



A 100 million dollar wage increase for men in freight and yard service (less than one-fifth of all employes) is equal to a 5 per cent advance in all freight rates.

The managers of the railroads, as trustees for the public, have no right to place this burden on the cost of transportation to you without a clear mandate from a public tribunal speaking for you.

The railroads have proposed the settlement of this controversy either under the existing national arbitration law, or by reference to the Interstate Commerce Commission. This offer has been refused by the employes' representatives.







Powerful Flyers Some Day Will Be Used to Guard Property and Lives of the Nation in Peace as Well as in War.

I have laid down the axiom that aeroplanes are life savers as well as life wasters, and that their real mission in this complicated age of ours is for the former service primarily, its services for the latter use being only as a necessity in time of war.

Even as a war machine, however, the aeroplane, both of the land and water variety; saves the lives of its people in direct ratio to its success in keeping hostile invaders away. This is specially true of a peaceful nation like ours, whose military and naval power, even if greatly augmented in the near future, will be used for

fense only, and not to aid inexcusable territorial aggrandizement. The great value of aircraft as a life saver on water, as illustrated by he ero coast patrol system advocated by our National Aerial Coast Patrol mission is acknowledged. Let us now consider briefly the coming stivities of the aircraft on land.

One of the great uses for aeroplanes in the near future will be as fire . The time is almost at hand when grant planes, larger than an re know of now, and with a speed greatly above the average of 85 to 100 miles an hour which prevails at the present time, will be equipped essenfally like land fire apparatus. Rushing without hindrance through the in at 150 to 200 miles an hour, carrying fire-fighting apparatus and expenenced firemen, fully equipped aerial fire departments will dash toward the buildings on fire, and extinguish the flames with chemicals long before the fire department of these times could get half way to the blaze. In fact, " will be done easier for the reason that the modern skyscraper is hard bare if the fire gets a good start, and great, and sometimes fatal, delay to getting up to the fire if it is on the upper stories.

## **OUR PUBLIC FORUM**

Vice President Marshall ON INDIVIDUAL'S RESPONSIBILITY TO GOVERNMENT.

> It cannot be said that it is the system of government which is wrong. It is the unjust use of the system. It has not been the use, but the misuse, of the powers of government which has produced the discontent in the minds of men.

> Equitable enforcement of the laws can never be made to rest upon the office-holders of the land. It must rest upon the individual. The people's rule does not depend necessarily upon the system of government under which they vote. Good or bad government must go back to good or bad citizenship, to intelligent or ignorant, to honest or dishonest electors. American democracy was intended to mean, and I believe does mean, something more than selecting officers.

The individualism of Thomas Jefferson is not dead. It has not moldered hack to dust in the grave at Monticello. It walks the earth this day knocking at the door of rich and poor, of wise and ignorant alike, calling upon all men to make this age the millennium of statecraft, wherein no one shall claim to be master, and all shall be glad to be the servants of the Republic

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION RELATING TO LEVVING TAX FOR SCHOOL PURPOSES

H. J. R. No. 30.] HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION.

Proposing an amendment to Section 3. Article 7, of the Constitution of the the maintenance of the public schools of the district,

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

SECTION 1. That Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

SECTION 3. School Taxes .-- One-fourth of the revenue derived rom the State occupation taxes, and a poll tax of \$1,00 on every male inhabitant of this State between the ages of 21 and 60 years shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools, and in addition thereto there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount, not to exceed 20 cents on the \$100.00 valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources will be sufficient to maintain and support the public March 19, yeas 78, nays 19, present and not voting 1.] free schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year. The Legislature may authorize the levy and collection of an annual ad valorem county tax within the counties of this State not to exceed 50 cents on the \$100.00 valuation of property situated

within the county; provided, a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, for the purpose of maintaining the public free schools of the county, and the Legislature may also provide forthe formation of school districts by general or special law, without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation, and ali such school districts, whether created by general or special law, may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such district, whether such districts are composed

of teritory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school district heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintence of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the district, voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one dollar on the \$100,00 valuation of the property subject to taxation in such districts, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns, constituting separate and independent school districts.

SEC. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby instructed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the next general election to be held in November, 1916, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to Section 3. Article 7, of the Constitu-State of Texas, authorizing the levy and collection of an advalorem coun-ty tax not to exceed fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of authorizing the levy and collection of an advalorem district tax not to exceed one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation of property for the maintaining the number of the district. ten or printed on their ballots the words, "Against the amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the levy of ad valorem school taxes, not to exceed fifty cents on the \$100.00 valuation in the county, and not to exceed one dollar on the \$100.00 valuation in the district, for the purpose of maintaining the public schools of the county or of the district.'

SEC. 3. The sum of \$5,000.00, or as much thereof as may be necessary therefor, is hereby appropriated to pay expenses of c rrying out the provisions of this resolution.





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
