The case was brought here on change of venue, going to the jury at 12:10 Wednesday afternoon. The verdict was returned at 8:15 this morning.

Kidnapers Of Banker Elude Police Force

Surprised at Place Set For The Final Payment

KEWANEE, Ill., Oct. 30 (AP).—Officers were believed closing in early today on three members of the kidnaping gang which abducted and held for ransom, Earl L. Yocum, wealthy Galva, Ill., banker.

The trio eluded capture last night when they fled from what officers believed was the final pay-off of a mile west of here. Three highway policemen surprised the men but they fled at the officer's approach.

One shot was fired by the highway police to halt the extortionists, but believed the same in which Yocum was carried off Saturday night to hold for four days. The kidnapers fired once in return and finally crashed their machine through a farm fence four miles from the start of the chase. They fled north, and although additional forces were hastily summoned from Kewanee, they failed to locate the trio.

Winn had had a visitor, and while Sheriff Jess Lambert was showing the visitor downstairs, leaving a door unlocked, Winn walked out of the jail, stroled over to a nearby drug store, telephoned friends to come after him in a car, and disappeared.

Challenge For Debate Issued Ross Sterling

DALLAS, Tex., Oct. 30 (AP).—Capt. J. F. Lucey, chairman of the republican state campaign committee, today issued a challenge to Ross Sterling, democratic nominee for governor, and United States Senator Tom Connally and Morris Sheppard to debate with a republican leader the achievements of the Hoover administration.

The proposal stipulated that the debate be held in either Fort Worth, Dallas or Houston at any time prior to November 2.

Gov. Dan Moody, here attending a cotton conference, said Capt. Lucey's challenge "merely is an effort to get out crowds to hear Col. W. E. Talbot, republican nominee for governor."

How To Use Air Mail Service

Time of departure of air mail planes—westbound, 11 a. m.; eastbound, 5 p. m.; southbound, 5 p. m.

Final mailing time daily—westbound, 10:20 a. m.; eastbound, 4:20 p. m.; southbound, 4:20 p. m.

Cost—Five cents for first ounce; ten cents for each additional ounce.

Types of stamps and envelopes—Airmail stamps and envelopes may be used, but are not compulsory. Ordinary envelopes with "Airmail" written across the face, and regular stamps may be used if desired.

Mailing places—Postoffice, Douglass, Settles and Crawford Hotels. Airmail placed in street letter boxes is delayed as provision for carrier to collect before plane time has not been made. Letters mailed at the airport are credited to the next stop made by the plane, and the Big Spring postoffice receives no credit for the poundage.

Time-saving examples—Letter leaving here at 5 p. m. arrives in Kansas City 1:10 a. m., Chicago 5:40 a. m. and New York, 5:40 p. m. the day following departure from here.

Letter for Mexico City leaves here at 5 p. m., arrives there 2 15 p. m. the next day.

Letter leaving here at 11 a. m. arrives in Los Angeles at 9:15 p. m. the same night, and Seattle, Washington, at 11 a. m. the following day.

Special delivery letter leaving here at 5 p. m. for Fort Worth or Dallas is delivered early the same evening.

Nation's Political Campaign Nearing Close In Confusion

Single Issue of Herbert Hoover And His Twenty Months Service Attracts Interest

With quickening steps, as its great figures are paraded in a final rally, the political campaign is trooping hither and yon. Its last days, like its first, are filled with confusion and uncertainty.

Nationally, the wandering attentions of the voter are invited with growing insistence to a single issue—Herbert Hoover and his twenty months in the White House. But locally, in many a precinct, the voice of national politics is drowned by a dispute over prohibition, or party regularity, or the personality of a minor candidate.

Even 1928 was scarcely richer in its jumble of issues than is 1930, five days before election. Today the country had the additional word of two such eminent public men as Andrew W. Mellon and Alfred E. Smith that the records of the Republican administration at Washington stands out as a commanding promontory on the present political map of the nation.

York and Pennsylvania, now at fever heat. They are still further tangled with local issues in senatorial and congressional campaigns, in a manner which makes even the wisest political diagnosticians hesitate when they speak of what may happen at the polls on November 4.

No responsible party leader denies, however, that on the basis of all these issues jumbled together, the Democrats have made a really serious bid for control of the next house of representatives. Even when they speak privately, the Democratic politicians insist they expect a majority. The Republicans, basing their opinions on a different set of reports from the field, insist privately that while their margin of control will be reduced materially, the majority will remain Republican.

