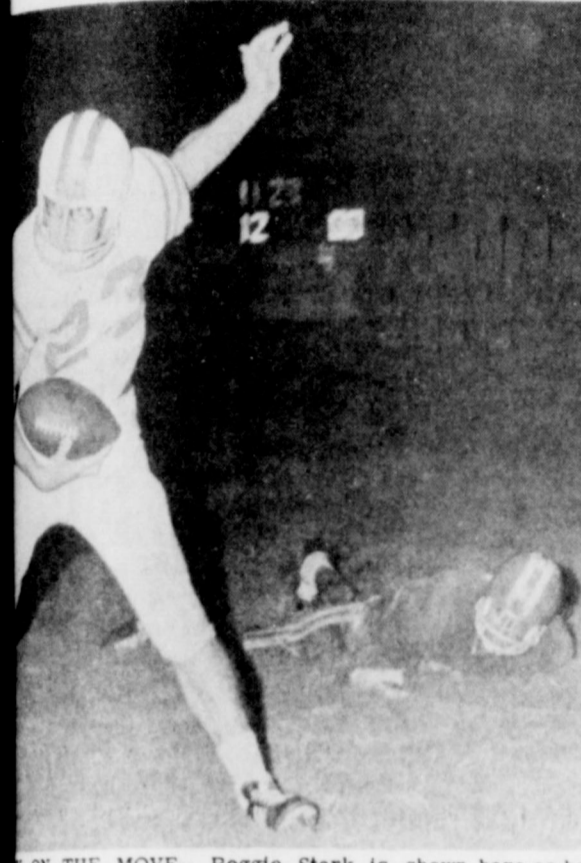

District Governor Of Rotary Speaks To Local Club

Rotarians welcomed on Sept. 24 the governor of this Rotary district, Judge Charles L. Reynolds of Childress, Texas. He addressed the Rotary Club of Tahoka, one of 48 in his district, and conferred with Mr. George D. McCracken, pres. of the local Rotary club, and with other club officials to obtain information on the group's plan for its service activities and to offer suggestions on Rotary administrative matters. Judge Reynolds is one of 298 Rotary governors throughout the world who are serving as representatives of Rotary International in districts composed of member clubs. Each district leader is responsible for supervising the clubs in his area. Rotary, an international men's service organization, has more than 657,000 members in some 13,901 clubs in 146 countries. A member and past president of the Rotary Club of Childress, Judge Reynolds is presiding Judge of the 100th Judicial District of Texas. He was elected to the office of district governor at the Rotary convention in Honolulu, Hawaii, in May, 1969, and will serve until June 30, 1970. Though a seasoned Rotarian before his election to the office of district governor, Judge Reynolds attended an eight-day international assembly last May at Lake Placid, New York, at which all Rotary governors for 1969-70 attended in-depth seminars to plan for their jobs. One of his biggest jobs will be to hold a district conference of all Rotary clubs in this area. The conference will be held April 23-25, 1970, in Plainview, Texas.

Wey D. Shaw Concocted

WYANDOTTA (FHTNC) Radioman Third Class Wey D. Shaw, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. James E. Shaw, is serving aboard the aircraft carrier USS Weyandotta (FFC-117) which recently returned from San Diego, Calif., after a six-month tour in the western Pacific. Shaw spent most of his tour on the Yankee Station in the coast of Vietnam. He is there as a unit of the Seventh Fleet's carrier battle group. Shaw is serving four lines periods of duty on the Yankee Station, the Ticonderoga, and the allied forces in Vietnam. At the end of the tour, the ship will become the first to complete five deployments to Vietnam.

