Veterans' Widows Eligible For Educational Assistance

A veteran's widow entitled to GI home loan benefits is automatically eligible for the newly created widow's educational assistance from the Veterans Administration.

But the reverse is not necessarily true, the VA reminded today.

Only unmarried widows of World War II, Korean Conflict and Post-Korean veterans who died as the result of military service are entitled to VA home loan guarantees.

However, unmarried widows of veterans who served at any time since the Spanish-American War and who

died as the result of military service are eligible for VA educational assistance up to a maximum of 36 months.

In addition, the wives of veterans who are permanently and totally disabled because of service are also eligible for the educational benefits, which amount to as much as \$130 a month for full-time training.

Eligible widows of World War II veterans have only until July 25, 1970, to use their GI home loan entitlement. The entitlement of eligible Korean Conflict widows expires January 31, 1975, with eligible Post-Korean

widows having 20 years from their husband's death in service, 20 years from the veteran's discharge, or March 3, 1975, whichever is later, to use their entitlement.

Widows and wives, eligible for educational assistance, have until November 30, 1976, or eight years after their husbands' deaths or VA finding of permanent and total disability, whichever is later, to complete their education or training.

Water Rights Deadline Is Set September 1

All interested persons should remember that all claims for water rights have to be made on or before September 1, 1969.

The Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 requires that: (1) All claims of riparian water rights, (2) All claims to impound, divert, or use public water waters for which no

permit has been used, (3) All claims of water rights under the Irrigation Act of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with Irrigation Act of 1913, (4) All other claims of water rights other than claims under current permits and certified filings must be

recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Failure to file this statement, or claim of water rights with the Water Rights Commission shall lose such rights. This recordation claim does not apply to underground water, nor to the use of water for ordinary domestic and livestock purposes.

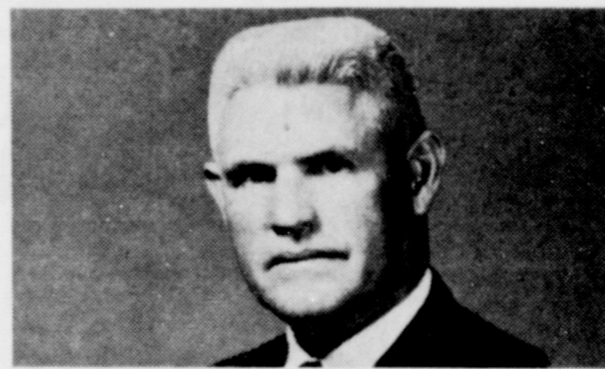

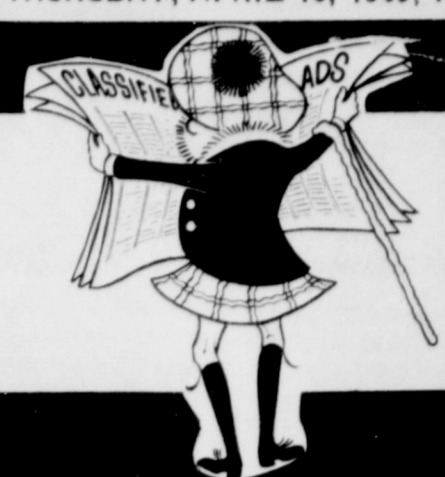

Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says.....

Bagworms, damaging insect pests of evergreens and occasionally of broadleaf plants will soon be making their springtime appearance.

Evergreens should be closely examined and if newly hatched bagworms are found, control measure should be applied.

The worms immediately spin a bag of silk around themselves and attach bits of foliage to the outside of the bag as they feed. The larvae carry these bags wherever they go with only the front part of their bodies protruding for feeding and movement. The bags enlarge as the bagworms grow. A heavy infestation, warns the county agent, can completely strip

the plant of foliage. When this happens, the plant may be lost.

The effective "camouflage" presented by the bags makes the insect hard to detect and damage may be extensive before they are noticed. They are much easier to control while they are still young.

If bagworms were present on a plant last year and control measures were not applied, chances are very good, that an insecticide will be needed this spring.

Recommended control measures are outlined in L-199, "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants" are available at my office.

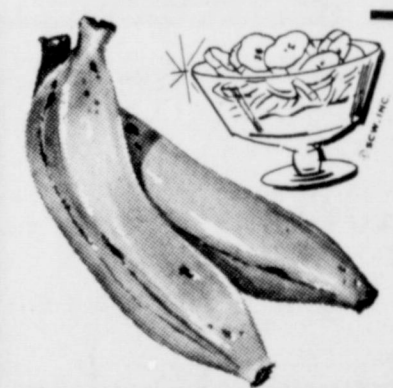
