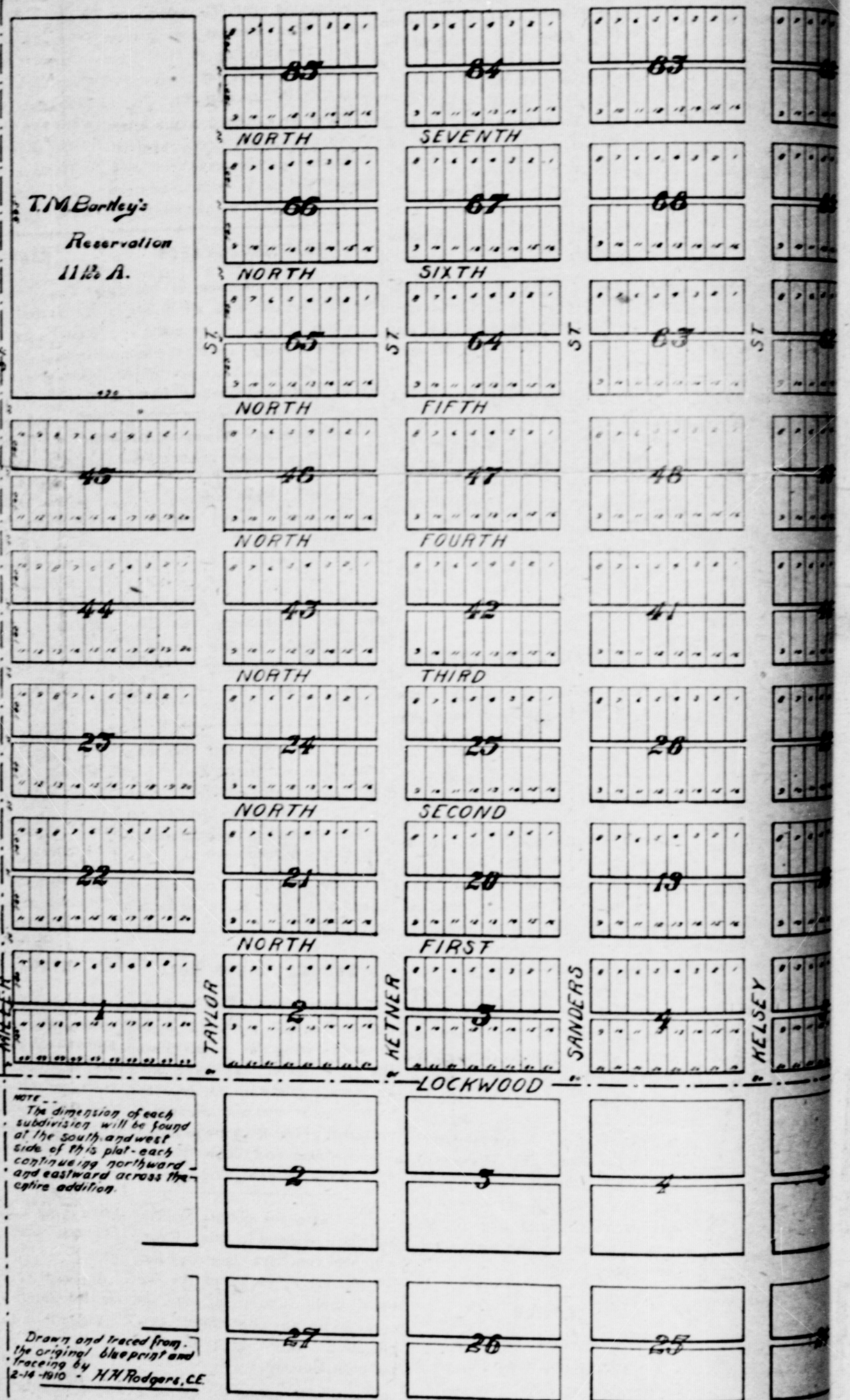

Mrs. Reno, of Abilene, come in the last of the week to visit her niece, Mrs. Henry, of Tahoka.

