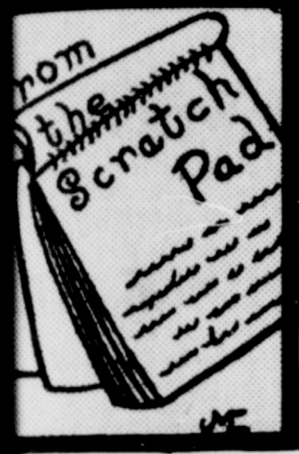

Entries Exceed 300 In Stock Show

Nearly \$2,500 Cash Prizes And Bonuses Paid To Show Winners

Lynn County FFA and 4H youngsters exhibited over 300 animals in the annual County Livestock Show held last weekend. The show was sponsored by the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce and Tahoka Rotary Club. Nearly \$2,500 was awarded to the exhibitors plus trophies and ribbons. Cash money was paid to the top five winners.

Cash awards and premiums were made up from donations from merchants, organizations, and individuals in Tahoka. New Home, Wilson, O'Donnell, and Grassland, Lynn County Farm Bureau sponsored the trophies awarded during the show.

Trophies were awarded for Grand and Reserve Grand Champion of the show and also for Showmanship.

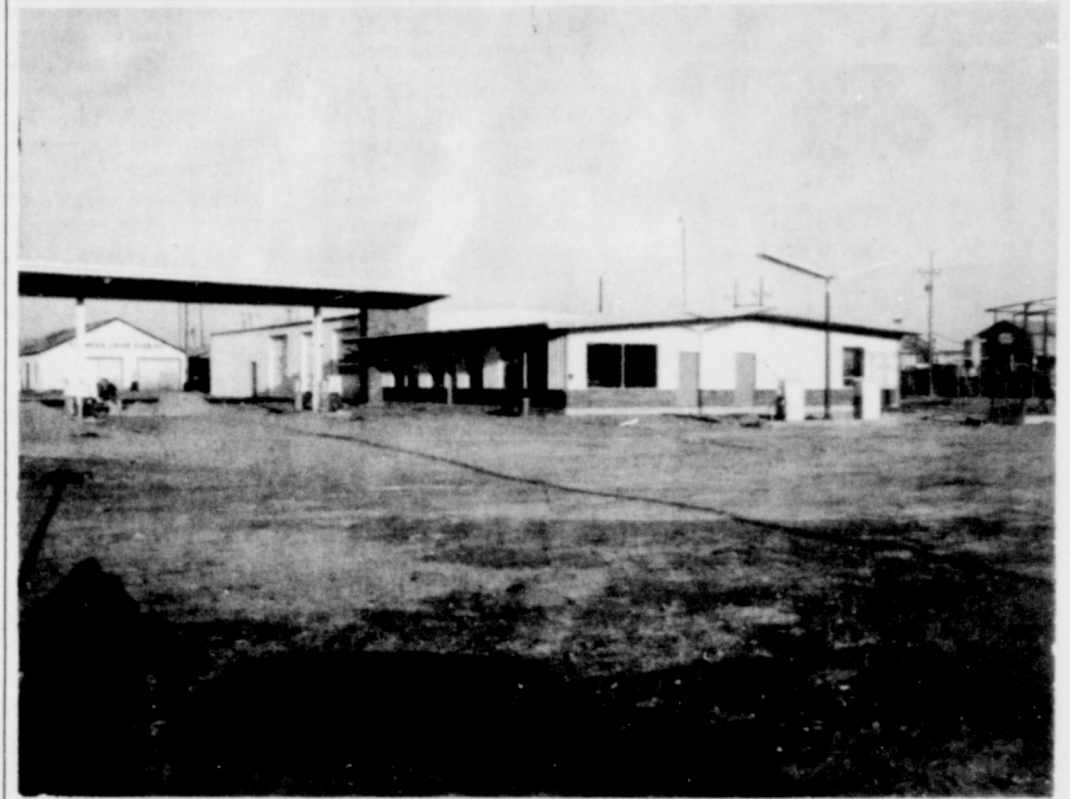

Filing Period Closes For City, School And Hospital Elections

The filing periods closed last week, for candidates seeking positions in elections coming up April 5. Elections will be held for the Tahoka Board of Education, Tahoka City Council, Lynn County Hospital District, and Lynn County School Board.

