



Young Farmers Week Observed At O'Donnell

September 20-27 was officially designated as Young Farmers Week in Texas by proclamation of Governor Preston Smith.

The proclamation signed recently gives additional recogni. tion to this rapidly growing farm group. The Young Farm. ers association is sponsored under the auspices of Vocational Agriculture department in high school across Texas and the Texas Education Agency.

More than 260 Young Farmer Chapters have been organized on local school district or county basis to carry out eduhelp the members keep abreast of the technological advance. ments in the field of agriculture and to develop greater skill and efficiency in management production and marketing.

The Young Farmer program had its origin in clubs formed by FFA alumni. These clubs met in 1954 and formed the State Association of Young Farmers of Texas. Membership was opened to anyone, ages 18. 35, in farming, ranching or other phases of agriculture. Today there are more than 4,600 paid members in the 260 Chapters making up the state assocation.

tional agriculture supervisor, from Big Spring, is coordinator of the area 11 Young Farmer program.
