School Board Met Thursday

The Tahoka ISD Board of Education met for its December regular meeting Thursday, December 11. Payment was approved for monthly bills, and approval was given for the purchase of one 48 passenger bus chassis for delivery in the spring or summer of 1970.

L. L. Jacobs, Real Estate Appraiser and Consultant of Amarillo, met with the Board

and outlined his services in view of the Board's decision to use Lynn County's Tax cards as a basis for equalization and revaluation of real estate properties within the Tahoka ISD. The County's cards are a result of an equalization and revaluation of county real estate properties in 1966.

In other action the Board of Education employed Mr. Jacobs to duplicate the County's tax

cards, in-so far as Tahoka ISD properties are concerned, and provide other consultant services, such as up-dating, etc., to carry out a program of tax equalization and revaluation for a cost of \$1,370.00.

In addition to the foregoing business items, various reports concerning the operation of the schools were presented by the superintendent.

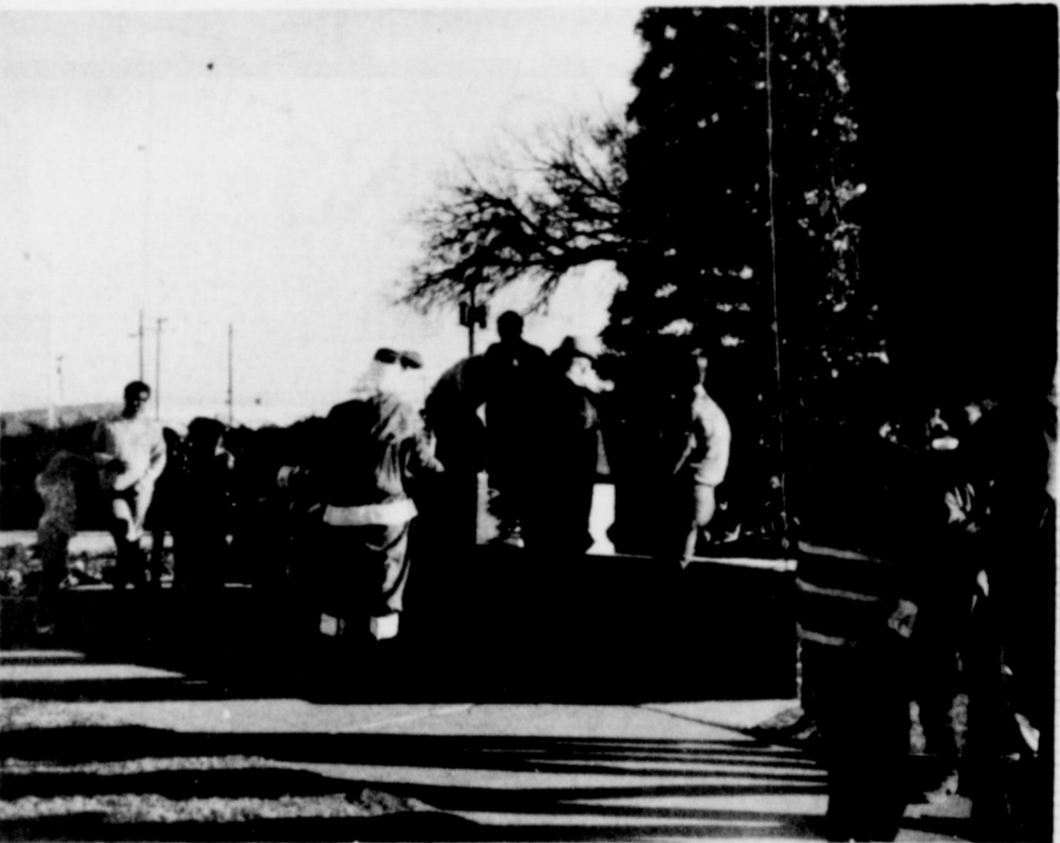

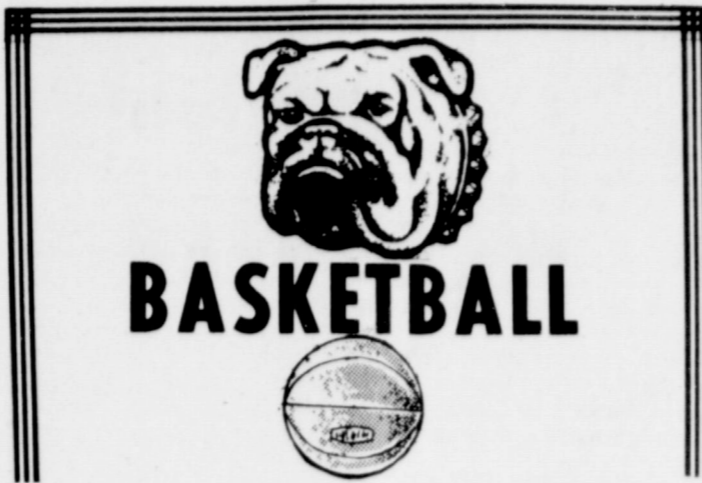
Mrs. E. W. Patterson is organist and Mrs. Harold Green is soloist.