Persons filing for the City Council are incumbents Melton Leslie, mayor, H. B. McCord, Jr., and Clayton Carter, for councilmen. The filing period closed with no opposition for these men.

The election generating the most interest is the local School Board. Two terms expire this year, those of Clifton Hamilton and Roy Stevens. Nine candidates have

filed for these positions, with the incumbents not seeking re-election. The filing closed with these names recorded. Joe Brooks, Robert Harvick, John Chappa, Jr., Leonard Benitez, Dan Curry, R. E. McElroy, Billy Jack Dunlap, R. L. Warren, and Tommy Lee Graves.

All directors of the Lynn

County Hospital District have filed for re-election. Those with expiring terms are Garland Thornton, Jr., Clint M. Walker, W. T. Kidwell, and E. R. Blakney.

Elections will be conducted in Tahoka, O'Donnell, Wilson, New Home, Draw, and Grassland.

Three board members have filed for re-election for the County School Board. Members are H. B. McCord, Jr., member at large, Ralph M. Beach, Commissioner's Precinct No. 3, and T. B. Mason, Commissioner's Precinct No. 1.

All elections will be held April 5. Absentee voting will be continued through April 1.

Grant Approved For Local Sewer

Word was received from the offices of Senator Yarborough and Congressman Mahon that a sewer assistance grant has been approved for Tahoka.

The Federal Water Control Administration has approved a grant in the amount of \$22,000.00 for assistance in bringing the city sewer system up to State Health Department standards.

Additions to the present system are being planned as well as maintenance repair to the existing facilities.

Total approximate cost of the project is \$74,000.

Safety Practices Can Reduce Hazards Of Tornado Season

Tornadoes can occur any place in the United States. In our area they happen most frequently from March through September. Weather conditions can be hot, sticky days with southerly winds and a threatening ominous sky.

An hour or two before a tornado topsy-turvy clouds appear sometimes bulging down instead of up. Rain, frequently hail, precede the tornado with a heavy downpour after it has passed.

They can occur anytime during the day or night and move a westerly direction, usually from the southwest, traveling about 25-40 miles per hour.

As seasonal activity intensifies, the Lynn County News, in cooperation with the local fire department, civil defense and law enforcement officers, has agreed to publish safety information concerning tornado activity.

Anytime the area is under a severe alert and known threatening storms are in the vicinity, a storm watch force begins operations immediately. Two-way radio communication speeds storm information to all watchers.

If a confirmed tornado is in the air or on the ground, and heading in the direction of Tahoka, the warning siren will be set off. The siren will be activated for a series of

four wavering tones, which definitely means that it is time to seek appropriate shelter.

At no time, during an alert should persons call the civil defense, fire department, police or weather bureau for storm information. This information is related during an alert by radio and television, and gives storm facts related to storm center areas.

The warning siren is for your protection. It is a signal for you to seek shelter. This should be done in an orderly manner, keeping calm and help prevent public excitement and panic. Too many

Falcon Bass Biting

Lynn County fishermen have been taking advantage of the cold weather to get in some fishing before plowing time arrives.

Don Spears and Kenneth Huffaker recently returned from Falcon Lake where they were able to bring home a nice 'eatin' mess' of black bass. Don says the Falcon backs were hitting silver spoons but what worked for one fisherman didn't necessarily work for another.

Don and Kenneth met a pair of fishermen from Austin, one of which was a 'champion' bass fisherman. They witnessed a 90 pound catch of black bass made by this group in one days time. Don reports the crappie fishing to be light at Falcon.

Oak Creek Still Hot

Harvey Grayson, formerly of Tahoka and now a resident of Woodrow, visited this writer Saturday and brought pictures of some high black bass caught last week at Oak Creek, south of Sweetwater.

Harvey and Gene Fix of Lubbock accompanied Howard Henry of Slaton to Oak Creek in order to observe a 'real bass fisherman' at work. Henry has won many bass contests and knows how to pull in the big blacks in any kind of weather.

Henry's technique differs from the average bass fisherman. After selecting a likely spot, he would tie up his boat several yards and slip into an inner tube floater and drift slowly into the willows. Henry was using a special rod built for the purpose by Fix and Grayson, who operate a custom Tackle Shop as a hobby.

