Tried afterward for murder by utomobile, the man pleaded a ick of any intent to kill. But the ourt found him guilty as charged. 'Malice," said the judge, "does ot necessarily mean an actual inent to take human life. It may e implied, as when an act is done o recklessly as to manifest deeravity of mind and disregard of

Still, however wrongful a drivr's conduct, he is not guilty of urder if there is no causal conection between his bad driving nd the accident itself.

Suppose, for instance, that a runken driver is traveling down ne street when he suddenly has blowout. If the car jumps the urb and kills a pedestrian, solely ecause of the blowout, the driver

ould not be convicted of murder. True, a jury might find malice n the way he was driving. But if ing frequency, motorists are being the blowout would have resulted in the accident anyhow, then the bad driving could not be the cause
