

#### Farm Bureau Legislative lews letter

H. B. 240 by Hinson, the "teacher pay raise" bill which also included provisions to finance the Minimum Foundation School Program through a uniform state tax equalization rate based on the full market value of real property, was heard before the House Committee on Public Education, on Tuesday. April 1.

In a highly significant move, a substitute Committee bill which deleted the provision imposing a uniform state tax equalization rate based on full market value, and substituted in its place a provision to continue financing based on the economic index of individual counties. This move is significant because it probably indicates an end to efforts this session to impose a full market value tax. Any full market value tax could easily tax farmers and ranchers out of existence.

H. B. 23, a bill providing that livestock feedlots shall he classed as manufacturing operations in calculating the index of the financial ability of each county to support the Foundation School Program was finally passed by the House and sent to the Senate, where it was referred to the Committee on Education.

H. B. 104, Transportation, a bill increasing the penalty for hauling without a valid Railroad Commission permit from \$50 to \$100 was signed into law by Governor Smith. and becomes effective 90 days after the end of the regular session of the 61st Legislature.

S. B. 150, Animal Health, a bill providing for licensing of persons engaged in the business of rendering dead animals and poultry, and setting forth strict regulations for the operation of rendering plants was finally passed by the House and sent to the Governor for his signature.

The traps, bright yellow and sexily baited with live weevils, will be used this years in two separate but closely related projects. On e is the largest-ever attempt at eradication covering between 40,000 and 50,000 acres of cotton in an area 60 miles long by 40 miles wide. #### Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says....

Bagworms, damaging insect pests of evergreens and occasionally of broadleaf plants will soon be making their springtime appearance.

Evergreens should be closely examined and if newly hatched bagworms are found. control measure should be ap-

The worms immediately spin a bag of silk around themselves and attach bits of foliage to the outside of the bag as they feed. The larvae carry these bags wherever they go with only the front part of their bodies protruding for feeding and movement. The bags enlarge as the bagworms grow. A heavy infestation, warns the county agent, can completely strip

the plant of foliage. When this happens, the plant may be

The effective "camouflage" presented by the bags makes the insect hard to detect and damage may be extensive before they are noticed. They are much easier to control while they are still young.

If bagworms were present on a plant last year and control measurers were not applied, chances are very good, that an insecticide will be needed this spring.