If the most earnest professions on both sides are to be taken at face value, this is one campaign where only a count of the ballots can deliver a reliable verdict.

The senate is quite another proposition. Only one-third of its membership comes up for election in 1930, so many of the states electing provides no possibility of a turnover. In the limited field remaining, Republicans and Democrats agree that the Republican majority will be reduced, but that only an epochal Democratic landslide could insure Democratic control.

The "X" Party
Into all of these mathematical calculations enters eventually the unknown quantity known as "X." It stands for the western independents, that group within the party which has stood so often against the major policies of President Hoover. What comfort can Mr. Hoover expect, the Republicans ask themselves, from Republican majorities in senate and house so slender as to give the independents the balance of power?

Government Attorney Succumbs To Illness

MUSKOGEE, Okla., Oct. 29.—Frank Lee, United States attorney for the eastern Oklahoma district, died today at his home here after an illness of several months. He had been an employee of the department of justice for nearly forty years, having entered the service at Sherman, Texas, in the 1880's.

Loyola Tackle Plays With Fractured Back

BALTIMORE, Oct. 30.—Edward J. Duffy, Loyola college tackle, played the entire game here last Saturday with Western Maryland college with a broken back. It was revealed today with the results of an X-ray examination known.

Duffy, an 185 pounder, was injured in the opening kickoff but concealed his hurts. The X-ray revealed a fracture of the third lumbar vertebra and Duffy will be placed in a cast. Three weeks will be required for recovery, his physician estimated.

To some degree every president becomes the focus of controversy in the off-year campaign midway between presidential elections. In the present instance, however, special considerations have thrust the Hoover policies into the spotlight. The business situation, and what the president did and did not do about it, have formed the arrowhead of the Democratic attack. Prohibition has contributed its share to the dispute, and the Republican tariff bill became a law just in time to carry its special load of controversy to the political stump.

State Races
Nearly all of these considerations have become more or less intertwined with various state campaigns, including the spectacular gubernatorial contests in New

Amendments Would Improve Legislation Declare Proponents

AUSTIN, Oct. 30. (AP)—Exchange of their legislative hack for a high powered limousine will be asked of Texas voters at the November election in two amendments to the state constitution.

Critics of the proposed change have found only one alleged flaw—that the limousine might have a higher overhead. Sponsors of the change deny that this will result, declaring that more efficient operation of the legislature, coupled with a change in the mileage rate allowed members of the lawmaking body, will actually make the high powered machine cheaper to operate.

The two amendments are:
First, to provide for a legislative session of 120 days every two years, instead of 90 days, to be divided as follows: The first 30 days for introduction of bills; the next 30 days for committee meetings, in which all bills will be considered; the last 60 days for the actual legislative process.

Second, to increase the pay of members of the legislature from \$5 a day to \$10 a day; second to cut the mileage allowance from 20 cents per mile to 10 cents per mile. On its face, there would seem to be slightly higher cost under the proposed amendment. It was explained by State Senator Edgar D. Witt, however that it is the hope to obviate many special sessions of the legislature by the change; and that heretofore legislators have been paid their mileage on every session.

In a statement prepared for the Associated Press, Senator Witt estimated that the change would mean a saving of practically five-sixths the amount now paid in mileage. Four sessions of the legislature cost in mileage approximately \$65,000. The amendment would reduce this, he said, to between \$8,000 and \$10,000 or a saving of between \$50,000 and \$60,000 every two years.

"In addition to this saving," Witt said, "of a continuous session, rather than one regular and several called sessions, would mean a saving of thousands of dollars in reprinting of hundreds of bills, and saving of about 20 days, required at the beginning of each of the special sessions, for organization. As the average cost of the legislature is approximately \$3,600 a day, this would mean a saving of from \$30,000 to \$40,000.

"I believe that the savings would equal, if not offset, the additional cost of compensation, and in making these changes, the voter would not only work for the making of better laws, but would work to save the state money."

In one continuous session, rather than the past practice of several called sessions, Senator Witt sees an opportunity to curb the passage of "vicious" legislation.