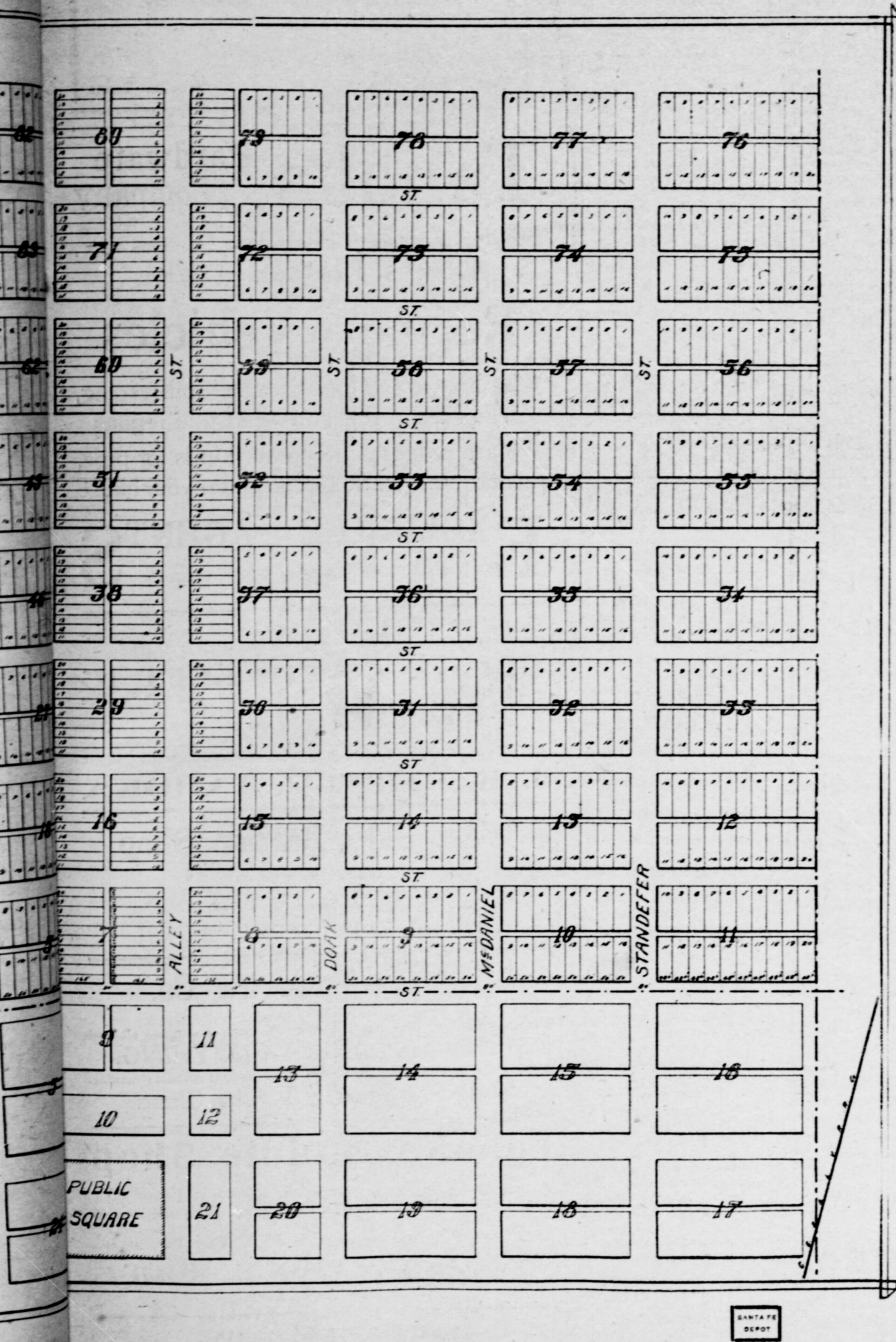

## Over Helped Children

A TIMELY DISCOURSE WHICH OUGHT TO BE FOLLOWED UP WITH PRACTICE

One of the unexplainable things which every teacher is compelled to witness with sincere regret is the constant effort on the part of many parents, strong in ability and character, because of having been compelled to win their own way in the midst of extreme difficulty, to remove all semblance of difficulty from the educational pathway of their children, by practically getting their lessons for them, thus robbing them of the chance to grow by their own efforts. In too many instances the benefits of home study are practically lost to the child because of the mistaken-kindness of an over-indulgent father and mother.

Many children of wealthy and prominent families turn out to be worthless in life because they are neither taught to work nor respect those who do work. If the public school insists upon honest efforts as the only condition of success, such children are usually withdrawn from it and placed in some fashionable private school where money is supposed to be able to purchase what the child is too lazy to learn. In all probability, the father worked his way through college, but the indolent son must be sent to the most expensive institution of learning the country affords; given all the money he wants, to be squandered as he sees fit, and, when vacation comes, has to be sent to some seaside resort to recuperate his exhausted energies for another season of educational effort.

