## The Railroad.

The Reporter does not wisb to unduly encourage its readers over the much talked of railroad, but after taking everything into consideration will say the prospects look better and brigiter for the early starting and completing of this road than ever before. First, becanse it is mostly home men behind the enterprise, men who have large interests at stake who could not afford to deceive the people even if it payed to do so, and second, because the rigid contracts entered into w th the different towns along the line are so that every dollar turned over to the company will go into the actual construction, therefore, it can be readily seen that the only possible way for this road to pay anyone connected with it is to put it in operation, and we believe that is the full intention of the promoters.
The promoters are not making any wild speculations as to when work will be resumed on the grade such as the old thread-bare "thirty, sixty" or "ninety" days racket, but it is believed by those who are in a position to know that the teams will be started sometime next week and possibly Monday, and will do so sure, if the bonus shows up satisfactorily to them.
Senator Martin and president of the construction company, T. J. O' Donnell, have been in Dallas all the wesk negotiating for a hundred miles of steel, and a wire from them Thursday stated they were progressing nicely
A phoue message from Lamesa Thursday stated their boutus was about up and it is thought that Tahoka has already fulfilled her part of it. Stanton, however, is yet considerably behind and this is the only reason the teams have not beea put to work. The soliciting committee are still hustling, and on them, or rather the people signing up, depervis how soon work will be started. Stanton Reporter.

From Senator F. D. Martin we received a marked erpy of the Feb. 13 th Dallas Neas and we print the marked item below:
T. J. O'Dounell, presideat of the West Texas Construction Company accompanied by 15. D. Martiv, general counsel, and I. J. Curiee, a director of the coupany, arrived in the city yesterdiay, "Our company was orgavised to build the West Texas and Nortberu Railroud from Stanton, on the Texas and Pacific, to Labbocs, the county seat of Lubbock County, a distance of nio miles," said Mr. Martiv. "We bave fourteen miles of the road
gra led north from Stanton, and have one hundred teams and 2 c, mplement of men pahiig the work of grading.
"We have the back'ng to butild the road and we are here for the parpose of making contracts fer material and supplies. The offce:s of the company are T. J. O'Donnell, who built the Orient, president: J. T. Joiner, president of the First State Bank of I.aniesa, vicepresicent; Paul Kounts, cashier of the First National Bank of Stanton, treastuer; Charies Ebbersol, presideat of the Home National Bank of Stanton, secretary

The ultimate intention is to ex tend the road through the corn belt of Texas; that is, frem Stanton northward through the countieof Martirs, Dawson, I.yon, Lubbock Hale, Lamb, Castro, Deaf Smith, Otdham, Hartley and Dallam, thence nortnwest to Puebio, Colo. There is wo railroad within one hundred miles on either side of this route, which lies through a region, which it has been demonstrated proluces as much cotton as any section of the South aud as much corn as any section of Itlinois. Missouri or Nebravka. I am aware that this statement is not going to be readily accepted as true by those who have considered that section a part of the dry belt. But it is a f.ct just the same that farmers who bave gone into that region ahead of railroads are producing from fortytwo to fifty-seven bushels of cora to the acre, and from a half to three-quarters of a bale of cotton. The ears of corn are large and the grains flinty, an l the cotton of excellent fiber,

The corn beit of the United States is comparatively small in area, and as the uses to which corn is put are multiplying very rapidly as the bulletins of the agricultural experiment stations inform us, that cereal has become worth $\mathbf{x}$ bout as much as wheat, and on account of the limited extent of land ou which it cun be successfully grown it is not likely again to become as cheap as it formerly was. Having livel all my life in the corn b.it of Missouri, I know something about corn and corn lands. By the time the West Texas and Northern Railiroad is completed the lands 2long the route of it aill easily le worth Stoo an acre.
