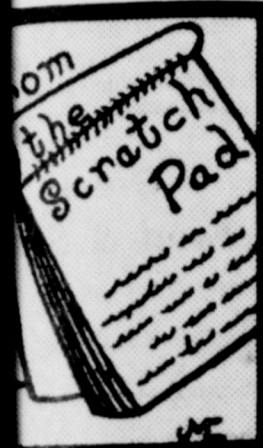

Preliminary Work Begins On Airport Improvement Project

Preliminary work started at the airport last week with the dismantling of the former Lyntegar radio tower and grading and leveling work at the airport site.

General Tower Company of Lubbock, owned by Eddie Phillips began the dismantling of the 280 foot radio tower last Tuesday. The tower was located just south of the Pioneer Natural Gas installation, west of Tahoka.

The final 80-foot section was down by Thursday evening, clearing one obstacle in the flight pattern of the new North-South runway.

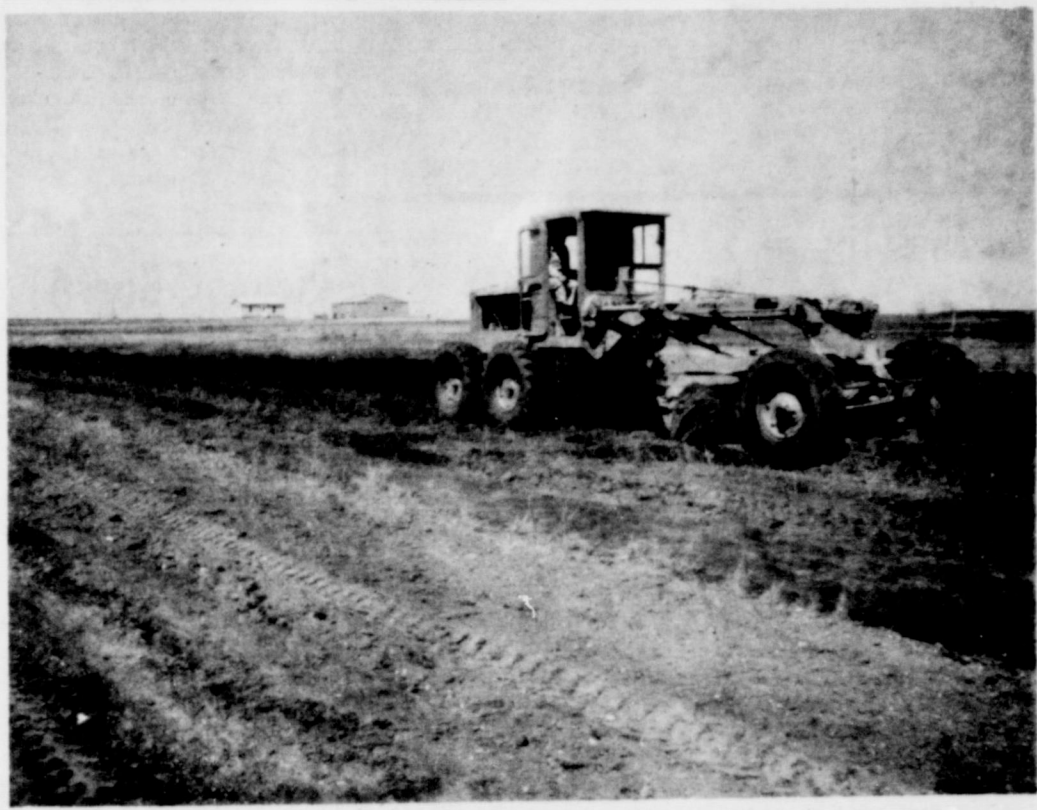
Phillips' Company has handled such projects on a world-wide basis. A recent job was just completed in Cuba at Guantanamo Marine Base.

Billy Miller, city employee, was well underway with grad-

ing and leveling operations Tuesday at the airport. This phase of work is on the North-South runway, leveling the extension part of the project.

Earth moving equipment is scheduled to move into the airport area sometime this week.

The airport improvement project was approved earlier by local voters at a special election.

