Voters Asked To Approve Sales Tax For Tahoka

Sales Tax Vote Is This Saturday

Tahoka voters will go to the polls this Saturday, Feb. 3 to voice approval or disapproval of a city sales and use tax. The election will be held at the City Hall with the polls opening at 8:00 a. m., remaining open until 7:00 p. m.

Local residents living inside the Tahoka city limits and properly registered will be eligible to vote and city officials are hopeful for a good representation of registered voters and approval of the sales tax.

Several questions have been asked and the News office has asked help from City Hall in answering these questions. First, "Why can't the city get by on present revenues?" It probably could but would be unable to have a first class city. Revenue is not available to do the things that need to be done.

For example: Water costs will be twice as much when the city begins using water from the Canadian River Project. The 27¢ per thousand includes the city cost of repayment of the project, operating and maintenance cost plus the cost of water treatment.

The city has approximately 13 miles of paved streets which need seal-coating and maintenance and street improvement in the south part of town is a must.

Our present sewer plant, designed for 1500 people needs to be brought up to health department standards. One engineering estimate on the job was \$50,000.

A sanitary land fill operation has been started at the dump grounds but additional funds are needed to continue the operation and purchase a bulldozer for proper work at the fill.

Election Polls At City Hall Polls Open 8 a.m.-7 p.m.

It is believed that the water and sewer department and the sanitation department can continue to operate at the present income for the time being. The big problem is the General Fund operation of the city. This includes the police, fire and street departments and other services offered for which there is little income received.

Another question asked is, "What will I be getting for my money?" In addition to the above declared needs, Tahoka will become a better and more progressive city, a

better place to live, one financially able to give service that residents expect. Too, all money raised from the sales tax will be spent in and for the people of Tahoka, not in other areas of the state, nation or overseas like so much of our state and federal taxes.

The City Council is in agreement that the sales tax is the only fair way of distributing the city government cost to all who enjoy the municipal services. Actually it appears the only way to raise the amount of money

needed, as there is no desire to raise property tax or water rates. A sales tax means that everyone pays at least something toward the cost of running the city.

The property tax roll for 1967 was \$50,160.00, of which

In stating the needs of the city the council realizes that all of this cannot be done in the next year, with approval 47 per cent goes to pay General Fund obligation bonds, 53 per cent into the General Fund for operation. Other income to the General Fund includes franchise taxes, fines, farm rent, permits and other miscellaneous income. The budget for the past ten years shows the General Fund has been short approximately \$15,000. average. This shortage has to be transferred from the Water and Sewer Fund to the General to offset the deficit.

of the sales tax. However it will enable them to work out a program, knowing that finances will be available to complete the program over the next few years.

Approval of the sales tax does not necessarily mean that property taxes and water rates will be lowered, for at the present this is impossible.

Items taxed will be exactly the same as the present state sales tax, and exemptions will be the same. The tax, if passed would go into effect July 1, 1968 and will be collected by the comptroller, retaining 2 per cent of the total collections for administration costs and return the rest to the city of origin.

If you have other questions before going to the polls February 3, contact members of the council and they will attempt to supply the answers.

Cotton, Feed Grain, Wheat Program Sign-up Dates Are Announced

Sign-up dates for farmers in Lynn County who wish to take part in the 1968 cotton, feed grain, and wheat programs have been announced by Bertice Askew, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee.

All commodity program sign-ups will be held during the same period - February 5 through March 15. Sign-up applications indicate the farmer's program intentions, including the extent of his participation in the programs.

Under the feed grain and cotton programs for 1968, farmers may earn diversion and price-support payments as well as qualify for price-support loans. The wheat program provides price-support loans and marketing certificates to bring returns up to full parity on the part of the wheat crop allocated for domestic use; no diversion payment is available for wheat.

Water Program Presented At Rotary Club

Another program was presented at Tahoka Rotary Club Thursday noon on the gigantic California water project, this time by J. B. Potts, Post banker, who was one of 80 South Plainsmen making the trip last summer to the West Coast. His talk was illustrated with color slides.

The project includes a huge earthen dam in northern California, from which water is being pumped 440 miles to the south over a road through mountains in huge canals to the water scarce Bakersfield and Los Angeles areas.