The rod was very short and made of heavy fiberglass. The lure was a jig made by Henry and the whole technique has been named 'Dubbing' by Henry. His jigs are appropriately called 'Henry's Dubbing Jigs.' Grayson and Fix would watch in awe as Henry pulled in fish after fish using the system. At the day he had his limit of 15 blacks, five of them going over 6 pounds. The smallest was a mere three pounds.

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Services Held For Mrs. C. H. Cain

Last rites for Mrs. C. H. (Sue) Cain, 88, who died Wednesday of last week in Traverse City, Mich., were held Saturday at 2 p. m. in White Funeral Home Chapel here with Rev. Hugh Daniel Methodist pastor and the Tahoka Eastern Star Chapter officiating.

Burial followed in Resthaven Memorial Park, Lubbock.

Mrs. Cain was the widow of the late Judge C. H. Cain, prominent early day attorney who served several terms each as county attorney and county judge of Lynn county and as mayor of the City of Tahoka.

She was born Suzanne Rymer in Monroe, La., March 20, 1880, but grew up in Iredell, Texas. She was married October 1, 1913 to Mr. Cain, who had come to Tahoka several years earlier to practice law. When he died

on October 21, 1950, she moved to Florida to live until 1959, and then to the Michigan city, where she and a sister operated a professional dressmakers' business.

Mrs. Cain was long active in the Methodist Church here. She was a charter member of the Eastern Star and served as its second Worthy Matron. She was also well known locally for work with the poor and unfortunate.

Survivors include the sister, Miss Emily Rymer of Traverse City, Mich.; two brothers, Ernest Rymer of Traverse City and Albert Rymer of Austin; and several nephews and nieces.

times, residents take to their vehicles watching storm clouds and driving around. Your car should be used only to transport you and your family to a shelter or safe area.

Joy-riding during an alert causes confusion and possible accident danger and hampers emergency vehicles from doing their job. All streets should be kept open for emergency use only.

The difference between life and death can be evaluated by following storm safety rules. Here are a few that should be studied and remembered for future use.

1. When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave or an underground excavation. There is no universal protection against tornadoes except underground excavations.

2. If in open country, move at right angles to the tornado's path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

3. If in a city or town, seek inside shelter, preferably a strongly reinforced building. Stay away from windows. In homes, the corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers greatest safety. Too, taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls will offer some safety.

4. If in school, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums with large, poorly supported roofs.

5. Equalize inside pressure in the home or building by opening windows or doors on sides away from the tornado.

6. Keep tuned to your radio or television stations for latest tornado advisory information. The only time you should call the weather bureau or authorized personnel, is to report a tornado.

Bonds Approved For Water Plan

K. B. Watson, Water, Inc. President, stated word has just been received at 12:30 p. m., March 4, 1969 that the Constitution amendment authorizing \$3.5 billion in bonds for the Texas Water Plan has been passed by the House of Representatives in Austin by a vote of 132-15. This is further significant evidence of the statewide support of the Texas Water Plan to replace our depleting ground water and in addition will provide other areas of the state with their long-range requirements. The Constitutional amendment was changed on the floor of the House to provide for submission to the voters in 1969 rather than 1970 as originally suggested.