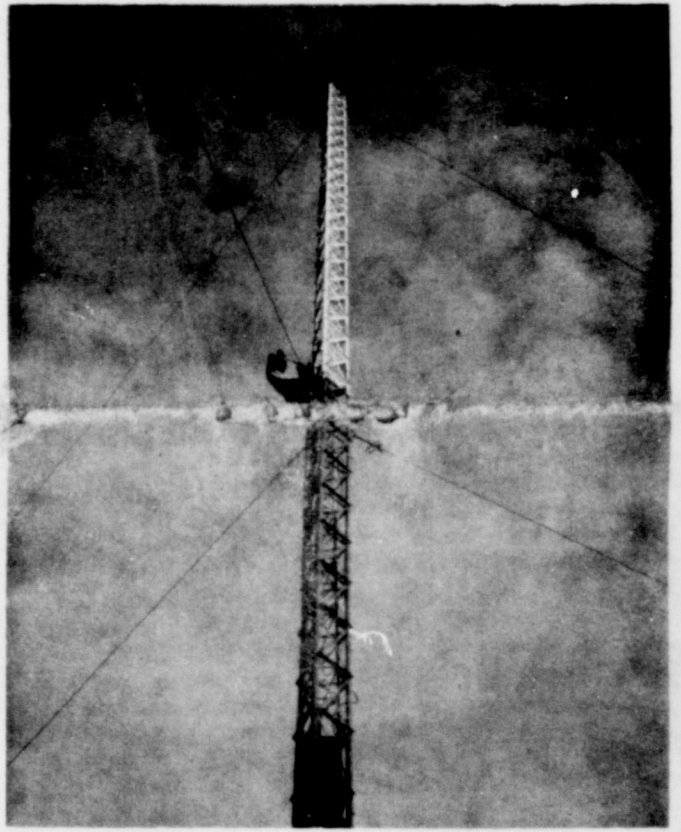
Mrs. Kay Glover, teaching Government, and students Cindy Gibson and David Rogers of Tahoka High School will attend the three-day seminar.

Charles Moser Will Be Guest Speaker At Athletic Banquet

Charles Moser, Athletic Director for Abilene Public Schools will be guest speaker at the annual Tahoka High School Athletic Banquet Saturday night.

The banquet will be held at the school cafeteria, honoring the outstanding athletes for the 1968-69 school season. Recognition will be given to team members of the various sports divisions.

Master of Ceremonies will be Clint Walker. Other persons on the program are Rev. Hugh Daniel, Rev. Jim Turner, and Tahoka coaches.

Charles (Chuck) Moser is a graduate of Missouri University and lettered three years under the coaching of Don Faurot. Since military duty, he has coached in three cities.

Mr. Moser coached at Abilene High from 1953 to 1960. During this time, his record was 78 wins, 7 losses, and 2 ties. He won the district for 6 years and won state for three years. He won 49 games consecutively without a loss. The total average points per year was 445 points. His lifetime record was 141 wins and 29 losses.

For the past eight years, Mr. Moser has been Athletic Director and Assistant Business Manager for the Abilene Public Schools.

His career has included lecturing at many clinics, serving on workshops at six colleges or universities and has written numerous magazine articles and completed two books.

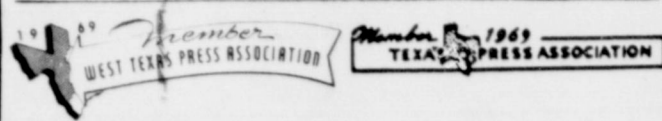

Beef Cooking Program Held

The Lynn County Home Demonstration Council held a "Beef-A-Rama" Friday, April 11 at Lyntegar.

Cattlemen Urged To Make Early Screwworm Inspection

Spring has officially arrived and with it the need to begin inspections of herds for screwworm infestation. At this date infections are showing up in South Texas, along the border areas but have not begun a rapid advancement to northern counties.

During the period closing January 25, 1969, Texas recorded 10 confirmed cases, all in the border county areas. During this same period Mexico had 623 confirmed cases. All cases reported were confirmed by laboratory

tests. Herd inspection in Lynn County is being urged by the County Agent's office and county committee, headed by Edward Bartley. If you find any worms, upon inspection, get a canister from the agent's office and send the specimen to the state as per instructions.

According to Bill Griffin, agent, Lynn County had one confirmed case on November 7, 1968. Griffin and Bartley urge herd inspection now so

that a fly drop can be set up if confirmed cases are found in the county.

16. Education - S. B. 2, a bill which incorporates recommendations of the Governor's Committee on Public School Education was heard before the Senate Committee on Education. It appeared that the attitude of the Committee was such that none of the governor's recommendations would likely be incorporated into law during this session of the legislature.

Meat Inspection - S. B. 28, providing for mandatory state inspection of slaughtering plants was assured of final passage, and will probably be written into law within the next few days.

Vote Registration - S. B. 28, a bill calling for repeat of the annual voter registration, was defeated, and passed with very little opposition.

Annual Sessions - a proposed Constitutional Amendment calling for the voters of Texas to vote on whether or not to hold annual sessions of the Legislature was reported favorably, and could be passed at any time.

Pay Raises for Legislature, a proposed Constitutional Amendment to increase salaries of the Lt. Governor, the Speaker and other members of the Legislature, was introduced and referred to the committee on Constitutional Amendments.

Agricultural Exports - HSR 278, by Blanton, provides for a Committee to study ways and means of increasing exports of Texas cotton and grain sorghums.

Daylight Savings Time - A Constitutional Amendment to exempt Texas from the fed

eral law requiring uniform advancement of time is scheduled for hearing April 16. If you have views, pro or con, on this issue, write your Congressman and tell him how you feel about this issue.

