NOTICE.

Annual Meeting of Stockholders Directors of the Quanah, Acme and Pacific Railway Company.

Notice is hereby given that the annual stockholder's meeting of the Quanah, Acme and Pacific Railway Company will be held as provided by the laws at the General Office of the Company in the Director's rooms thereof in Quanah, Tarrant County, Texas, on Tuesday the Nineteenth day of April, A. D. 1910 at 11:00 o'clock A. M. for the purpose of electing a board of directors for the ensuing year, and transacting such other business as may be before such meeting.

Notice is further given that at such meeting, authority will be asked of the stockholders to amend the Charter of said Railway Corporation authorizing the construction of an extension of its railway from the town of Paducah, in Cottle County, Texas, to its present terminus, through the Counties of Cottle, Motley, Dickens, Crosby, Floyd, Hale, Lamb, Lubbock, Hockley, Cochran, Bailey, Lynn, Terry and Yoakum to a point in the Eastern boundary line of New Mexico Territory, and to issue stocks of said Company in the sum of not less than One Thousand Dollars per mile for the entire line now constructed and to be constructed, and not to exceed a total capital stock of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars.

Notice is further given that authority will be asked of the said stockholders meeting to make, execute and deliver by the Company a first mortgage on all the property both real and personal of the company now owned and that may be hereafter acquired by it, and to arrange for the payment of outstanding bonds. Also for authority to make, execute and deliver its first mortgage on its proposed extension from Paducah to the New Mexico line. The said stockholders to determine which of said mortgages shall be executed, and in either event, it is proposed to issue bonds of the Company in an amount not to exceed Thirty Thousand Dollars per mile of the constructed road of said company, such bonds to bear interest at the rate of six per centum per annum, interest payable semi-annually and to become due not more than thirty years from their date; said bonds to be issued and registered under the direction of the Railroad Commission of the State of Texas from time to time as the railroad is constructed, also for authority to the directors of said Company to make application to said Railroad Commission of the State of Texas for authority to issue bonds under said mortgage or mortgages.

Notice is further given that an annual meeting of the board of Directors will be held at the same place and immediately after the assembling

of the stockholders, for the purpose of electing and appointing officers of the Company, for the transaction of such other business as may come before them, and to carry out the instructions given them by said stockholder's meeting.

RESPONDANCE COURSE.

Agricultural & Mechanical Correspondence course which will be published next are designed to demand among country people in rural schools, and others in agricultural affairs for accurate definite information regard business of farming, and also to a systematic form a course of which may be pursued at home. There are many people who desire an education who for various reasons cannot leave home attend college. The time has been deemed advisable to carry the teachers of the college. To a limited extent this

been accomplished through the personal correspondence of the professors in charge of the various department of the College in reply to letters which come to them in great numbers, covering every phase of agriculture life, yet this was very limited compared with the number who receive the benefit of training through these correspondence courses. The following is a detail description of the course: Course One—The course is designed for teachers in rural schools who desire to study agriculture with the expectation of teaching the subject of their school. It will deal with the fundamental principles of science underlying the agri-

cultural practices and subject matter that may be used for the instruction of pupils. In connection with this course a large number of references will be given publications issued by other Experiment Stations and the department of agriculture, which may be used for supplementary reading.

Course Two—This course will be an elementary discussion of the formation of soils and their physical properties, including such subjects as soil moisture, temperature, aeration, benefits and methods of tillage, the use of farm manures, and the benefits of crop rotation.

Course Three—This course will deal with the factors that determine the productive capacity of different soils; discussing in simple language, the use of commercial fertilizers and other agencies including drainage, for improving the conditions of the land.

Course Four—This course consists of the history of the development of corn and other cereals; approved methods of cultivation, seeding, fertilizing, harvesting, selecting seed, are discussed in detail.

Course Five—This course will deal principally with the cotton crop, but will also include discussion of hemp, flax, sisal, and other plants used in the production of fiber.

Course Six—This course will deal specifically of those crops adapted to Texas which may be for the production of foreign to be fed green or cut and cured into hay. It will include the millets the various types of sorghum, Johnson grass, alfalfa, cowpeas, peanuts and vetch.

Course Seven—The lessons in this course will treat of the history of silos; the construction of cement, stave and other forms of wooden silos; the machinery equipment necessary to put up ensilage crops.

Course Eight—This course will give a discussion of the composition of milk, its care, method of testing milk, churning butter, and the manufacture of other pro-

ducts from milk. It will also deal with the question of proper sanitary necessary to produce clean milk; different methods of separating the cream from the milk, and the care of cream separators will be taken up in detail.

Course Nine—This course is designed to meet a demand for instruction in a better business organization for the farm. It will suggest methods of keeping accounts so as determine the relative cost of production for the different kind of crop.

Suggestions for watching the markets and best methods of marketing various kinds of farm products. It will also deal with the various types of farming and the equipment necessary on different kind of farms.

Course Ten—This course treats of the elementary principles of horticulture, including the germination of the seed, of development of young plants and the functions of its various parts. A thorough discussion will be given of the way the plant takes its food, conveys it to the leaves convert it into available

plant food and then distribute it to the different parts. This course should be taken either before or together with any of the others in the horticultural group, unless one has already had the equivalent.

Course Eleven—A thorough study is made of the multiplication of plants.

Course Twelve—This subject takes up the two general types of vegetable growing for the home and for the open market. This course will include the planning, equipment and operating vegetable farms for home-commerce a purpose.

Course Thirteen—This course consists of a study of the small fruits such as the strawberry, dew berry and mulberry. Some attention will be given to the improvement of these fruits by selection and by cross-pollination.

Course Fourteen—This course will include a close study of the various kinds of fruit orchards, embracing the problems of location and soils, protection from insects and diseases, pruning, cultivating, harvesting and marketing.

Course Fifteen—One of the most remarkable horticulture developments that has ever taken place in any state has been the rise of the citrus industry in the coast country of Texas within the last few years. This course will attempt to give all the latest information up on this subject. Special attention will be given to the location of the above, the protection from cold and the protection from diseases and insects. (Continued next week)
