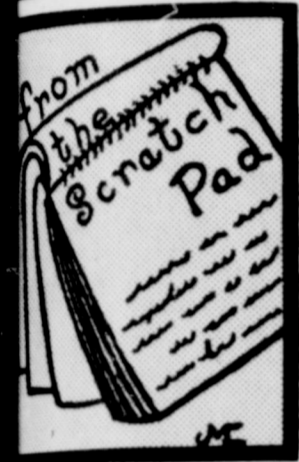

## 37-Year Teaching Career Ends With '68 School Term

Mrs. John A. Roberts, Tahoka school teacher is retiring after 37 years of teaching, of which 25 years have been in the Tahoka school system. Mrs. Roberts' Tahoka career began in 1942.

Prior to coming to Tahoka, she taught 12 years in various Texas schools. Three years of service was spent in rural schools of Scurry County. One year at Hudd, a one teacher ranch school with 12 pupils; two years in a two-teacher school at Knapp; four years in the public schools at Snyder; one year in the Anson schools and four years in the public schools of Slaton.

Mrs. Roberts, Rhoda, attended college at North Texas State, Denton; West Texas State, Canyon and Texas Tech, Lubbock. She married John A. Roberts in 1927. Mr. Roberts was principal at Anson High School for ten years. He also

served as head of the Tahoka science department for 10 years and is now engaged in farming. They have two daughters, Doris and Margaret. Mrs. Roberts was out of the teaching profession for eleven years raising her family.

Doris, married to Ralph Laswell, is teaching in San Angelo and her husband is in the science department in the schools there. Margaret is married to Rev. Robert Tucker, a foreign missionary to Venezuela.

Mrs. Roberts said, "When God called me to teach, it was a clear-cut definite call. The knowledge of being in the center of His divine will has made my life both rich and rewarding. My only regret is that I do not have another life to give to boys and girls in the classroom. In teaching them to read, I've given them a tool for life that cannot be taken from them."

"I am grateful for the opportunity afforded me by the School Board of Education in Tahoka. It has been a blessed privilege to serve here. I thank them for their confidence in me through the years."

## Local School Board Met Monday Night

Members of the Tahoka School Board met in special session Monday night to conduct business in several areas of education.

A proposed reading program was presented for

members in elementary, grades 1 through 3. This program approaches somewhat of a non-graded idea of operation.

The 1968-69 athletic budget was approved, totaling \$10,822. Also approved was employment and resignations of personnel.

Mrs. Melvin Burk was hired for Social Study in Junior High. Approved for High School Math was Mrs. Shirley Owens. The board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Shultz, Junior High Social Study.

Approval was given for the Tax Evaluation Engineering firm of Pritchard and Abbot of Odessa to evaluate cotton gins and grain elevators into the utilities and oil evaluation.

## State Vegetable Grower To Meet For Short Course

College Station, May 16 - The Texas Greenhouse Vegetable Growers Council will meet for its annual short course and conference on June 24-25 at Texas A & M University.

Dr. John E. Larsen, A & M Extension horticulturist and secretary of the Council, said the conference provides a meeting place for producers to exchange ideas and pick up the latest information from research.

Conference emphasis will be on new developments in greenhouse tomato production.

One of the speakers will be Merle H. Jensen, Extension associate of vegetables crops at Rutgers University. Jensen will speak on use of peat and vermiculite as a rooting medium in trough and ring cultures in greenhouse tomato production.

On Monday, a short course for new growers will include seven speakers. Topics will cover fumigation, insect, and disease control, fertilizers, harvesting, marketing, and structures.

Various greenhouse supply and equipment dealers will exhibit their products at the overall meeting which begins at 8 a. m. June 24 in the Texas A & M Memorial Student Center.

The short course and conference is sponsored by Texas A & M in cooperation with the Texas Greenhouse Vegetable Growers Council.

## Installation Is Saturday Night

South Plains College, Levelland, will hold its tenth annual commencement in the new Texan Dome at 10 a. m. Friday, May 31. Wearing the traditional cap and gown and marching to the improvised platform for their diplomas will be 131 graduates.

According to the Lynn County Sheriff's Office, the accident occurred Sunday evening near the entrance to the Harold Dean farm in the Wayside area.

Deputy Sheriff Woody said the child apparently was hit by a car driven by his mother, and was taken to a Lubbock hospital by private vehicle.

Funeral services are today (Wednesday) at 2 p. m. at the Mt. Zion Baptist Church in New Home, with burial in Tahoka Cemetery. White Funeral Home is in charge.

South Plains and Panhandle anglers will have a chance at a real fighting game fish, the Northern Pike, starting May 29th.

Greenbelt Lake at Clarendon advertised as Texas' newest virgin lake, will open to the public on May 29th with a gala celebration scheduled to run through the Memorial Day weekend.

Spring fed Greenbelt is now one half full and covers 500-600 acres. Lake officials estimate the lake will contain some 34,000 acre feet of water when the lake reaches full capacity. A three inch rain is needed over the Greenbelt watershed to bring the lake up to the desired level.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Inland Fisheries Biologists stocked Greenbelt with North-

ern Pike as an experiment. The Pike are now a year old and average about 4 pounds. Biologists are extremely happy with the 4 pound annual growth rate of the Pike.

Bass fishermen will be in for a pleasant surprise as some Greenbelt Bass are already up to 2 1/2 pounds. This writer witnessed several Bass catches by the biologists and all went over the pound mark. Bass were hitting the "Slim Fin" and "Silver Spoon" lures. Pike seemed to favor the "Red and White Spoon" and "Hawaiian Wiggler" lures.

One word of caution on Pike fishing. Be sure to use steel leaders as this terrific fighter will break an ordinary leader in no time.

