# Parade Opens Frontier Days Fun

The annual Frontier Days Parade will begin the Frontier Days Rodeo activities at 5:00 p. m. today. The Tahoka Chamber of Commerce is in charge of this

year's parade with Farrell Murph as chairman. This year's big parade will feature floats, riding clubs, bands, other groups and Texas Tech's Charcoal Cody.

Many of the local businesses will have floats in the parade. J. M. Small reminds interested groups and individuals that there is still time to have an entry in the parade.

Four young ladies are competing for the title of 1969 Rodeo Queen and the queen will be selected as the one selling the most advanced tickets to the rodeo.

The first session of the 9th Frontier Days Rodeo will begin with the grand entry at 8 p. m. tonight. Other performances will be held tomorrow night and again Saturday night.

Contestants will be competing in several events with specialty and unusual events for boys and girls each night. The Wild West Rodeo stock is produced by Red Wattlely. Nightly events will include Wild Mare Race, Bareback Bronc Riding, Calf Roping, Saddle Bronc Riding, Bull Riding, Junior Ribbon Roping, and Barrel Racing.

Candidates are Donna Gunnells, sponsored by the Lions Club, Jimmye Dulin, Sheriff's Posse, Joni McNeely, Chamber of Commerce and Rhonda Ware, Tahoka Rotary Club.

Winding up the rodeo performance each night will be a big western dance at the Community Center.

Tahoka's businessmen are cooperating fully with the Tahoka Rodeo Association to make this year's rodeo celebration one of the best. All persons are asked to wear western attire during the three days of rodeo.

## New Warning Lights Going Up At Tracks

Workmen are in the process of installing new railroad crossing signals at the tracks in East Tahoka, on the Post Highway.

The signal lights are of the flashing type that swing down into position, when a train is approaching. When completed, the signal lights will eliminate a very hazardous accident area.

The project is something that had been requested over a period of years and has finally become a reality. Several accidents have been recorded in the past, as approaching trains were blocked from view, by industrial buildings on both sides of the highway.

The regular first grade students will attend school on this date. The orientation program for the parents will consist of addresses by the following:

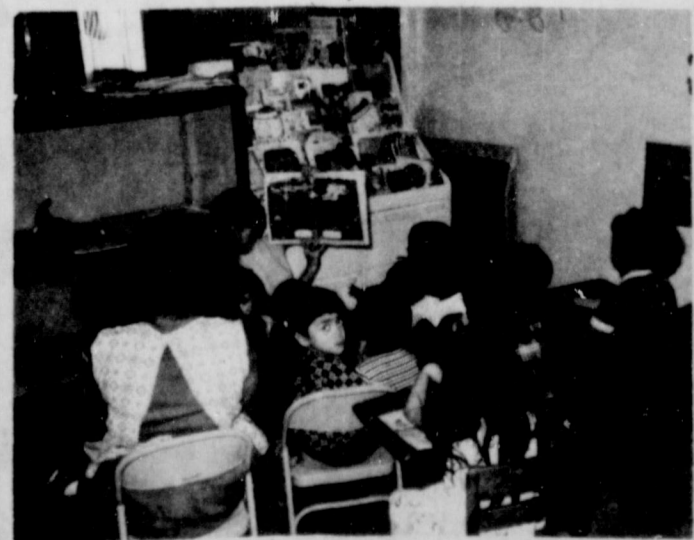
## Open House Set Sunday At Center

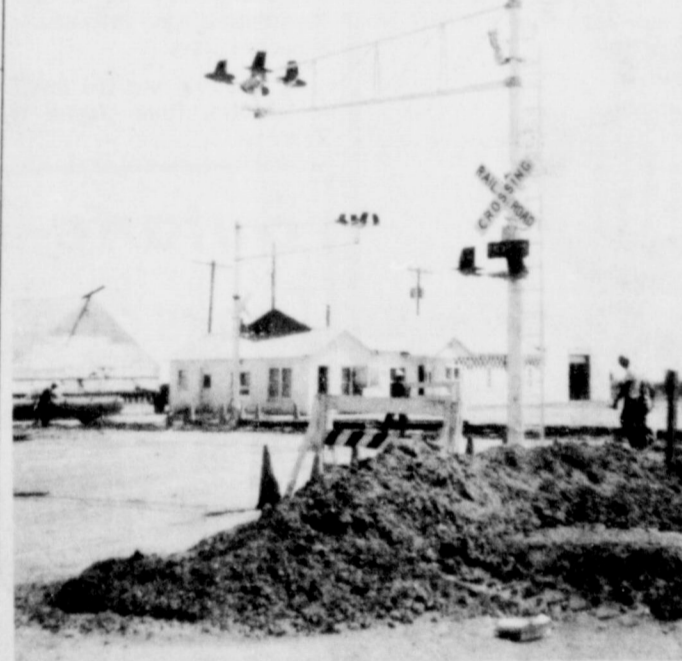
GROUP of youngsters are receiving class work at Lynn County Child Development Center. NEWS Photo

## Poko-Lambro Receives Grant

Word was received last week, from Senator John Tower and Representative George Mahon that Poko-Lambro Rural Telephone Cooperative Inc. was approved for an REA loan of \$240,000.