Sometimes a child of real promise is spoiled by being made to feel that, because he is bright hard study is not necessary. Perhaps no more dangerous notion can enter the head of a young person than the notion that he can succeed by his wits without honest, persistent effort. Thomas Edison has been quoted as saying that success is made up of five percent ability and ninety-five percent of hard work. The probabilities of accomplishing something worth while in the world are much greater for the student who puts forth one hundred percent of effort in connection with seventy percent of ability, than for the one who has one hundred percent of ability but only seventy percent of effort.

Right here is a danger point in our school work. The tendency is to let down the standard of effort and assume that, if the child goes to school with remarkable regularity, he will absorb knowledge and the ability to use it. To guard against this fallacy, the home and school should unite in instilling the old-time lesson of the absolute necessity of old-fashioned hard work as the only means of getting an education which is to be of any use in practical life.

**ASPARAGUS CULTIVATION.**  
**How to Make a Bed of the Edible Young Shoots.**  
 Asparagus is a perennial herb cultivated for its edible young shoots. It is a rugged plant and will thrive under adverse conditions, but to obtain the succulent stalks needed for culinary purposes well drained, rich soil is absolutely necessary. The soil should be well mixed with rotted manures containing much nitrogen and potash.  
 Prepare the bed by plowing or spading deeply, beginning the work early and looking after the drainage problem carefully. Plants at least one year old should be obtained for this bed. They can be raised from seed, which is sown outdoors in April in drills one foot apart, the seed being covered about one-half inch. Plants suitable for transplanting the following spring may be easily grown this way, or roots may be obtained from one to three years old.  
 Set the plants in the permanent bed in furrows eighteen inches apart, the plants being the same distance apart in each furrow. Be careful to spread the roots out naturally and set each plant on a little mound of earth in the furrow. Cover at first to a depth of a few inches, gradually filling in as the season advances. In the fall cut back all the stalks to a level with the ground for the winter.  
 In the second year loosen the soil by shallow spading. When the first shoots appear the rows may be filled up somewhat. Cut sparingly until the third year, as the plants will be more productive afterward.

**How to Overcome Oily Hair.**  
 A young woman who has tried all sorts of remedies to keep the oil out of her hair says she gets best results by using a shampoo made from pure olive oil soap in which a pinch of soda has been mixed. Cut a cake of soap into a quart of boiling water to make thick jelly when cold. This is bottled and kept for future use. Before shampooing take a couple of spoonfuls of this jelly, mix it with a pinch of soda and rub it well into the scalp, which has first been wet with hot water. Another way to apply the shampoo mixture to the scalp is to part the hair in strands and rub it on with a toothbrush or small nailbrush. After the scalp and long hair have been well washed they should be rubbed vigorously with the finger tips and thoroughly rinsed.

**HOUSE DECORATION.**  
**How to Paper the Walls in an Attractive Manner.**  
 So many mistakes are made in the papering of walls that perhaps a few hints will not be out of place, as spring will soon be here, when repairs are being made everywhere.  
 Never paper the walls of a small room with large figures. No matter how pretty they are, the whole effect is likely to be crowded and very homely. If the room faces north, use a warm tone, never a blue or a gray or a green. Yellow is admirable in a dark room, and bright rose makes even a plain, dreary room look rich and inviting.  
 The fashion in dining rooms at present dispenses entirely with pictures. The walls are either covered with tapestry paper or done in paneled effects. Wainscoting is very much the fashion for those that can afford it.  
 If the chair covers and portieres are of figured material they require a plain paper, and vice versa. A plain paper is much better than a figured one for showing off paintings and engravings.  
 If the room is very high it is a good plan to do away with the frieze and to bring the ceiling tint down on the side walls at least eighteen inches, when the molding can be placed at the top of the wall paper proper.  
 The servants' rooms and the kitchen should be painted with a durable color, so that they can be scrubbed thoroughly with soap and water.  
 It is dangerous to trust the eye in matters of color; therefore the samples of upholstery materials should always be taken along when choosing the paper.  
**How to Clean Glass Water Bottles.**  
 To clean glass water bottles cut up a large potato fine and put it in the bottle with some warm water and shake it rapidly until it is clean. Some use shot and soda, but potato is even more effectual.