Will a tall, stately fir look good in the living room or should you get a shorter, fuller tree like pine and put it in the family room? Choose the spot carefully, because a Christmas tree shouldn't be near a fireplace, radiator, television set, or other source of heat. Then with the perfect spot picked out and the size of the tree figured, you can decide about the kind of tree you want.

Scotch pine, a fast-growing tree that holds up well through the holiday season, is about the most popular Christmas tree. Most varieties of Scotch pine have bushy branches and long needles (upto three inches) like most other pine trees. Douglas fir, which has short, soft needles that are attached all around the twig, is second on the list of favorites. Balsam fir has short, rather rounded needles and twigs that grow at right angles to the branches so they look like crosses. Eastern redcedar, a relation of the juniper tree, looks graceful and feathery, with its small, scalelike leaves. Red or Norway pine, with slender needles 5 to 6 inches long, is the fifth favorite Christmas tree. The symmetrical spruce trees, with their short, rather stiff needles, are also popular in many areas.

Whichever kind of tree you choose, your next decision is probably when to buy it. Specialist with the U. S. Department of Agriculture say your Christmas tree will probably keep fresher longer if you buy it early and keep it in water, even if you don't want to decorate it right away.

Now for the big decision on the Christmas tree lot! Which tree looks best? U.S.D.A.'s Consumer and Marketing Service has developed U.S. Grades for Christmas trees, as for most other agricultural products, that describes different levels of quality. The grades for Christmas trees--U. S. Premium (top quality), U. S. No. 1 and U. S. No. 2--are based on shape, density, freshness, and cleanness of the trees and on absence of defects. While the grades are used mainly in wholesale trading, you may sometime find trees tagged with the U. S. grade.

But if you don't, here are some things to keep in mind when you select your tree:

1. To be sure it's fresh, rap the base of the tree on the ground. If many needles drop off, the tree is too dry.
2. Look over the tree in an open space with good lighting (daylight, if possible) so you can check its shape.
3. Don't forget to look for crooks in the trunk or large bare spaces between branches.
4. If you use a star or angel on top of the tree, you'll want to be sure to have a strong single leader at the top.
5. When you get the tree home, saw about one-half inch off the bottom so it will absorb water. If you buy the tree early, keep it in a bucket of water in a cool, shady place, preferably outside, and saw another half-inch off the butt when you put the tree in a stand. Use a stand that holds water and keep water in the stand all the time the tree is up.

Dutch Apple Pie
Plain crust for 1 pie:
6 medium apples
3 Tbls. Flour
1 cup sugar
¼ tsp. cloves
1 cup sour cream
½ tsp. cinnamon
1½ Tbls. sugar

Prepare Crust. Pare, core and slice apples, medium thin. Fill pastry shell. Mix flour, sugar and cloves. Add sour cream and mix thoroughly. Pour over apples. Sprinkle cinnamon and 1½ Tbls. sugar over top. Bake 450 degrees for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to 350 degrees and finish baking 40 minutes. Serve warm or chilled.