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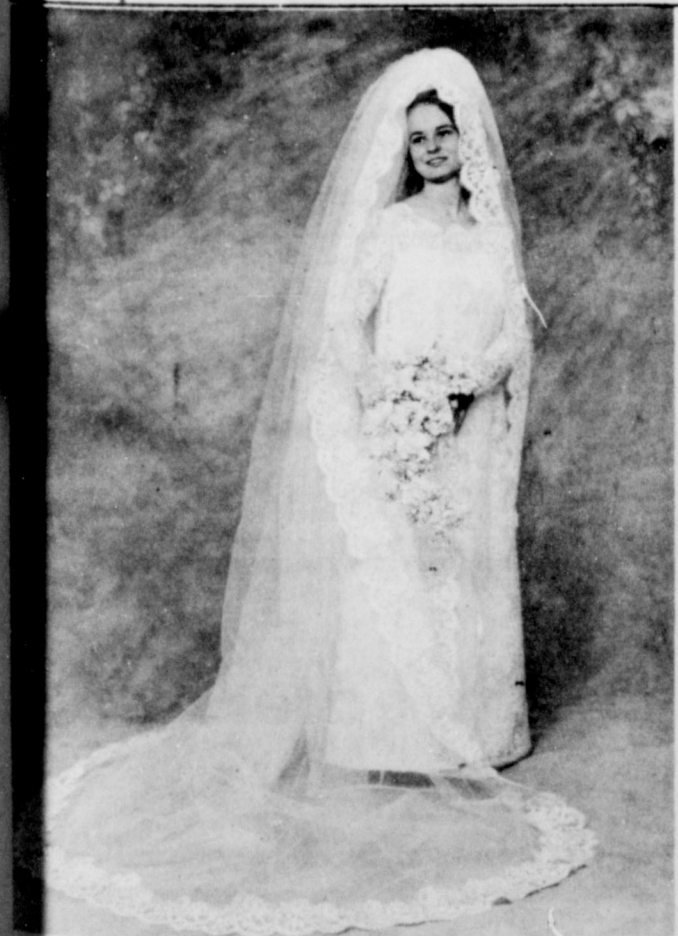

Tahoka Chamber Tourist Plan Area Program

The Tahoka Chamber of Commerce is one of 24 in the Panhandle-Plains area participating in a group program designed to bring additional tourist dollars to the communities working together in the program. It has been announced by Cap Whorton, Chamber of Commerce president.

The promotion is the largest area tourist information program ever set up through the cooperative efforts of individual chambers of commerce. The Area Development Department of Southwestern Public Service Co. designed the program and presented it for approval to each of the participating communities.

The program is built around a "Land of Coronado" theme

and will use outdoor advertising, window cards, and table cards to acquaint tourists with the attractions of the area.

Fifty-three outdoor advertising boards located along the major highways of the area are the principal tourist information sources in the plan.

The window cards for display in motels, service stations, and eating places will have complete information on all area tourist attractions including those in the Tahoka area. The same information will also be found on the table cards for restaurants and cafes.

"If nine tourist cars a day stop in our community overnight, the economic gain is the same as adding a \$100,000 a year industrial payroll. And, the tourist dollar is a 'new' dollar, one that otherwise wouldn't find its way in to the community.

The outdoor signs will be on display from May until September, the major tourist months.

District Rotary Meet Slated

Arrangements are complete for the annual conference of District 573, Rotary International to be held at Midland this weekend. The meeting will feature discussions of matters relating to Rotary, along with informative addresses and program on matters of general interest.

Delegations are expected from the 47 clubs in an area extending from Odessa to Sweetwater and northward in to the Panhandle. A delegation from the Tahoka club plans to attend the meeting.

Murder by Automobile

Although cars kill more than 50,000 Americans every year, we seldom think of a car as a murder weapon. Nevertheless, with growing frequency, motorists are being convicted of the crime of murder by automobile.

The key ingredient, upping the offense from mere manslaughter to murder, is malice. And a jury may find malice by logical deduction from the circumstances of the killing. For example:
A man who was rebuffed by his

girl friend pushed her out of the car, ran her down, then backed over her prostrate body. In this behavior a jury found ample evidence of malicious intent, and brought in a verdict of murder by automobile.

Even if a driver has no specific intent to kill anybody, he may still commit murder—if his conduct is reckless enough to imply malice.

Thus, in another case, a man decided it would be great fun to drive up close to pedestrians and make them jump. After playing this little game several times, he misjudged his distance and struck down an innocent victim.

Tried afterward for murder by automobile, the man pleaded a lack of any intent to kill. But the court found him guilty as charged.

"Malice," said the judge, "does not necessarily mean an actual intent to take human life. It may be implied, as when an act is done so recklessly as to manifest depravity of mind and disregard of human life."

Still, however wrongful a driver's conduct, he is not guilty of murder if there is no causal connection between his bad driving and the accident itself.

Suppose, for instance, that a drunken driver is traveling down the street when he suddenly has a blackout. If the car jumps the curb and kills a pedestrian, solely because of the blackout, the driver could not be convicted of murder.

True, a jury might find malice in the way he was driving. But if the blackout would have resulted in the accident anyhow, then the bad driving could not be the cause of death.
