



Bath-Towel Combing Jacket



bath towel and heavy mercerized cotton yarn are needed to make a pretty combing jacket like that shown in the picture. These practical and familiar things of sturdy quality are wrought into many articles for personal use and for furnishings. The bedroom slippers shown with the jacket are crocheted of mercerized yarn, and the two make the sort of gift that one friend likes to receive from another

A long bath towel with blue and black broken stripes on a white ground was chosen for the jacket pictured. It is a very simple matter to convert a towel into a jacket. The towel is folded crosswise at the middle of its length, and a slash six inches long cut for the neck. A slit is cut from this neck opening to the bottom of the towel to form the front opening. All the raw edges are finished with a hem a half-inch wide.

The mercerized cotton yarn used for the crocheted edge matches the blue stripe in the towel in color. Wide lingerie ribbon, in blue satin with a small figure, is used to make the bows that tie the fronts and back of the jacket together under the arms. Ties of the same ribbon are used for the fastening at the front. When the jacket is worn the edges below the neck are turned back to form revers.

The uppers for the slippers are iron.

Nothing more pretentious than a big | crocheted with close set firm stitches and sewed to the soles with silk thread. They are finished with bows of ribbon like that on the jacket. In slippers and jackets of this kind there is much comfort, for they are durable and practical and dainty as well.

Proper Care of Sow at Farrowing Time Is Essential.

Animal Should Be Placed in Pen by Himself and Fed Ration High In Protein and Rather Laxative -Careful With Bedding.

Farrowing time is one of the most mportant times of the year for the breeder of swine. Often a man destroys his chances of success by neglect at this time. While the number of pigs a sow farrows is important, the FOR DISTRICT JUDGE, 79TH JUDI number she raises determines whether, she is being kept at a profit or loss. A sow that tarrows five pigs and raises all of them is more profitable than one which farrows fifteen but raises only two or three. The disposition of the sow has much to do with the number of pigs she will raise, but proper care at farrowing time is also an important factor.

A week or so before she is due to farrow, the sow should be removed from the other sows and placed in the quarters where she is to farrow. It is best to feed her a ration high in protein and rather laxative in its nature, similar to the feed she is to receive while suckling her pigs. At the Missouri agricultural experiment station good results have followed the use of a ration of corn, 50 per cent; shorts, 25 per cent; bran, 15 per cent; and linseed oil, 10 per cent-all by



weight. As the farrowing date come closer the ration should be reduced somewhat. This will bring the sow up to farrowing time in good condition. She will not be so feverish and restless, so there will be less danger of her mashing her pigs when she far-

An important precaution to be observed in caring for the farrowing sow is not to supply her with too much pedding; a bushel of wheat chaff or cut straw is good. If the place where the sow is to farrow is warm it will not be needed for warmth. The dan ger of supplying too much bedding is that the pigs will be covered by it and be smothered or crushed. It may be necessary to change the bedding after the sow farrows, but the amount

The less a sow is disturbed at far rowing time the better, and for that reason she should be kept separate from the other hogs. While someone should be on hand, unless she needs assistance it is best to keep away from her. It it does become necessary to help her, do it as quietly as possi-

The pigs should not be chilled be fore they have dried off and suckled, so If the weather is cold, a lantern hung in the top of the cot will be of serv ice. If the sow is gentle, it is well to take each pig away from her as soon as it is farrowed, and place it in a box or barrel containing some hot bricks covered with old sacks. After the pigs have dried off and are lively enough, they may be put with the sow. In case the pigs do become chilled, the best way to revive them is to dip them in hot water.

As the pigs are not able to take much milk, the flow should not be stimulated for a few days. Give the sow plenty of water, as she is in a fe verish condition, but take the chill off of it if the day is cold. It is not nec eseary to feed the sow for a day of two, and the first feed given should consist of a small amount of thin slop which should be gradually increased as the pigs become able to take more milk. In two weeks' time she should be on full feed, which should consist of a good, laxative, milk-producing feed. There is no better way of feeding the pigs than through the mother, so feed the sow for the greatest amount of milk.

Bureau of Plant Industry Recom mends Combination of Sweet and Field Varieties.

According to the bureau of plant Industry, there is an opportunity to avoid the corn ear worth by combining into a uniform strain the sweet seeds and prolific habit of sweet corn with the long, harsh hosks of south ern varieties of field corn, thus producing a variety of sweet corn as resistant to the corn worms as the southern varieties of field corn.





DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION SIDELIGHTS

One of the most interesting features of the recent Democratic convention at St. Louis is the fact that it took lovely woman to force the only roll call demanded on the national platform, as well as to inspire the only real excitement that marked the convention.

"Votes for Women" was the issue that stirred up things. The Mexican plank, nailed in at the last minute by the platform builders, did not create a ripple. "Americanism" and "preparedness" received polite evations, but it remained for the woman suffrage plank to start a real fraces.

Headed by Gov. Ferguson of Texas, the antis endeavored to wrench the suffrage plank from the platform. But President Wilson's feelings on the subject, as presented to the convention by Senator Walsh of Montana, were not to be ignored. And so, after a three-hour battle in which the term "political expediency" was used with telling effect, the antis were routed by a vote of 88814 to 18114.