Texans are studying this project, the biggest of its kind so far in the history of the world, with an eye to bringing water to West Texas and Eastern New Mexico from the Mississippi River.

About twenty years were required in California to get the public educated to the need of the project, the planning, and the building. The aqueduct system is now in the last stages of construction.

Fred McGinty was in charge of the program.

While the sign-up period for 1968 commodity programs will extend through 6 weeks, the chairman urged farmers who wish to take part in the programs to file their applications as soon as they decide on 1968 production plans.

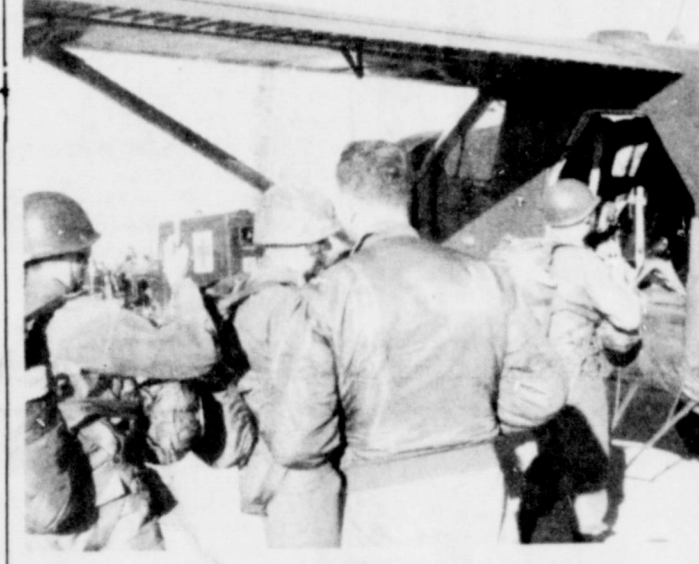

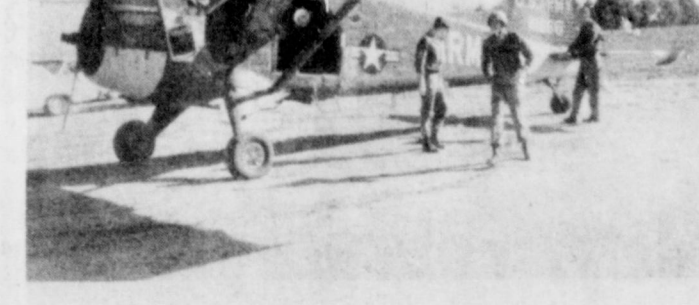
After a short briefing by safety officer Capt. Bo Wheeler of Claude, the 35 participating jumpers formed into groups of four and awaited their turns to go. Project of-

Cloudy Weather Delays Cotton Harvest In Co.

Cloudy, misty weather of the past week has further delayed harvest of late cotton in Lynn County but has given a chance for the snow and rain of the week before to soak deep into the soil of farm lands.

Most farmers are happy with this state of affairs because this is the first time in several years there has been sufficient winter moisture to put a deep season in the ground - for summer crops.

January rainfall in Tahoka totaled 1.87 inches, the most since January of 1949 when 3.94 inches of snow and rain were measured. Of this 1.87 inches, only .02 inch has been accumulated this week, but the damp weather has allowed the moisture which fell earlier to penetrate the soil to greater depths than it would otherwise.

Farmers estimate there are several thousand bales of cotton yet to be ginned, most of it in the south half of the county.

Texas Vehicle Registration Will Set State Record

AUSTIN - State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwell today announced that Texas will register approximately 7 million vehicles during 1968. "This is the largest number in our history," Dingwell said.

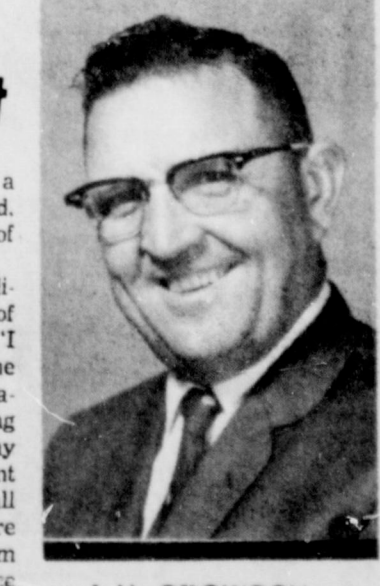
All 1968 Texas license plates have been delivered to the 254 County Tax Assessor-Collectors for issuance during February and March of 1968.