The Rural Electric Association approved the loan effective April 16, for the purpose of extending service to 19 new subscribers and constructing nine miles of new line. The loan was authorized under a prior REA loan.

Poko-Lambro is headquartered at Tahoka, managed by W. D. Harmon. They serve Lynn, Terry, and Dawson counties, listing 20 exchanges.



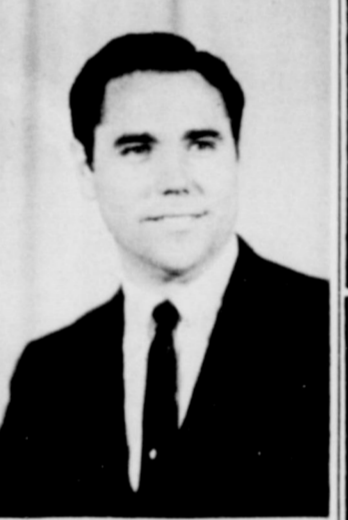

head. The vehicle was heavily damaged.

In 1968 there were six fatal accidents in Lynn County, killing seven persons. For 1969, there has been one fatal accident resulting in the death of one person, three involving injury and seven involving property damage, making a total of 11 for 1969.

In 1968, 89 accidents were reported to Austin in Lynn County, with only 38 investigated by the Highway Patrol. This means that either the accidents were investigated by other police agencies or were not investigated at all. According to state law, any driver involved in an accident involving injury or death must report the accident immediately. Also, if the damage is \$25.00 or more. All drivers involved in an accident must submit an accident report to Austin within 10 days. Failure to report an accident or send in the report is punishable by state law. Let's drive and watch for the other driver so as not to become involved in a traffic accident.