The vote, however, does not tell the real story of the battle, which was one of the most vigorous and picturesque ever staged at a national Democratic convention. Fifteen women delegates fought from the floor on the side of the pro-suffragists, while hundreds of their sisters waved yallow pennants and cheered them on from the balconies. A thunderstorm that almost drowned out the voices of the delegates as they answered the roll call brought both the suffrage battle and the convention to a most melodramatic finish.

inspired Gov. Perguson of Texas to mount the platform in the Coliseum and read a minerity report withholding the party support from the ladies who want the vote. That the Democratic party should scorn the political exigencies of the situation and defy the 12 western states in which women vote was the burden of his argument. Sharing the same opinion with him were C. L. Bartlett of Georgia, Stephen B. Fleming of Indiana and 'Jim" Nugent of New Jersey, the oldtime enemy of Bresident Wilson. This trio signed the minority report with the Tegan.

Lined up sgainst Gov. Ferguson, who acted as spokesman for the minority, were Senator Stone of Missouri, Senator Pittman of Nevada and Senator Walsh of Montana.

Senator Walsh did not mince matters in his argument for the adoption of the suffrage plank. He stated plainly the adoption of the plank was necessary as a matter of political expediency, adding that the present political situation in this country was a condition and not a theory.

"The states in which women vote control 21 votes in the electoral college," he said, adding significantly, "every political party has declared for woman suffrage in some way or other. It becomes a simple question whether you will incur the enmity of these

women.

MAIL BOX THAT IS NEAT

Californian Has the Right Idea in the Erection of Receptacle at His Country Home.

Arrangement of Street Lamps.

A recent investigation of the relative merits of parallel and staggered errangement of street lamps is most interesting, since it discloses that from an ornamental viewpoint the former is preferable, while, from a utilitarian viewpoint, the latter is preferable under certain conditions. By parallel arrangement is meant the placing of lamps so that they come opposite each other, while staggered arrangement means that the lamps on one side of a street are placed so as to come half way between those on the opposite side. In general, the staggered arrangement furnishes more uniform il-However, where the street width is not much greater than the distance between lamp standards. the parallel arrangement is preferable. In instances where the street width is considerably greater than the spacing of the lamps, the staggered arrangement will give the best results .- Sci

In conclusion, Senator Walsh said that he revealed no secret when he said President Wilson knew all about the suffrage plank.

"The president believes it vital to his success that it stay in the platform," he said. "I ask you in all the fervor of my soul, who is there wiser or more patriotic than he?"

Following Senator Walsh's speech, Gov. Ferguson was allowed five minutes for rebuttal. The vote was then taken and his minority report voted down, after which the original suffrage plank, as approved by the resolutions committee was unanimously adopted.

The Women Delegates.

The presence of the 15 women delegates at the Democratic convention not only added color to the affair, but changed the views of a number of the men delegates on the subject of political activity for women. For the women delegates were a fine, wholesome-looking lot and they fought just as enthusiastically for the best inter-

ests of the party as the men.

Three of them, Miss Mary E. Foy of California, Mrs. T. S. Tulliaferro of Wyoming, and Mrs. W. A Harris of Kansas, spoke before the resolutions committee in favor of the suffrage plank which the National American Woman Suffrage Association presented to the convention.

One of the other delegates, Mrs. Teresa E. Graham, of Idaho, was nominated by the National Democratic committee to be one of the committee that will notify Vice-President Marshall of his nomination.

MAKING USE OF LIMESTONE

Interesting Results of Professor Trueman's Experiments on Nova Scotia College Farm.

In regard to the use of limestone, the results of Professor Trueman's experiments on the Nova Scotia college farm are of interest. One experiment was with clover, two halfacre plots of which averaged 1½ tons more clover per acre on limed areas than on adjoining unlimed plots. However, on a very rich piece of land where the same experiment was tried practically no difference was noted, and on the very poor areas the difference was very small indeed.

Practically all the soil on the college farm gives a slight acid reaction to the litmus test, as do most soils in Nova Scotia which have been infestigated by the college chemist.

This indicates the necessity of liming. That the college management believe in their experiments is indicated by the fact that they are this year applying to various fields upwards of 150 tons of ground limestone. Provided the material can be purchased reasonably enough they do not hesitate to advise any farmer in Nova Scotia who is trying permanently build up fortility of his farm to use ground lime stone at the rate of three to four tons per acre.

Contrary, however, to a good many statements which have appeared elsewhere, the college management point out the fact that these striking results from the application of ground limestone have been on the lighter, sandier soils from which analysis show the limestone has in the course of years been leached out.

FOODS AFFECT EGG QUALITY

Onions and Cabbage Have Direct In fluence on Flavor—Corn Causee Deep Yellow in Yolk.

Careful experiments indicate that the foods caten by hens may affect egg quality. For example, green foods and yellow corn seem to cause a deep color in the yolk, while the use of white corn, wheat and buckwheat results in pale yolks. Birds on free range lay eggs that have more color than those from hens kept yarded without exercise. Excessive amounts of green food are thought to produce eggs of marked odor and flavor; onions and cabbage having a direct in fluence in this respect.

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