Of the estimated 7 million vehicles to be registered, the Texas Highway Department believes that 4.75 million will be passenger cars and 1.9 million will be commercial trucks and truck-tractors. Trailers and motorcycles will account for the balance.

The most dramatic increase is expected in the motorcycle category, based on the past two years' experience. While passenger car and commercial truck registration will increase about 3 1/2 per cent, motorcycle registration is expected to increase 16 per cent. This follows a 25 per cent increase in motorcycles in 1966 over 1965 and another 17 per cent increase last year.

Owners should bring four items to the Tax Collector's office when registering vehicles: certificate of title, 1967 license receipt, current resident address, and zip code.

State law requires each owner to register his vehicle in the county in which he resides and to present his certificate of title as evidence of ownership.

During the 1967 session the Texas Legislature amended the Texas Registration Law by changing passenger car license fees and establishing a minimum fee of \$5.30 for all vehicles, including boat trailers.

The new rates for passenger car are as follows:
Up to 3,500 pounds \$12.30
3,501 - 4,500 pounds \$22.30
4,501 - 6,000 pounds \$38.30
More than 6,000 pounds .55 per 100 pounds.

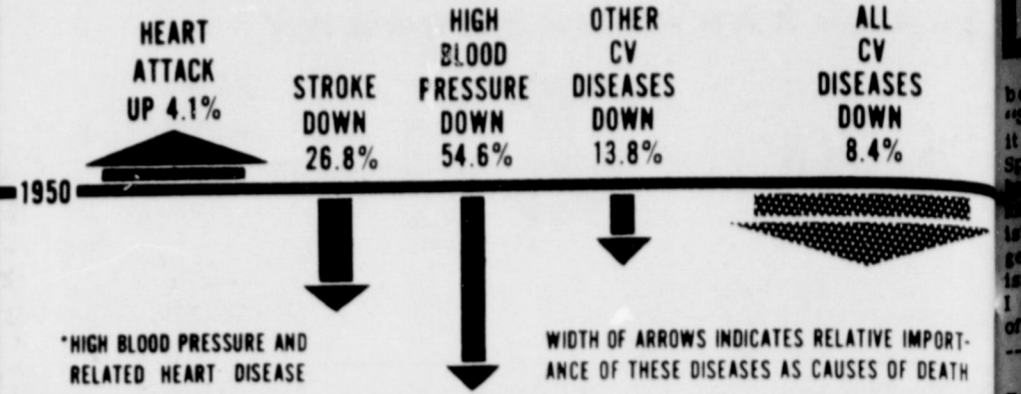

Cardiovascular Death Rate Among Men Aged 45-64 Shows Overall Drop of 8.4 Per Cent Since 1950



OVERALL DOWNTREND in cardiovascular death rate for American males aged 45-64 since 1950, is depicted in this chart. While deaths from heart attack gained 4.1 per cent those from stroke, high blood pressure and related heart disease and other cardiovascular diseases showed sharp declines. It was in 1950 that intensive research programs began with Heart Fund and federal tax dollars. The Heart Fund Campaign is continuing here and throughout the nation during February.

How To Safeguard Young Hearts

Heart attack is America's deadliest enemy, claiming about 500,000 lives yearly. While it strikes mainly in middle-age, or later, the time to start safeguarding against heart attack is early childhood, when life-long habits are formed. Good health and heart habits begun now can reduce later risk of heart attack.

Intensive research is going forward to find the causes of hardening of the arteries, which sets the stage for heart attack. Until this knowledge is available, physicians generally agree that the individual can do much to improve his chances of living longer by minimizing certain risk factors.

By setting a good example, parents can not only encourage their children to form risk-minimizing habits that may last a lifetime, but at the same time protect their own hearts.

Here are basic suggestions for parents:

1. Get the latest heart-saving facts and share them with your children. Your Heart Association has free literature on the role played by the heart and circulatory system in sustaining human life. Give children the facts they should know about heart attack, stroke, rheumatic fever and other diseases which attack this system.