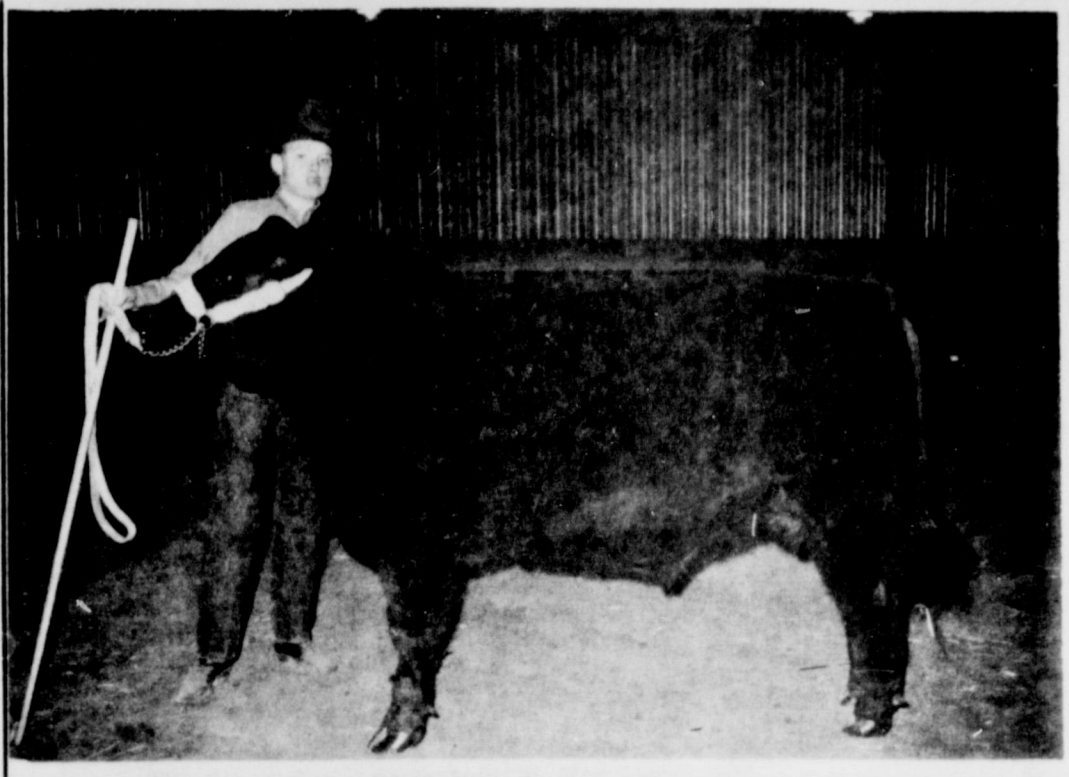

A new chemical finishing process may take the "drip" out of drying durable press garments on the clothes line. The "Mild-cure process" gives cotton fabrics the capacity to dry smoothly when

hung on the line while damp, after spin dry cycle on the washing machine. Usually they must be hung while dripping wet after the rinse cycle.

Wrinkles can be prevented in durable press garments by drying them in a dryer, if they are removed immediately after the drying cycle stops or if the dryer has a cool down cycle. The process is named for the relatively low heating, or curing, temperatures employed.

Treatment involves first wetting the fabric with a chemical solution, then heating the wet fabric to 212F degrees, for two minutes to cause a reaction between the chemicals and the cotton. Curing temperatures in conventional processes may range up to 325 degrees F.

In the last step, the treated fabric is washed and dried. Lower temperatures can be used, but the reaction time is increased proportionately. The low temperature reaction between what the chemists call "wet wrinkle recovery"

The process has been carried out only in batch-size steps on laboratory and semi-pilot plant scale, but the chemists believe it can be carried out on a continuous basis.

Along with the ability to line dry smoothly from a damp-dry state, the treated fabric has all the good properties of cotton treated by conventional processes.

Durable creases have been put into fabric finished by the process, but only on a very limited scale. Chemists at an Agricultural Research Service laboratory in New Orleans says that further research is needed to determine the best combination of

Recipe of the Week

Pecan Pralines

- 2 cups sugar
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 cup Borden's buttermilk
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 1/2 cups pecan halves

In large, heavy sauce pan combine the sugar, soda, buttermilk, and salt. Cook over high heat for 5 minutes (or to 210 degrees) on candy thermometer stirring frequently, scraping bottom of pan. Add butter and pecans. Continue cooking, stirring constantly scraping bottom and sides of pan, until candy reaches soft ball stage (234 degrees F., about 5 mins.) Remove from heat and cool slightly. Beat until thick and creamy. Drop from tablespoon onto waxed paper and let cool. Makes 18 2" pralines.