County Hospital Plans Approved

Architect Bob Goyette of the firm of Brasher, Goyette and Rapier, reported today that final plans and specifications for the new hospital proposed by the Lynn County Hospital District have been approved by the Texas State Department of Health and the Hill-Burton Agency. Plans will be available for bidding by October 1 and bids will be opened November 4 in Tahoka. Construction will be authorized to proceed immediately after approval of the bids by the Department of Health. 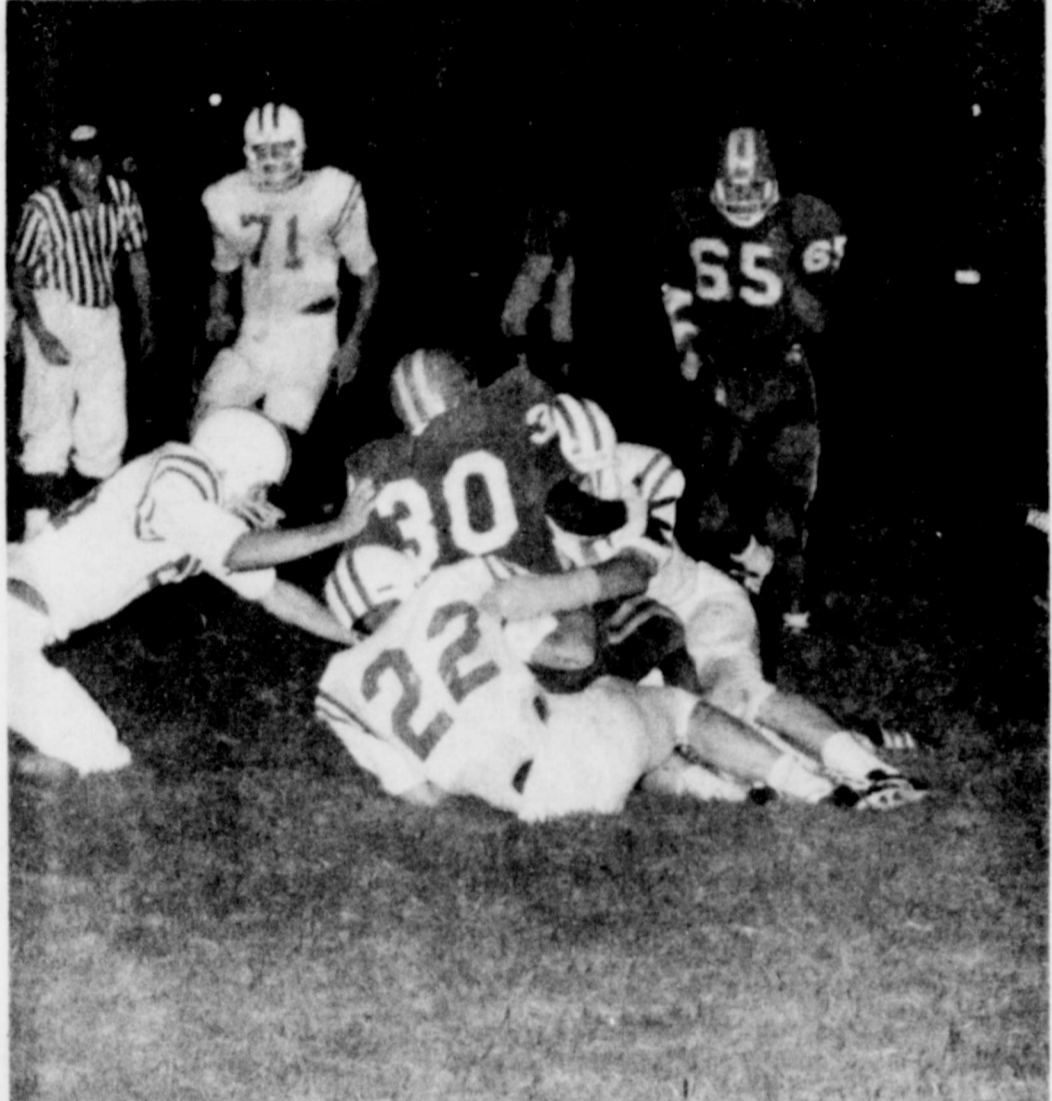
New Home Past Nazareth

Taxes Payable On Oct. 1st.

State and County taxes become payable October 1 with about 4000 notices being mailed at this time. Also, according to Tax Assessor Collector, Geo. McCracken, you must submit a written application this year to be able to register to vote. Lynn County taxes will be able to register from the 1st of October to Jan. 31st. You must register to be able to vote. Farm trailer tags are for sale in surrounding communities as well as in Tahoka for the convenience of Lynn County residents. They are available in O'Donnell at Moore's, in Wilson at the Wilson Coop Gin, in New Home at the New Home Gin and in Tahoka at Tahoka Auto Parts and at the Tax Office. The County tax rate is down this year from 1.15 to .05 and the State is down from 47 to 42 cents. The Hospital is 35 cents to \$100 and the water District is 5 cents to \$100. Tax valuation this year is \$16,955,393; County, 178,041.83; Water, 2,686.33; Hospital, 58,993.73 and this makes a total of 298,551.45.

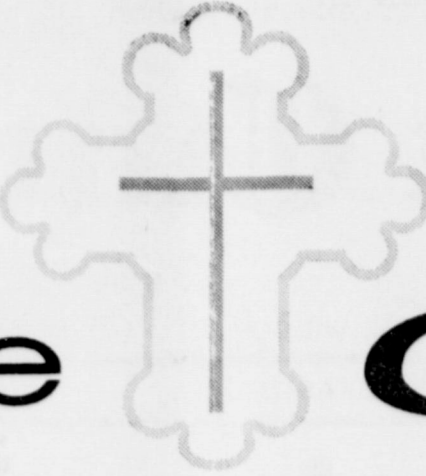

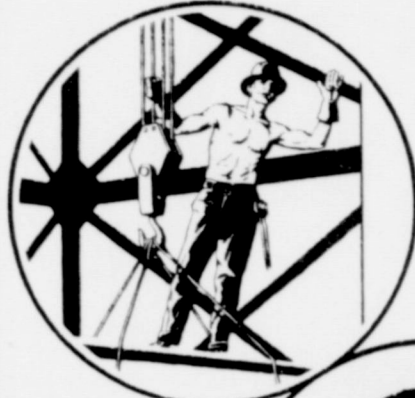
This is an urge that should never be "squelched." Out of such beginnings come great inventions, machine marvels, electronic wonders and all the rest.

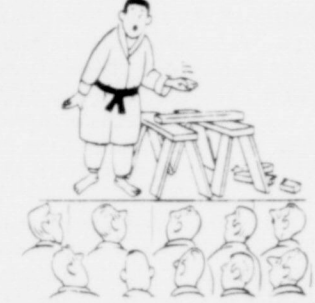
The Cisco Junior College Wrangler Belles and Band was given a trophy and \$25.00 as a reward for their fine performance in the parade.