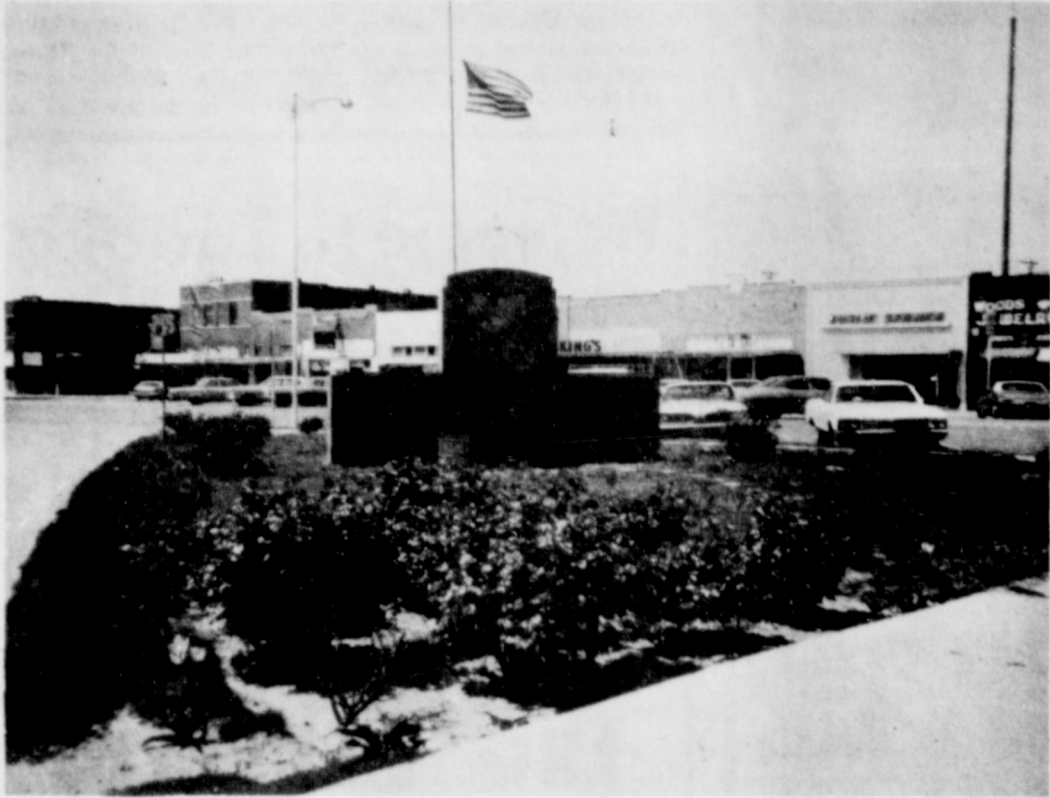

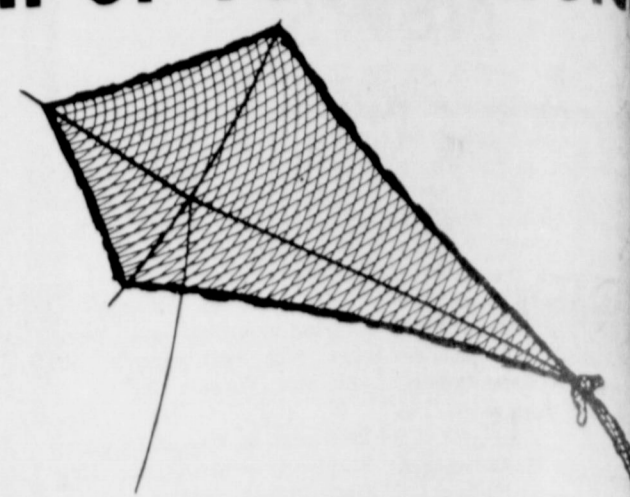

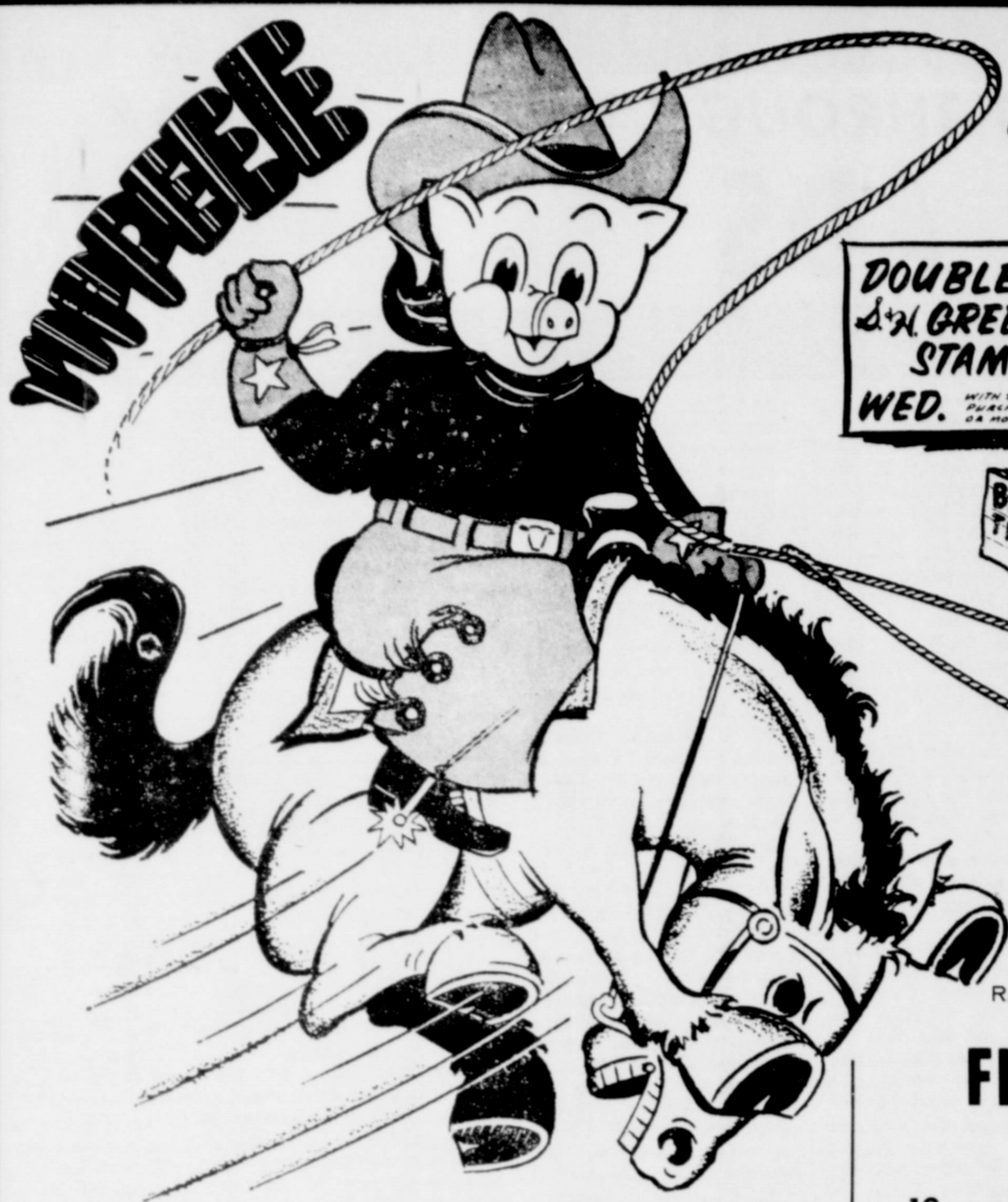
