From Senator E. D. Martin we received a marked copy of the Feb. 13th Dallas News and we print the marked item below:

T. J. O'Donnell, president of the West Texas Construction Company accompanied by E. D. Martin, general counsel, and J. J. Curlee, a director of the company, arrived in the city yesterday, "Our company was organized to build the West Texas and Northern Railroad from Stanton, on the Texas and Pacific. to Lubbock, the county seat of Lubbock County, a distance of 110 miles." said Mr. Martin. "We have fourteen miles of the road going some.

gra led north from Stanton, and have one hundred teams and a complement of men pushing the work of grading.

"We have the backing to build the road and we are here for the purpose of making contracts for material and supplies. The officers of the company are T. J. O'Donnell, who built the Orient, president: J. T. Joiner, president of the First State Bank of Lamesa, vicepresieent: Paul Kounts, cashier of the First National Bank of Stanton. treasuer; Charles Ebbersol, president of the Home National Bank of Stanton, secretary.

The ultimate intention is to extend the road through the corn belt of Texas; that is, from Stanton northward through the counties of Martin, Dawson, Lynn, Lubbock Hale, Lamb, Castro, Deaf Smith. Oldham, Hartley and Dallam, thence northwest to Pueblo. Colo. There is no railroad within one hundred miles on either side of this route, which lies through a pining for an associate. Don't be region, which it has been demonstrated produces as much cotton as any section of the South and as much corn as any section of Illinois. Missouri or Nebraska. I am aware that this statement is not going to be readily accepted as true by those who have considered that section a part of the dry belt. But it is a fact just the same that farmers who bave gone into that region ahead of railroads are producing from fortytwo to fifty-sev en bushels of corn to the acre, and from a half to three-quarters of a bale of cotton. The ears of corn are large and the grains flinty, and the cotton of excellent fiber.

"The corn belt of the United States is comparatively small in area, and as the uses to which corn is put are multiplying very rapidly as the bulletins of the agricultural experiment stations inform us, that cereal has become worth about as much as wheat, and on account of the limited extent of land on which it can be successfully grown it not likely again to become as cheap as it formerly was. Having lived all my life in the corn belt of Missouri, I know something about corn and corn lands. By the time the West Texas and Northern Railroad is completed the lands along the route of it will easily be worth \$100 an acre."-

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