"When it is realized," he said, "that under the present system legislation cannot be picked up at a special session just where it ended at a regular session, but must be re-introduced, re-referred to committee, re-printed, etc., it may be seen that the 'lost motion' would actually make for less time spent in lawmaking by the legislature."

"Over the past 14 years, the legislature has been in session an average of 137 days out of each year. We believe we can actually do more work in 120 days, than was done

in 137 days under the old system. "In my judgment, there will not be as many instances of the rushing through of vicious legislation as has been in the past, nor will there be as many errors. Probably less legislation will be enacted, and that which is enacted, probably will have had more careful consideration. "The public will be better informed as to what is going on and will get much better opportunity to be heard before the committee than under the present system."

Right-of-Way For Dan's Mountains Highway Obtained

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 30. (AP)—Right-of-way for the proposed Dan's Mountains state scenic highway have been obtained with but three exceptions and negotiations will be completed soon for these tracts, according to a report made to the state highway commission by D. E. Colp of San Antonio, chairman of the state park commission.

Colp recently conferred with the commission relative to the project but was told that no action would be taken until all the right-of-way had been obtained and deeded to the state. Work on the proposed highway was expected to be started early next year.

The plan was sponsored by Senator Thomas B. Love of Dallas who said proper development would give Texas one of the greatest natural scenic parks in the United States. Colp told the commission the plan had met with the hearty approval of landowners in the section through which the highway will be routed and that no hitch had been encountered in the right-of-way negotiations. Adequate land has been deeded to the state, he said, for tourist camps and accommodations.

Construction of the highway will be carried out with convict labor from the Texas prison system. It will afford, according to Senator Love, a good opportunity for the state to test the value of labor of this kind on highway work and at the same time provide a recreation spot for Texas residents.

State highway engineers will supervise the convicts with the equipment being furnished by the highway department. Food and housing will be provided by the Texas prison system. A law was passed at the last session of the legislature directing the highway department, the prison system and the park commission to cooperate in the project.