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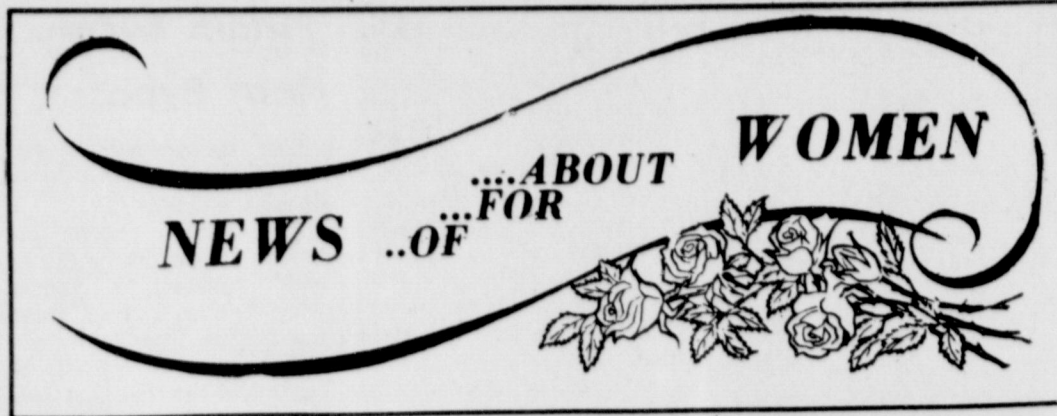

Scholarship Is Awarded

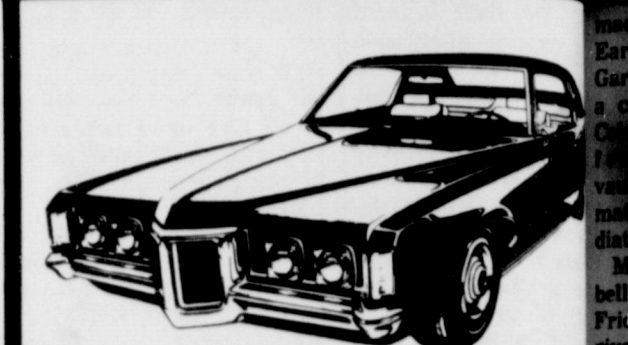

Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says.....

What does the calibration of equipment mean to a good farmer or manager? County Agent Griffin says it means more money in his pocket and the reputation of being a better manager.

Calibration of equipment means knowing, for example that a fertilizer distributor will spread 1,800 pounds to the acre and not 1,000 pounds or 2,500 pounds.

The calibration of sprayers is more critical than that of other equipment because the results can be more disastrous.

Under-planting or sowing means you are losing a definite percentage of your soil's production capacity. How long would you keep a low producing cow or a tractor that was running on 3 cylinders instead of 4? Over-planting or sowing means a waste of expensive seed and too much competition between plants.

Why not do something about the calibration of your planters, grain drills, fertilizer distributors, chemical applicators and spray rigs? Operator's manual which come with most machine usually contain calibration instructions and they should be studied and understood, reminds the county agent.

An easy way to calibrate a chemical applicator on 40 inch rows. Measure 100 feet. Then time the number of seconds it takes your tractor to travel 100 feet using the speed to be used on the sprayer. Collect fluid and measure in ounces from all nozzles used per row. Ounces collected is equal to gallons per acre.

certified by the Texas Seed and Plant Board, no person may use the name given the new variety by its developer to sell non-certified cotton seed for a period of 17 years from the date variety is registered or certified by the Board." This bill was passed by the House of Representatives and sent to the Senate where it was referred to the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Livestock.

H. B. 104 introduced by Pickens, is a bill increasing the penalty for hauling without a valid Railroad Commission permit from \$50 to \$100. It was passed by the House and sent to the Senate.

H. J. R. 9, by Clayton, is a proposed Constitutional Amendment to eliminate the interest limitation on Texas Water Development bonds, to eliminate the termination date

and procedures for curtailment of financial assistance to various political subdivisions by the Texas Water Development Board, to extend the maturity schedules on Water Development bonds, to broaden the Water Development Board's power to contract for water resources and facilities, to broaden the Board's power to sell, transfer, and lease, and to raise the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds to \$3,500,000,000. This bill was passed by the House and sent to the Senate.

H. B. 472 provides that "Any person who shoots or discharges any gun, pistol or firearm in, on, along, or across, any public road in this state shall be fined not less than \$50 and not more than \$200. The present law calls for a fine of up to \$100.

