How to Avoid

Automobile drivers, when approaching railroad crossings, should go into second speed. Then look and listen. Absolute control thus is assured. Stop or go ahead, as conditions warrant.

These regrettable accidents might have been avoided if these motorists had been careful.

The rapid increase in these grade-crossing accidents is due to the greatly in-creased and general use of the automobile in the hands of drivers ignorant or willfully disregardful of the perils which attend careless driving. Sometimes it is the careless driver alone who pays the penalty, but usually innocent ones pay it in part or entirely.

Automobiles should be safer at railroad crossings than horses, because they lost forever! You are urged to give this "Safety First" suggestion most earnest consideration. Better be safe than sorry.

During 1923 one hundred and three persons were killed and four hundred controlled; but the opposite seems to be seventy-four injured at highway crossings the case. An experienced driver of horses describes the proper method of approaching a railroad crossing asfollows: "Gather up the reins tight, take out the whip, and bring the horses to a walk." An experienced automobilist advises: "Always go into second speed."

The method is precisely the same in either case. The driver has absolute control, can stop or go ahead as conditions demand, and is alert to the situation.

If all drivers would but adopt this simple rule and adhere to it faithfully the problem would be solved. What a saving there would be of priceless human life, of griefuntold, ambitions wrecked, and hopes



Of the \$48,500,000 that has been collected in cash on the Baptist 75 Million Campaign to January 1, 1924, the sum of \$7,732,831.53 has gone to such benevolent work as caring for orphan children, healing the sick and ministering to aged, worn-out preachers, it is announced by the head-quarters of the Campaign.

More than half of the benevolent fund, or \$3,999,102 63, has gone to the 21 Baptist orphanages of the South, two of which have been established as a result of this movement and all of which have been greatly helped by this forward program. Nearly 4,000 orphan boys and girls are being housed, fed, clothed, educated and trained for Christian citizenship in these orphanages and the Campaign has put between \$800,000 and \$990,000 into the maintenance of these institutions each year. ROMANS USED SHORTHAND

Quintus Ennius Devised a System of Abbreviated Writing Two Centuries Before Christ.

Although shorthand is so widely used today, probably few people realize that, in a different form, it was popular in the days of ancient Rome

The first mention of an abbreviated system of writing is made in connec tion with the Roman poet Quintus En-nius, 200 B. C., who devised a scheme of 1,100 signs for his own use. Ther Plutarch's statement that Cicero's famous oration in the Roman senate, in 63 B. C., was reported in

References to shorthand were made in the works of Cicero, Horace and Pliny, and the poet Ovid bears testimony to the fact that by means of these characters Caesar's political secrets were borne far over land and sea. Evidence goes to show that the Sermon on the Mount was reported in

shorthand by St. Luke.

The writing was scratched onto tablets covered with a layer of wax. The tablets were afterward fastened to gether at the corners by wire, thus forming a sort of book.

Indian Canoe in Italy. The American Indian canoe, which for centur's has plied only the stream and lakes of the North American continent, has at last found its way to the classic "vellow Tiber." Canoeing has become a favorite river sport of the Romans. On Sunday a dozen or more of the fruil Indian craft can be seen in the yellow waters gliding along the shores in company with skiffs, shells, sculls and mot rhoats. 
