granted the right of equal suffrage with men by the Baptist General Convention of Texas, which held its first session vesterday. Women may now hold any of the offices and also serve on boards for the various educational institutions of the church in the State. The suffrage right was granted following a general report on church activities by the Enlistment Commission.

The Enlistment Commission dealt with the membership problems of the church throughout the State. It was shown that for the past three years this branch of the Baptist Church has gained about 20,000 annually in mem bership, but that practically 7,000 have deserted the church for the same period. With the view of correcting this a training camp for pastors is to be established for two weeks of each year. The pastors will be taught the best methods for keeping new members active. Fifty thousand dollars was appropriated to the Buckner Orphans Home.

Please make every effort to bring this statement before the people of your district and to urge upon them the continued holding of their War Savings Certificates, the fulfillment of their pledges and additional purchases as their means permit.