Farm Bureau Legislative Newsletter

H. B. 583 by Ogg, and H. B. 628 by Jones, were bills introduced that provide for phasing out of Farm-to-Market Road funds over a period of 5 years, and transferring these funds to the State Highway Fund.

H. B. 652, by Wayne, is a bill providing for licensing of commercial applicators of agricultural chemicals. It provides for a licensing fee of up to \$75 for applicators who are residents of Texas. Out-of-State applicators would be charged a license fee of \$400 for the first unit of aerial equipment and up to \$100 for each additional unit. Out-of-State applicators would be charged a license fee of \$50 for the first unit of ground equipment and \$25 for each additional unit.

H. B. 294 was introduced by Jones of Lubbock, and provides that, "If a new variety of cotton is registered or

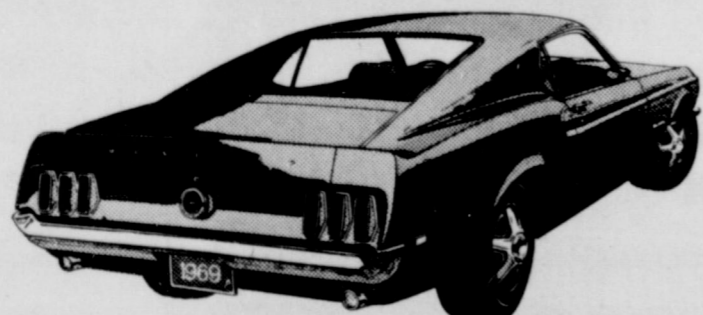

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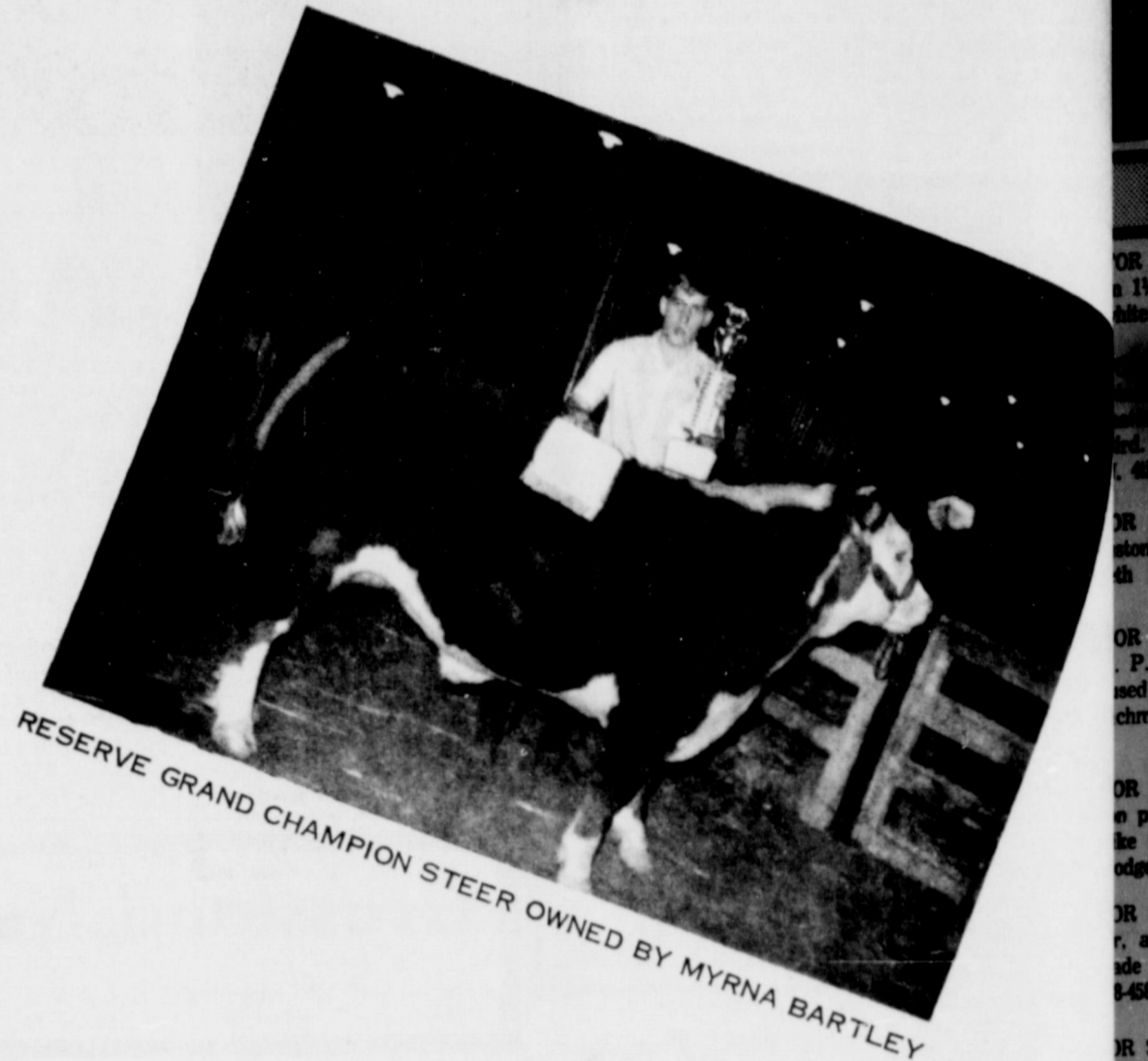

