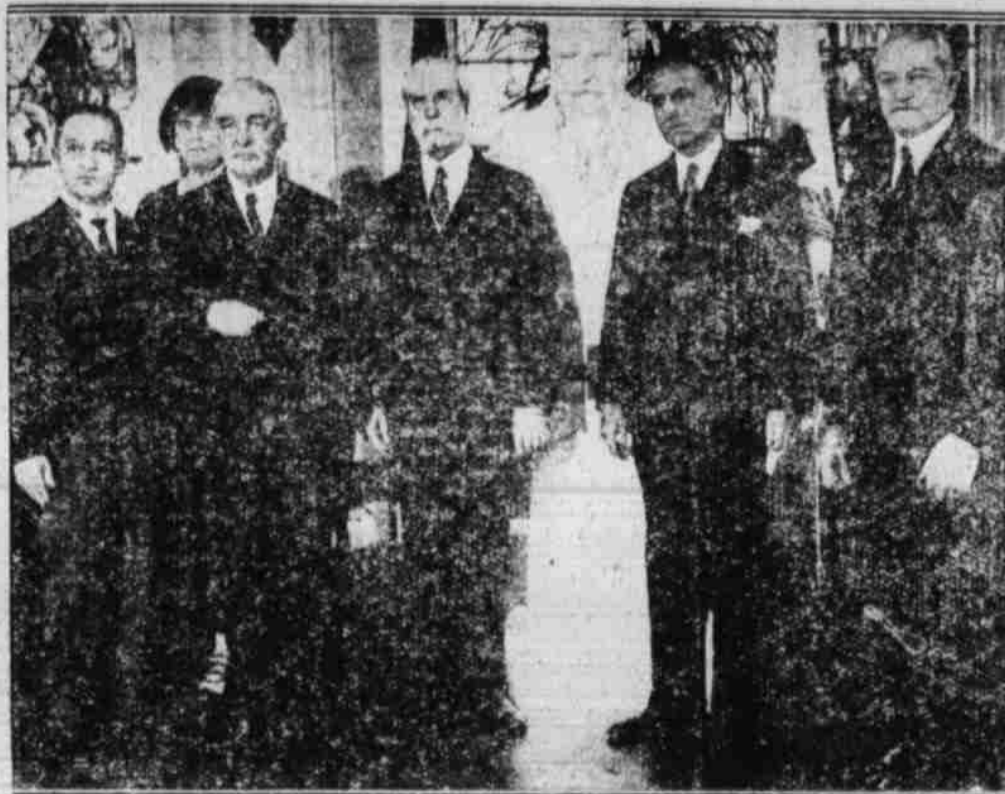

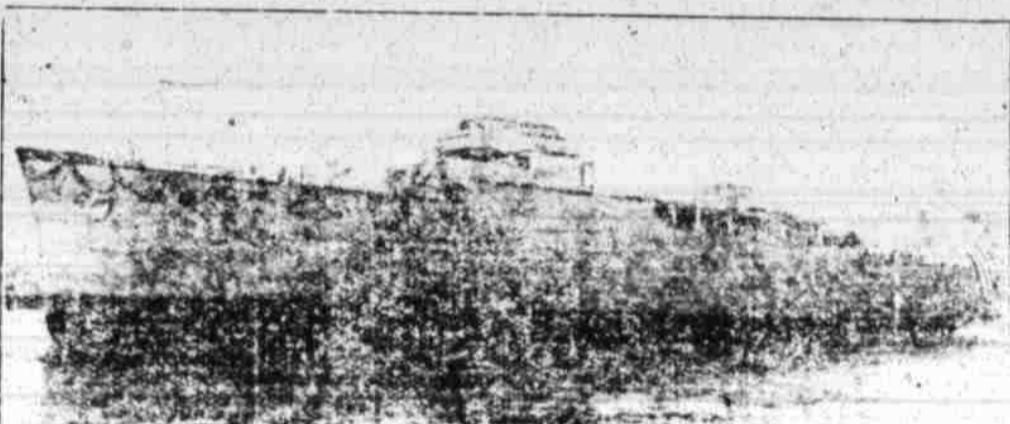

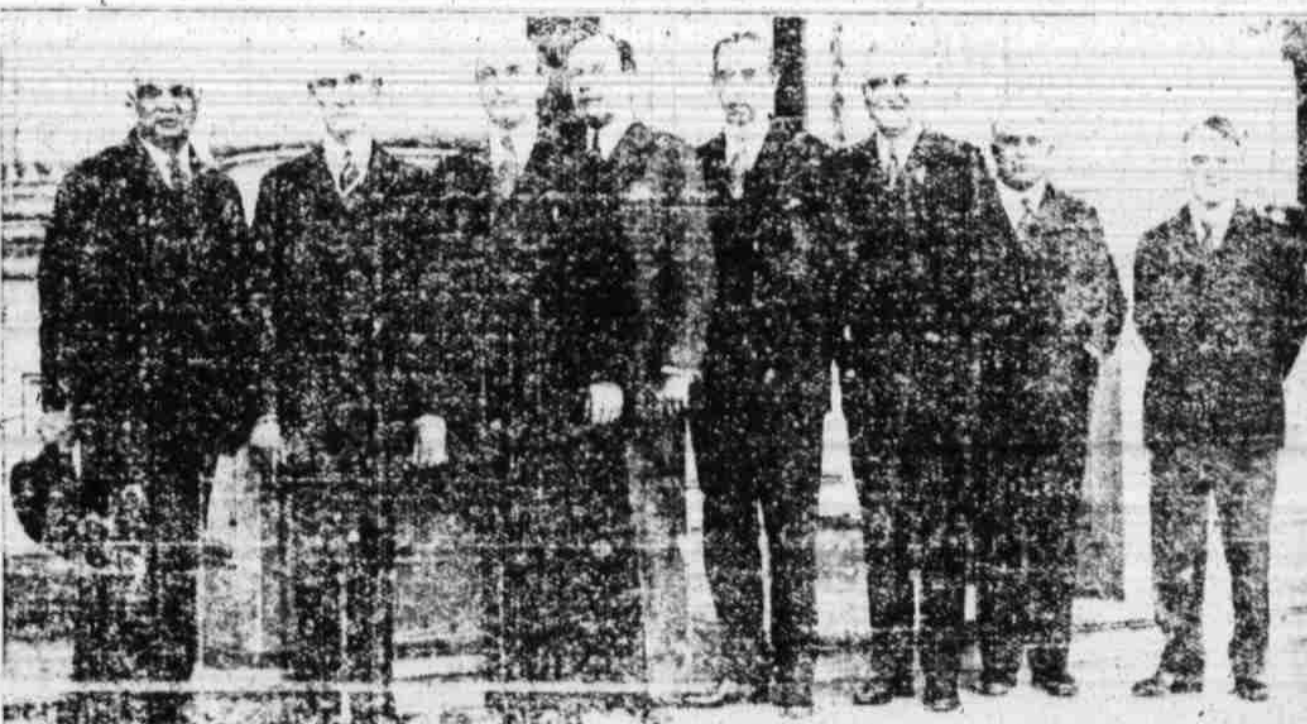