2. Stress the importance of normal weight. Obesity often begins in youth.

3. Form good diet habits by serving more unsaturated fats (mostly vegetable oils) in place of saturated (mostly animal) fats, and fewer foods rich in cholesterol.

4. Encourage them to keep physically fit through regular exercise, and, if possible, make regular and moderate physical activity a family affair.

5. Teach children that smoking is bad for health. Don't smoke yourself. Promote a type of self-discipline which

will encourage the child not to start smoking.

6. Make doctor check-ups family routine.

Risks of heart attack, of course, increase with age. Males are more vulnerable than females. Some families seem to be more predisposed to heart disease than others. These three factors—age, sex and genetic inheritance—cannot be controlled. But you can control the factors already mentioned and thereby improve your risk.

Take the middle-aged man with three major risk factors going against him—high cholesterol level in the blood, high blood pressure and excessive cigarette smoking. Chances of incurring a heart attack are more than ten times greater than a man of the same age with none of these disadvantages.

Generally, the same risk factors applying to children also apply to parents. High blood pressure—much more common in adults than children—

NEW system of parallel terraces cost shared under GPCP, designed and laid out by LaMesa Soil Conservation

Parallel Terrace Maintenance Is Important Farm Operation

The maintenance of parallel terraces poses a different problem than the upkeep of conventional terraces, says Blake Lovelace of the Soil Conservation Service. Parallel terraces have been constructed from the back side and there are internal blocks to maintain.

The internal blocks in the terraces are essential parts in the system and must be kept up to be effective. A scraper or blade behind a farm tractor is the best tool for repairing breaks and keeping the height on the blocks. Since farming operations go over blocks, this build up needs to be an annual affair. The end closure on the ends of the terraces must be kept up in the same way.

The objective in the maintenance of parallel terraces should be to make the system of terraces as level as possible. This involves moving the soil down hill by plowing or floating. This fills the front channel as the terrace interval is leveled. The terrace ridge will have to be raised in order to be effective. A continuous plow-up on the backside of the terrace appears to be the most effective method of maintenance.

Maintenance of parallel terraces must become an important part of the farmer's operation each year since low terrace heights or weak places in the system can run a field during a heavy rain. Lovelace says.

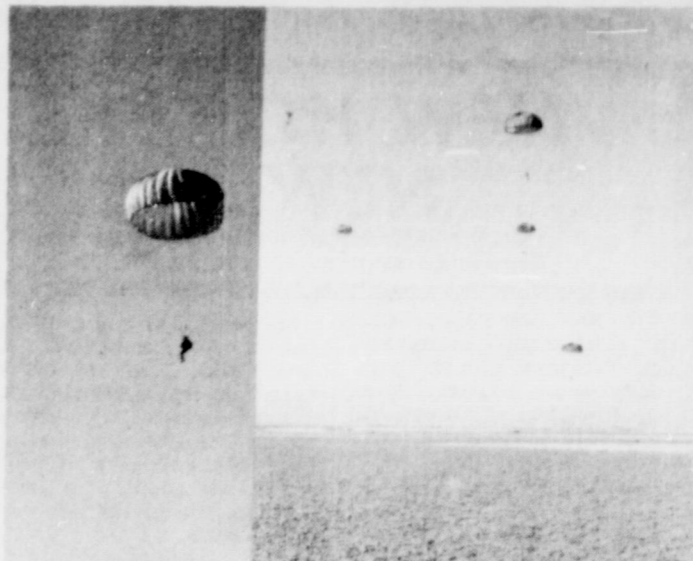
C. of C. Farmer-Businessman Banquet Is Tuesday, Feb. 20

Kleingrass Popular in This Area

Kleingrass is becoming very popular in this area and over the state, says Blake Lovelace of the Soil Conservation Service.

Mr. J. L. Scott planted the first planting of Kleingrass in Lynn County in 1958. He secured the seed from the Soil Conservation Service who received the seed from South Africa in 1951 and did observational work with it at their nursery in San Antonio.