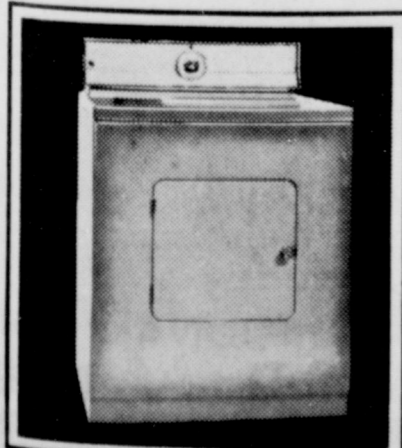

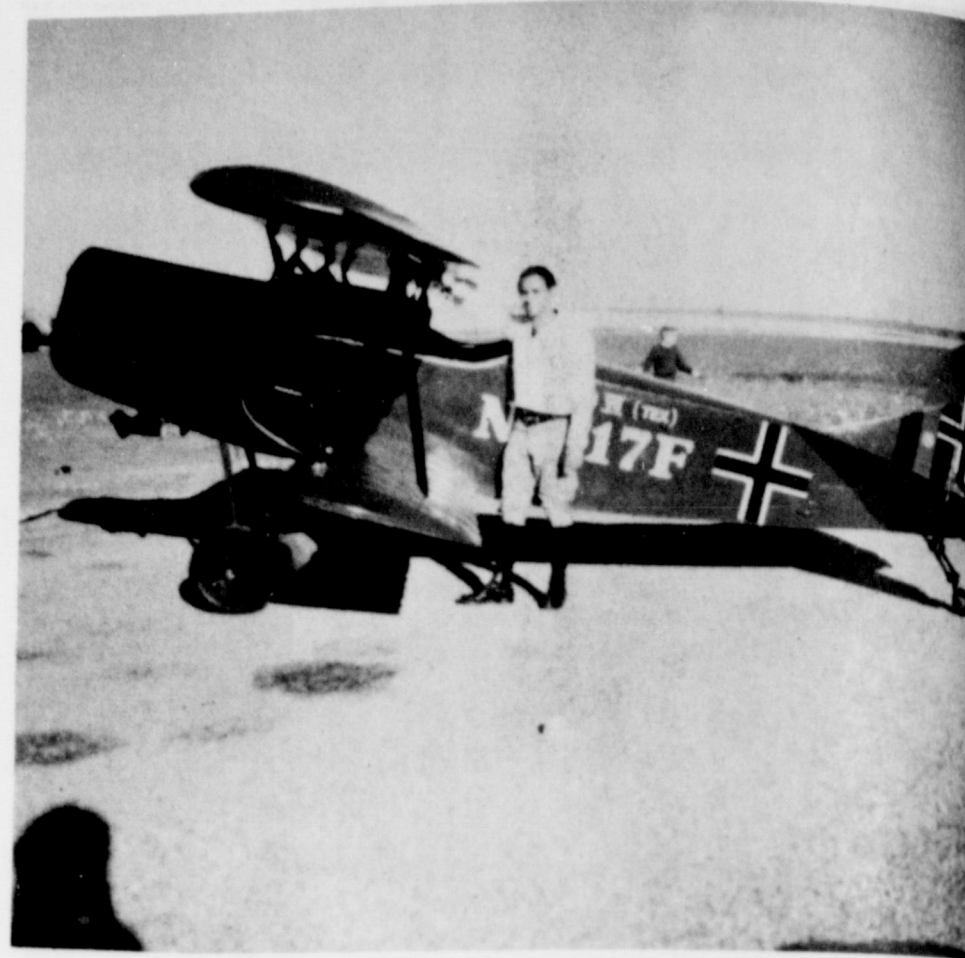

day for farmers and ranchers to file Form 943 showing the social security taxes on wages paid to hired labor during 1969. Any taxes due must be paid at this time. Copies B and C of Form W-2 should be given to each employee listed on Form 943 and Copy A should be sent with Form 943 to the Office of Internal Revenue.

It's that time of the year again to remind South Plains farmers and ranchers of several important tax dates.

According to Marvin Sartin of Lubbock, area farm management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, January 15, 1970 is the last day for filing a declaration of estimated income tax for farmers and ranchers who operate on a calendar tax year. If an estimated return is filed by then, farmers and ranchers have until April 15 to file their complete tax return.

Another date that is fast approaching with regard to tax returns is February 2, points out Sartin. This is the last day for farmers and ranchers to file Form 943 showing the social security taxes on wages paid to hired labor during 1969. Any taxes due must be paid at this time. Copies B and C of Form W-2 should be given to each employee listed on Form 943 and Copy A should be sent with Form 943 to the Office of Internal Revenue.

Another important date to remember is February 15, reminds the specialist. If farmers and ranchers did not file an estimated tax return by January 15, their 1969 income tax is due on February 15.

All farm and ranch businesses must report rent and interest payments amounting to \$600 or more to any one taxpayer other than a corporation by March 2. This report is filed on Form 1096 and Form 1099 and is for information purposes. Some farm businesses may also

be required to pay corporate income taxes. This return is filed on Form 1120 and an application for extension of payment of these taxes is filed on Form 7004. Payment of corporate tax of at least 50 percent of the tax due is required March 15.

With this season's harvest drawing to a close, tax returns are the next order of business for many farmers. They should be prepared accurate. If a good set of records is maintained during the year, returns can be a simple task adds Sartin.

Railroad Pays Lynn Co. Tax

Current annual taxes paid to the various government agencies by Texas railroads in Lynn County totaled \$10,877, it is announced by the Texas Railroad Association.

That amount was the county's share of the nearly \$11,000,000 the railroads paid in Texas on their own right of way and other property.

The biggest railroad contribution was to the school systems throughout the state. Large sums were also distributed to city, village and county governments and for road and bridge funds.

In addition, of course, was the large total in taxes the more than 30,000 railroad employees in Texas contributed on their own property. The vast majority of rail workers, many of whom live in Lynn County, own their own homes.

"We are very pleased that nearly half of the taxes paid by the railroads in Texas go to support the schools," said Walter Caven, general counsel of the Texas Railroad Association. "The future of our country depends to a great extent upon the education of our youth," he said.

"Recognizing this need for education, many of the railroads operating in Texas also continue to make scholarships available to a large number of students every year."