Boat races, a ski show, fishing tournament, an art show, and a beauty contest are scheduled for the lake's grand opening.

The Clarendon Chamber of Commerce, merchants, and the Sherwood Shores No. 3 Corporation are sponsors of the lake opening. Merchandise prizes totaling \$1000. will be awarded to event winners.

Greenbelt Lake is located six miles north of Clarendon on Highway 70. Permit fees run either on a daily or season basis. Daily it will cost you \$1 per head to fish and \$1 for your boat. Season permits (one year) are \$10 per person to fish, (all over 14 years of age), and \$20 for your boat.

## Tony Romeo Will Speak At New Home Baptist Service



Mr. Anthony L. (Tony) Romeo, tight end for the Boston Patriots, will be the guest speaker for a series of services at the New Home Baptist Church during the week of June 3-9.

Tony Romeo was born in St. Petersburg, Fla., in 1938. When he was six years old, the Romeos moved to Tampa, Fla., and it is called "home". Tony attended Hillsborough High School. There he was an outstanding athlete. In football he was named to the 1956 All-America High School team and All Star Team. Also, he broke track records, and played basketball. His fellow students honored him by electing him a member of the student council. When he was graduated, No. 38, Romeo's football number, was placed in his high school's Hall of Fame.

Florida State University signed him to a football scholarship and he enrolled in the Fall of 1956. He received a Bachelor of Arts degree with a business major in 1960. With a year of eligibility remaining, Tony entered graduate school and continued his athletic career. During 1958, as a sophomore, Tony was selected for All-American honors. Three years later he was the captain of his college team.

While attending Florida

State, Tony organized a chapter of Fellowship of Christian Athletes which grew to more than 100 members. He was a member of Phi Kappa Alpha, Alpha Kappa Psi, and Gold Key.

From the first string on the "Devil's Team" to the front lines on the Christian conflict is the dramatic story of Tony. He has been telling the story near and far since 1958 when he became a Christian.

Whether it is before a group of 3,000 at Ridgecrest Baptist Assembly, or before 1600 young people at Tremont Baptist Temple, Boston, Mass., or before only one person, he is thrilled to tell what Christ has done for him. He is married to the former Sabra Briggs of Charlotte, North Carolina. She is an accomplished soloist and is studying music at Southwestern. Also, she was a member

of the Baptist Hour Choir out of Fort Worth, which is nationally known. Now she is soloist for Tony's many revival meetings.

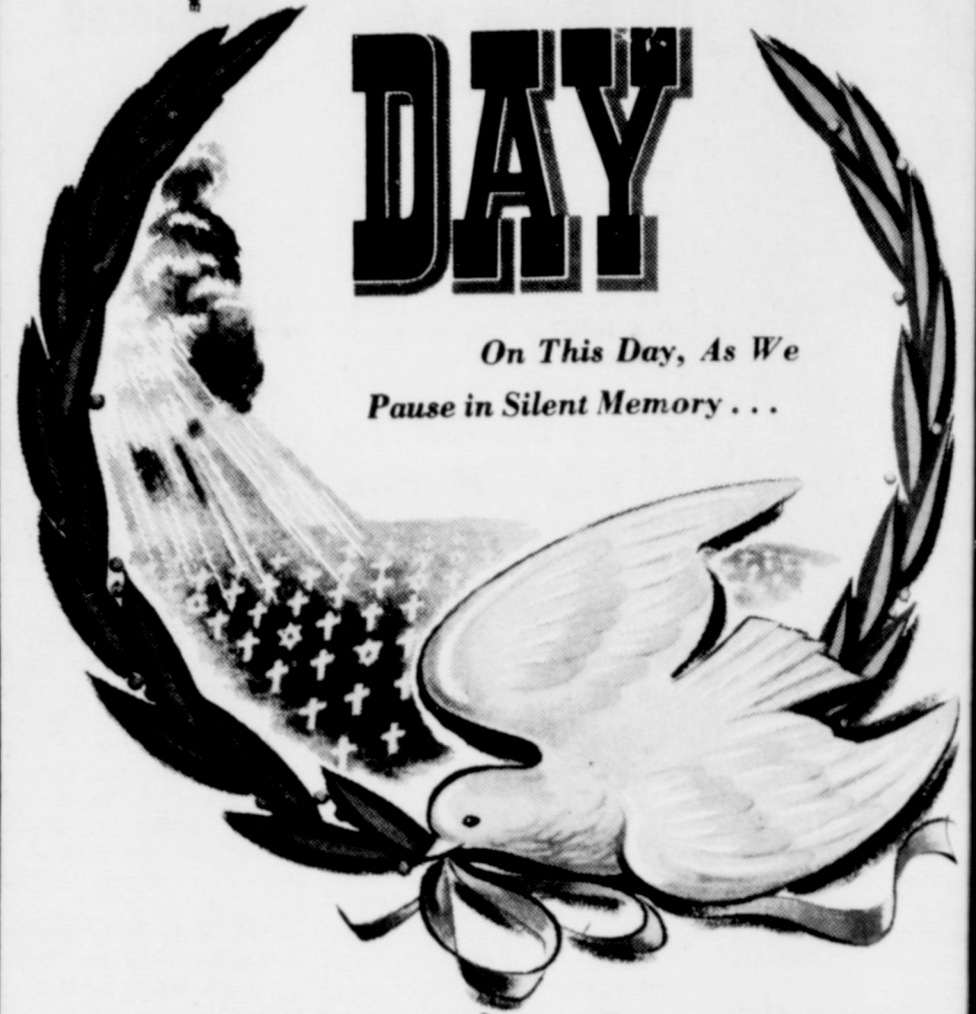
