TALKS ON ADVERTISING

VIII. Excuses For Not Advertising

By Henry Herbert Huff

"Mr. Business Man, I was about town yesterday talking advertising with your business people, and perhaps you'd like to know what they think of it."

"Certainly. How did Brown take it?"

"He said that since he never had advertised he didn't need to now.

"It is more necessary today than ever before for the country merchant to advertise. Conditions are changing. Competition is keen. The catalogue houses and city merchants have 'educated' the public to shop by the impersonal method. It is the modern way to do business.

"To cast a thing aside merely because one never has used it is mere foolishness. It is the fellow who ventures that wins. For a business man to deny advertising a chance to show what it will do merely because he has succeeded fairly well without it is poor logic. It is not how good the present trade, but how much better it might be with advertising."

"What did Mr. White, our hardware Tealer, say?" "White said he DIDN'T NEED TO advertise—that present trade was good enough. I assured him that advertising is necessary to HOLD customers. People are attracted by 'leaders.' If a dealer announces in the paper an unusually good value, they will go to him and take advantage of it and, if satisfied, eventually change their patronage to that store. Many a merchant has thought his trade was safe and woke up to find it otherwise."

"What excuse did old Tightwad give you?" "He said he COULD NOT AFFORD to advertise. He had the false notion that newspaper publicity is an expense instead of an

"Advertising is a straight business affair. Space should be used for no other reason than that it nets a profit. It stands on its merits-it is worth all it costs. Rightly done, it never fails to pay, and it is our purpose in future talks to learn HOW to make it pay." "How about Smith?"

"He said it WOULDN'T PAY. I asked him if he'd be willing to have a judge pass sentence upon him without a trial. That is just what he was going to do with advertising."

"What answer did Black give?" "Black couldn't see where advertising was going to help him any. He said: 'The whole neighborhood knows me and what I sell. People will come to me when they want anything.' I proceeded to show him his mistaken idea of publicity. I called his attention to the need of telling his patrons about the new things he added to his stock and why they should buy them; that people would not know what he had on his shelves if he did not make it known; that his prices might be much lower than competitors and yet the public

would have no way of finding this out. "Next time I drop in we'll discuss some failings of the merchants

who do advertise."

"Texas is full of surprises." said L. D. Webster, secretary of the Tahoka Commercial Club, to the Reporter this morning, "but if you want to find the biggest ones in the state, come out our way.

"I don't know what would surprise a man more than after riding eightyfive miles across country from the railroad, to run into a pretty little city, full of life and push and possessing metropolitan features. That is the kind of surprise Tahoka has in store for visi-

"Big Springs is the nearest railroad point to Tahoka and it is eighty-five miles across the plains, as the crow flies, to Tahoka, and yet we have a fine little city. Tahoka is the county seat of Lynn county and is a town of about 1,000 people. It is a pretty place, stirrounded by pretty country. 2,751 15 3.751.15 While we have no brick buildings, owing to the long haul of building material we have quite a number. of handsome frame ones.