Scott originally planted 3 acres. At the present time he is growing 20 acres of Kleingrass. Scott says the grass has shown no signs of freezing out and has proven to be very drought resistant. It is

also good around lakes he says. In 1967 he had Kleingrass that was under water twice. The first time about 2 weeks and the second time about 5 weeks. Most of the grass still had some top above the water. There was no damage to the Kleingrass. Western wheat grass planted in the same area drowned out during the same period.

Scott is growing Kleingrass mainly for seed production. He is interested in selling seed mostly to people who will plant it for seed production. There is a large demand for the seed and very few seed are available in the state. Lovelace says.

How To Safeguard Young Hearts

Good dietary habits are extremely important to children. In planning meals, mothers should go beyond the simple and obvious requirement of providing enough food to sustain growth and energy requirements.

Equally important is the need to encourage maintenance of normal weight, and to establish dietary habits which tend to lower cholesterol levels in the bloodstream. According to informed medical opinion, lower cholesterol levels retard the onset of atherosclerosis, or hardening of the arteries, a disorder which helps to set the stage for heart attack and stroke.

Anything the homemaker can do to get children started in the proper dietary habits can be of great advantage in the adult years when they become increasingly vulnerable to heart attack. But the degree of vulnerability can be changed by minimizing the risk factors. The sooner good dietary habits are begun, the better the youngster's chances of avoiding or delaying a heart attack in his or her adult years.

What mothers should remember in planning meals are these three simple rules:

1. Replace saturated fats in your diet with polyunsaturated fats as much as possible. Polyunsaturated fats are largely liquid vegetable oils such as corn, cottonseed, soy-

bean and safflower oils. Fish and poultry also contain polyunsaturates. This type of fat tends to lower blood cholesterol.

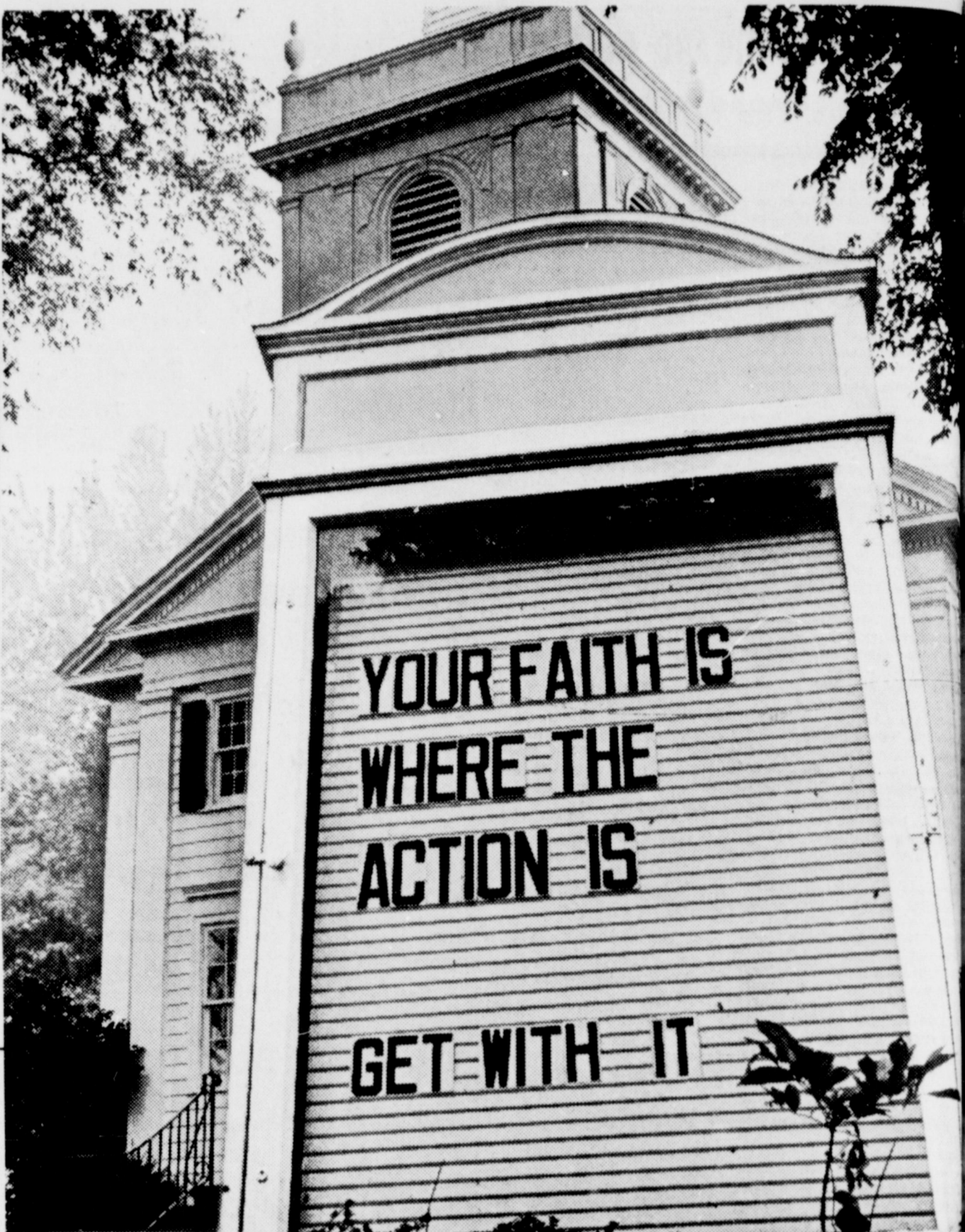
The goal in regulating fat in the diet is to raise the proportion of polyunsaturates to saturated fats. For example, one can eat more fish and poultry in place of meat. Use of skimmed milk in place of whole milk and cream is advisable as a valuable source of nutrients. In cooking, use vegetable oils instead of butter and lard.