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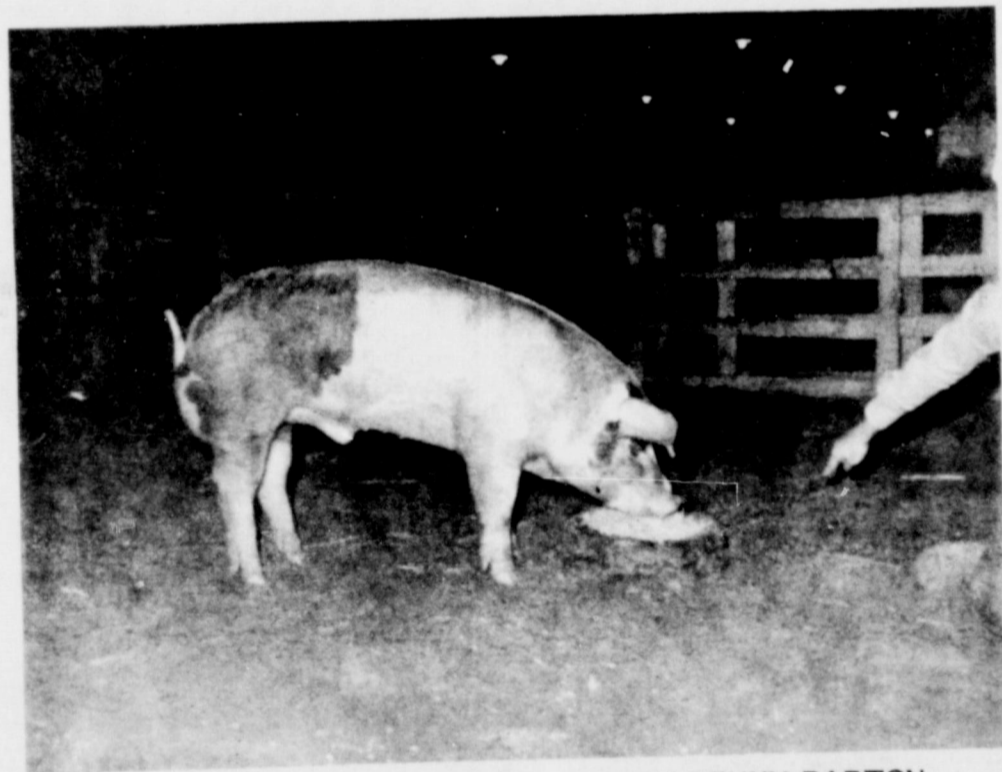


GRAND CHAMPION STEER OWNED BY BRITT BROOKS

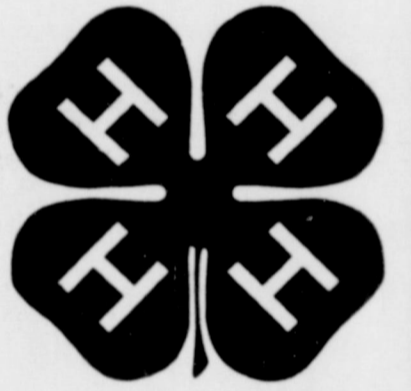

 Notice is here given as required by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 (Article 7542a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of riparian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to impound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all other claims of water rights other than claims under permits and certified filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules.
 On or before September 1, 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of

water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.

