## Show at Denver.

The best judges of live stock in the country have been elected to pass upon the stock to be shown at the Western Live Stock Show January 29th to February 3d, 1906. T. B. Hord, one of the most extersive feeders of cattle in the world will judge feeder cattle. Thomas Cross, head cattle buyer for the National Packing Co., and judge of the fat cattle at the International at Chicago, will judge all classes of fat cattle. The single classes of sheep will be judged by Geo. McKerrow, president of the State Board of Agriculture in Wisconsin. Mr. McKerrow has won more prizes on pure bred sheep in the last ten years than any other exhibitor in America. Chas. Gray, secretary of the American Galloway Breeders Association, winner of the gold medal for stock judging at the Chicago International in 1902, will pass judgment on the Galloways. Overton Harris, a prominent Missouri breeder, will judge Herefords, and C. R. Thomas, secretary of the American Hereford Cattle Association, will have charge of this exhitit. Peter Jausen of Jansen, Neb, has been asked to judge the carloads of sheep, and Henry Gebhard, president of the Colorado Packing and Provision Co., will juage the carcass classes. The exhibits will e arranged conviently so that visitors may see and learn the most possible in the shortest time. The judging will take place in a heated pavilion.-Amarillo Herald.

FLYING SNAKE IN VIRGINIA.
Reptile with Wings, That Fed on Birds, Is Killed in King George.
Comorn, Va--A most remarkable and uncommon "flying snake" that was captured and killed at "Berry plain," the home of John S. Dickinson, in this county, a few days ago, has attracted wide attention.
The curious reptile was first noticed flying about in the air, presenting the appearance of an ordinary snake a taehed to a strange looking bird.
As far as is known, it never once descended to the earth and crawled on the ground after the manner of snakes, but it would occasionally allght in trees and catch such birds as best suited its fancy.
It was finally killed and proved to be five feet long and about one inch in diameter of body. It had wings of good size, covered with feathers.

## WAR NEWS BY WIRELESS.

## Fodting Adventurez of an Enghich Jowepaper Correspondent

 at Port Arthur.h wea an exelting story which Capt. Lonel James, a London Times war correspondent, told at the Soclety of Arts a few nights ago. It showed how useful a sorvant of journalism wireless telegraphy may be made in warfare, and it alco provided instances of the dangers incurred by the correspondent in making ues of it, says the London Mall.
Capt. James, giving a history of his experiences while sending news from the Times dispatch boat by means of the wireloss system, described how he witnessed a naval attack on Port Arthur, and how he found his boat in the middle of a Japanese torpedo flotilla.
"We determined to give the system a real trial," he said. "We commenced to send the message, which was 1,500 worde in length, to a station 130 miles away. The mossage was sent in four sections. At the end of the first section the operator on the ship listened in vain for a reply.

All excitement, was waiting in the operator's room to see if there was any result. For about five minutes the operator remained with the telephonic receivers glued to his ears, and then I saw a light gleam in his eyes. He was getting something. At last he took off the telephone and said in his quiet, the telephone and said in his quiet, will deliver the goode. Weinaiwal will deliver the gooda. Weinaiwal says that it is coming in like a drum. Then I knew that the syatem was suecess."
The Times diapatch boat, the Haimun, was fitted with the De Forest wireless apparatus, and a receiving station was erected near Weihaiwei, the first message sent being in relation to the landing of Kuroki's army. Capt. James sent it from a distance of 80 miles, and when he reached the station found, to his joy, that it was on its way to London. Then he went in quest of further adventure.
Arriving in the neighborhood of Port Arthur, he saw three battleshirs and two cuasers of the Russian fleet, and tmmediately sent a wireless message to Weihalwei, 75 milles away. After this came a run to Chinampo and a dash back to Port Arthur, where important events were pending. The dispatch boat arrived there just in time.
"Just as day was breaking the chlef officer on the Haimun wo:e me to say that the Japanese fleet was on our starboard beam. We had hut ofl ex actly, and keeping abreast of Togo's squadron, we witnessed the operations which cost the Russtan cause a irstclass battleship and Admiral Makaroff."
Here is a pascage telling of the perila of the war correepondent: "The Yellow sea, and especially that portion of it which it was cur custom to patrol, was alive with floating mines. Moreorer, the Russians, no doubt irritated by their misfortanes, had threatened both my self and my operators with a violent death if we should chance to fall into their hainde.
"The reason why the Times' sybtem ceased was because the Japanese naval and military authorities recognized that the existence of a posetble channel of leakage of milltary seecrets presented a flaw in their plan of campaign.