2. Eat less food that is high in cholesterol.

Cholesterol is a substance which our bodies manufacture and which is also present in the foods we eat. It is found in large quantities in egg yolks. Shellfish and organ meats (such as liver and kidney) contain high amounts of cholesterol. When we take in more cholesterol than our bodies need, the excess may be deposited in the arteries and may add to the build-up of atherosclerosis.

3. Count calories, remembering that obesity often begins early.

Regulate the quality and quantity of the food eaten by your children so that they will be neither overweight nor underweight, but rather at normal weight. Diet changes should never be drastic. A balanced diet is necessary for good health.

**Bill Griffin,
County Agent,
Says**

No longer do commercial growers and home gardeners have to contend with root knot nematode infested tomatoes, says County Agent, Bill Griffin. A multiple disease-resistant tomato called Nematex is now on the market which combines nematode resistance with resistance to several other damaging tomato diseases.

Nematex, he says, is a fresh market tomato which moderately sized fruit and is widely adapted to the tomato growing areas of Texas. Nematex is not recommended for use in areas where a premium is placed on large fruit, but is recommended for home gardeners.

Nematex was developed by the Plant Diseases Experiment Station at Yoakum, for use in all areas of Texas.

Commercial plant producers, and especially those growing plants for home gardens should consider providing transplants of Nematex for 1968 use. Commercial growers in areas where production is limited by nematodes, and the market does not demand a large fruit should also consider use of the new variety, advises Griffin.

Producers who receive agricultural payments in behalf of other persons, or that share payments with other persons must notify the Internal Revenue Service by attaching form 4347 to their income tax reports.

Agricultural program payments to joint payees are reported by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service to the IRS by the identifying number of the person receiving the payment.

The new electronic data processing procedures the ASCS reports will be matched with the individual tax report and the IRS expects the reports to match unless the form 4347 has shown the division of payments.

The form 4347 can be obtained from the local post office, tax office or the district of the IRS.

Farmers tax guides are available in our office.

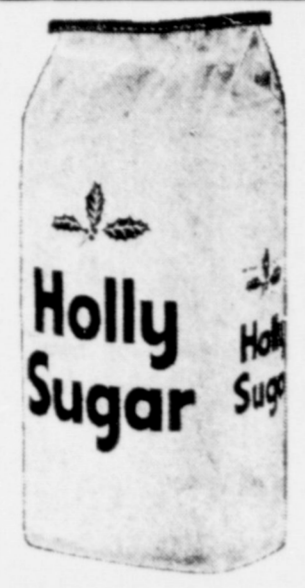