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
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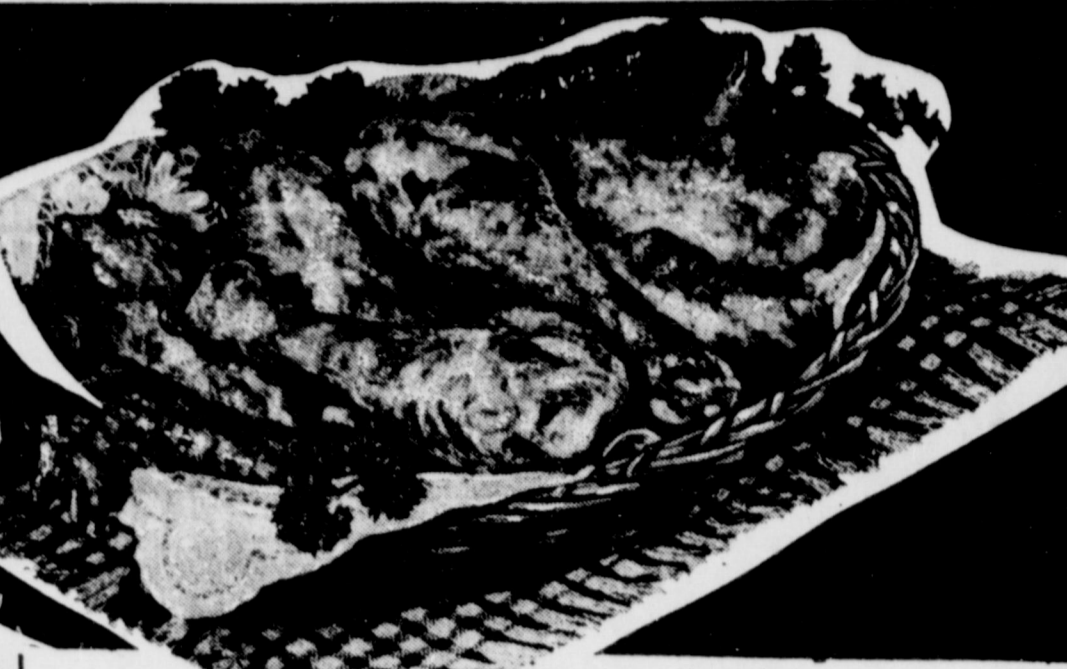
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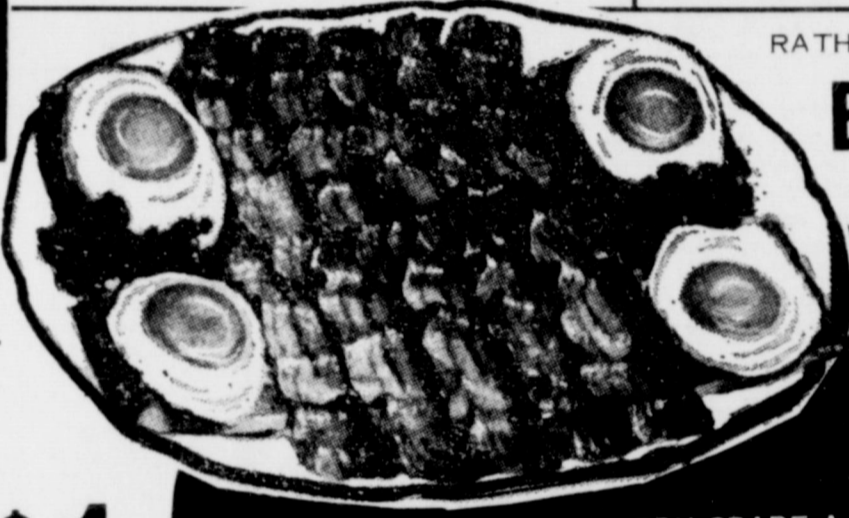
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