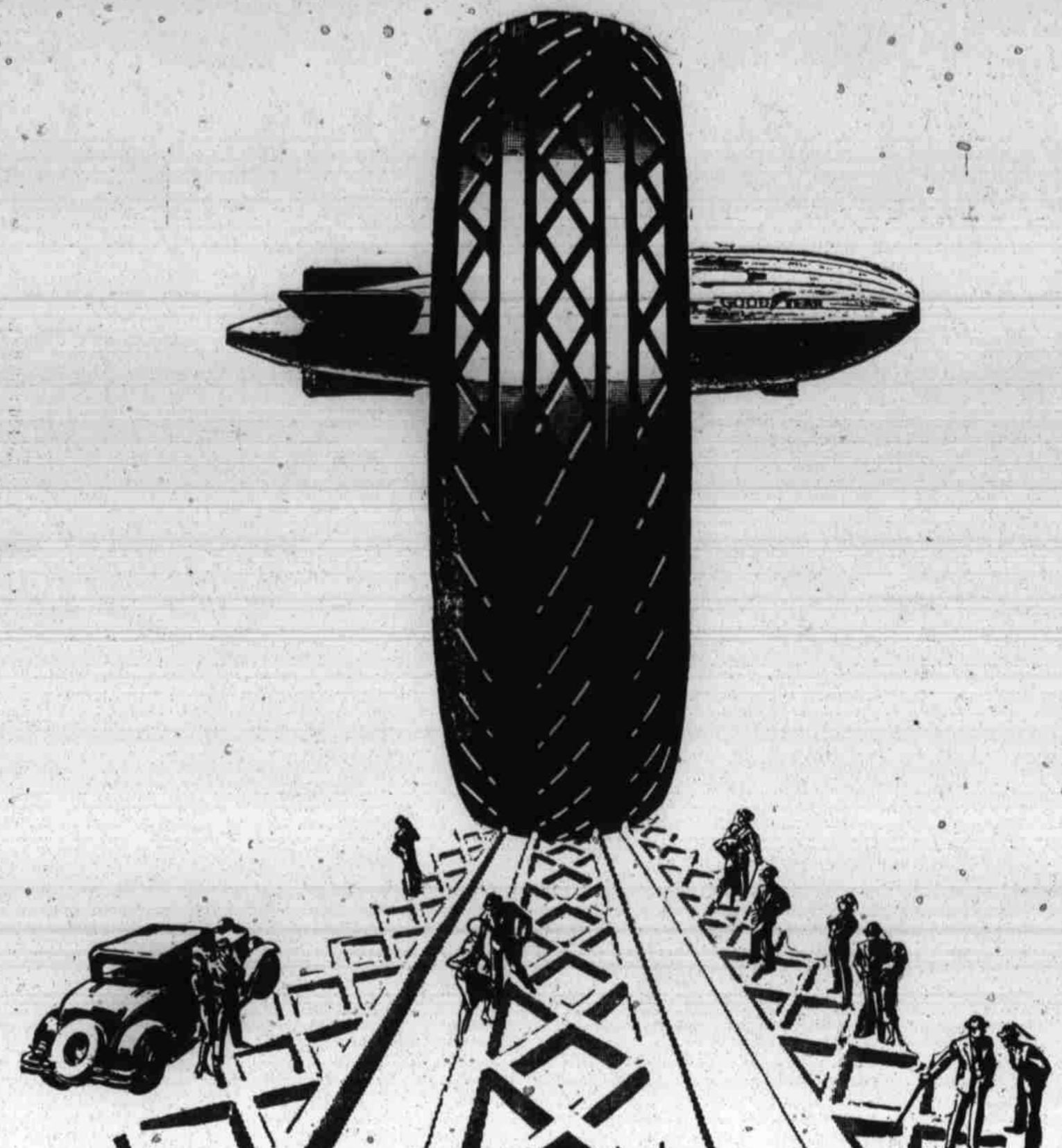

Dear Club Women: Watch for a letter twice a month in the Weekly Herald and the Thursday daily. There will be one in each week, part of the time to the women and the other times to the girls. Sometimes, when I feel that both of you need information the same week, I shall write both. So watch the papers every week.

First, I want to call your attention to the 4-H Pantry Achievement days in November. The Vincent women will meet with the Luther women at Mrs. S. L. Lockhart's to see a demonstration of her pantry work she has been doing for the last year. She made a budget for the first of the year for the canning she hoped to do to equip her pantry and she has more than filled it.

For her demonstration she has canned the following: leafy vegetables, 207 quarts; starchy vegetables, 46 quarts; other vegetables, 60 quarts; tomatoes, 40 quarts; meats, 190 quarts; soup stock, 20 quarts; canned fruit, 50 quarts; pickles and preserves, 50 quarts; pickles and relishes, 20 quarts.

In addition, she cured 200 pounds of peck and dried a gallon of each bean and peas and made her laundry soap. She canned food and cured meat have a value of \$36.10.

For her family of four, two adults and two children, she is canning vegetables from her garden, and intends supplementing with fresh lettuce, celery, tomatoes and other vegetables she will purchase at the stores through the winter.

She has potato masher, fresh fruit and nuts, baked in pounds of free cans. At the present she has 600 on hand. This will enable her to prepare a quick dinner by opening a can of fruit she saved from one of her gallon cans and serving it with a slice of potato cake.

She stores the main part of her foods in the cellar, which has rows of shelves wide enough to accommodate two rows of cans by not stacked. All foods of a certain class are grouped together in this way she can take a can from each group and have a balanced meal without giving it much thought at the time she runs hurriedly to the cellar. She has space in a pantry, which opens into the kitchen, for a small assortment of food from her cellar, in addition to crackers, macaroni, spices, mayonnaise, powdered sugar, etc.

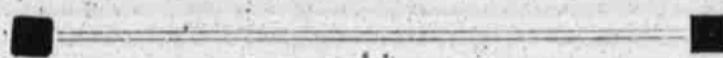

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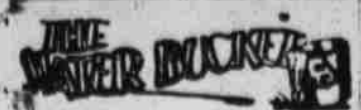

YALE AND ARMY SATISFIED NOW

Of course we do not care about disconcerting Mr. Francis. The Lions may score on the Steers, and again they may not. When the Steers get a team on their local courted gridiron, they don't care about being scored on. Breckenridge might have run up a nice tally against the Steers, had the game been played in Buckarville, but as it were it had to go down in front as the best game, by the way, of the Little Six teams have furnished Prince Shotwell's stellar.

The fact that Browne Hanshaw and Nogie Mims will be out of the Steer lineup Friday afternoon may aid the Lions to some extent. Hanshaw is a great plug for the forward, and Mims has been bleeding down the safe position. However, a future both might be found to slip into Brown's shoes, and perhaps one of the boys can rip along in Mims' place for this one battle. Each of them should be eligible for the Sweetwater and Ranger trials.

In order to stimulate a greater amount of interest, and to give the Little Six more fight into the ranks of the San Angelo Roberts, the Civic-San Angelo fray has been designated as Dad's Day. All the dads are to be on hand to cheer their sons on. It seems such a procedure was adopted one time and the Roberts wrought havoc with the Lobo outfit. Given, however, also designated the day. It will be observed as District Committee Day, which makes it hard on the families of the Concho region.

The defeat of the University of Texas Longhorns by the Rice Owl last week may serve to work a hardship on the Mustangs of Southern Methodist. The Steers will have an uphill fight in what they consider a great battling machine when the Steers are seen. Seven point money doesn't look a bit bad in this week's arrangement between the two universities. The package presented the Longhorns by the Owl merely proved the old adage, "Overconfidence is a sure sign of having to play with one's head on something along that line.

The Steers will have their greatest opportunity to go places and persevere when they clash with the Ranger Bulldogs. Unless things go wrong, and the opposing teams are elevated and primed to a great fighting edge by some unexpected blow, the Steers should move over Brownwood, Sweetwater and Colorado. Ranger is the doubtful battle. Very doubtful. In the first place Ranger has a better team than Big Spring has. Ranger's reserve strength is three times as good as the Big Spring secondary. In the third place, Ranger's importing system is highly systemized. "Big Spring" is just in its infancy. Ranger reached the highest possible point along this line when Chucklock Bird was drafted from the minors by one of the majors. On paper, Ranger has a three or four, perhaps a five or six touchdown better team than the Steers. Yet, by all this aside and considering the Bulldogs as just another team trying to grab a title, the Steers may wage a wonderful battle against the maroon and white contingent. It will be the final opportunity for the Steers to win for them a reputation. They met Abilene—how they met the Mayhemmen—and Cisco and Breckenridge. They earned a little glory in the latter fray, but lost miserably against the other two. Ranger ranks high up there among those tough battles. The Steers will have a wonderful opportunity to take a couple of extra tricks and maybe make a grand slam against the city of flowing gold.

The strength of the Bulldogs within the 10-yard line territory cannot be overestimated. Chucklock Bird may not be so hot this year on the offense, although we have little reason to believe he is not, but on the defense he is the same old demon he was when he lived at Mineral Wells, his old home town from which he drifted west. It was Bird who aided materially in holding the Ephraim of Athens from crossing the Bulldog goal line last week. Abilene made 16 first downs, compared with seven for the Canines. The Mayhemmen got the ball on the one-yard line, and again on the two-yard line, but the Eck Curtis defensive strength in that territory came forward, and with Bird in the mesh held the threats back.

It will be rather embarrassing, by the way, this week when Mineral Wells plays Ranger. Bird may not be used for fear he will suddenly forget which team he belongs on and race for a Mountaineer touchdown. Mineral Wells has always felt Ranger gave her a dirty, ragged deal, on Bird. Of course one could expect the Resort City to feel no other way. With Bird on tap this year the Mountaineers, with Thornton and Murray, might have created more havoc than they have.

But of course, Ranger has a better fire station than Mineral Wells has, and that might have made a difference.

It is possible that Schwartzback, Rieberg, Stanfil and others will start the battle in Mims' shoes. Against the Lions, Hanshaw's absence will be missed, of course, but it could have been a bit worse. He might have been carried out on the globe-rotor before the Sweetwater, Colorado or Ranger trials.

Although the Steers fully realize they need the aggressive wacked state of the forward this year, they are fully primed for a battle. The Lions not only are mad, but desperate. They have sunk before every Class A team they encountered and have not driven across a touch-down of a score of any other description.

Against Eastland last week, the Lions lost by a 20 to 0 decision, but they say the story is not as told in that account. The Lions had a half-stay while Eastland had a half-stay, and had a combination from Brownwood's standpoint. The Steers defeated Eastland 6-0 in what the spectators that had picked the Mavericks described as an upset. Out of the ranks stood a couple of gentlemen, Rex Clark of Eastland and C. T. Thomas of Brownwood. Clark, a sensational back of this district, did not play against the Steers. Thomas is a guard and is noted for his smothering. He is the bulwark of the Lion forward, so they say, and more than an ordinary normal player on the defense.

Good Backs Harrison and McQueen are the solid lights of the backfield. Harrison does the passing and carrying and does a lot of blocking when the game gets rough. McQueen runs his team with good generalship.

It seems the vulnerable spot in the Brownwood lineup is the inability of the Lions to put in the right punch when the final punch is needed. Several times during the fray with the Mavericks the Lions wanted the ball into dangerous ground, but failed the rise for the county.

The Steers, on the other hand, are in a position for the future, and will not be the absence of Hanshaw and Mims. Having secured in giving the present San Angelo fans a rush, if not a complete reversal, they have to make themselves as a write with other teams of the district.

They will go into the fray with the intention to top and top in a hurry. A light scrimmage was indulged in by the Steers Wednesday afternoon.

Attack Post Season Rule

CHICAGO, Oct. 30 (AP)—The Big Ten football conference, its 11th annual in particular, found itself floundering with attacks and threats today over its rule forbidding football teams from playing post-season games.

Requests for post-season games for the benefit of charity literally poured upon conference officials, but they refused to consider them. Probably the most insistent demand for an exception of the conference post-season rule for charity's sake came from Michigan where attempts were being made to schedule a charity game between the University of Michigan and the University of Detroit on Thanksgiving day. No amount of explanation ever will put the University of Michigan back on the high pedestal it now occupies if it fails at this hour."

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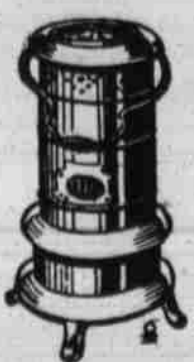

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1) Monte Marchigano. There were twenty dead and more than 100 injured in the town of Senigallia, on the coast, and five dead and upwards of 50 injured in the province of Marche, which includes the city of Ancona. Villages in the western part of the province had not been heard from at noon. It was there the authorities felt the toll might have been increased. Practically every house in this city of more than 50,000 inhabitants was damaged to some extent. It was considered remarkable there had been so comparatively few casualties. The people of the city were panic-stricken and refused to work in stores today. The streets and public squares were thronged. At least 25 were on the official list of dead with two others in isolated sections. Official figures at mid-afternoon placed the injured at nearly 200. The ministry of the interior said every effort was being made to reach the isolated towns with relief.

The earthquake struck shortly after eight o'clock this morning. The tremors lasted twenty minutes. Senigallia, like Ancona, suffered heavy damage to property. Hardly a house escaped.

The epicenter of the disturbance was in the Adriatic sea near Senigallia, which so far as now known was the hardest hit.

Military officials in neighboring provinces rushed troops in motor cars and trucks into the stricken area.

It was at first feared that the isolated villages, as during July's quake, would report the heaviest casualties but, so town after town was heard from it began to appear that the total of dead might not reach more than two score.

Immediately after the quake a wave swept over the area. Work was suspended and the population fled into the streets, refusing to re-enter their homes in fear that new shocks would be repeated. In fact, two additional slight tremors were reported later at several points.

Drafted Hold Material Witness In O'Laughlin Case

DENVER, Oct. 30 (AP) — Miss Carlo Alessandro, 21, was held incommunicado today by police seeking to learn whether she had witnessed the murder of 10-year-old Leona O'Laughlin, drowned in Berkeley Park lake.

A. T. Clark, police captain, said Miss Alessandro last night told officers she was sitting on the lake's front in a parked automobile the night of October 14, when a woman waded into the water and deposited a burden, which appeared to be the body of a child.

According to Miss Alessandro's story, the police captain said, the woman was accompanied on her grisly errand by a man.

"I doubted the story of Miss Alessandro until I took her to Berkeley Lake and asked her to point out where she had seen these things," said Captain Clark. Her story agreed in so many ways with what we already know of the killing, that I am determined to make a thorough check of this phase of the case, he said.

Leona O'Laughlin, daughter of Leo O'Laughlin, city detective, was slain on the night of Tuesday, Oct. 14. Three days later her body was found on Berkeley Park lake. The next Sunday the slain girl's stepmother, Mrs. Peter O'Laughlin, was arrested. Repeated grillings have failed to shake her assertions of innocence. She is charged with murder in the case, as is Leona's uncle, Frank O'Laughlin.
