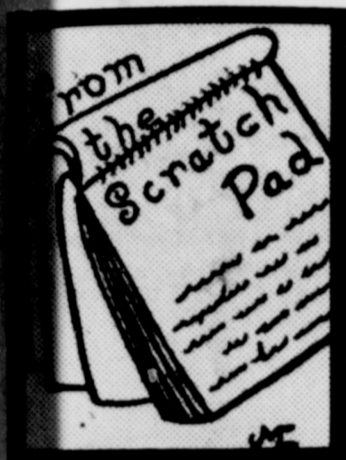

## 678 Vehicles Registered As Of February 14

Vehicle registrations for the first week of February was 443. During the second week another 235 was registered, making a total of 678 as of February 14. This leaves between five and six thousand vehicles to be registered by the April 1st deadline. Farm trailers were not included in this figure.

State law requires all vehicles to be registered from the Certificate of Title instead of using the registration receipt.

The total number of registered voters in Lynn County is 3,086. This was the figure recorded at the deadline of January 31, 1969. The number of persons registering during January was 1,809.

Tax collections for Lynn County were about 94% complete by the end of January, 1969. A breakdown of collections show that of \$46,527.91 collected, \$9,610.25 was prorated to the state, Lynn County received \$28,037.81 and \$349.79 was prorated to the High Plains Water District. The Hospital District received \$8,530.06.

## Local Airport Used By Army Special Forces Over Weekend

Tahoka Airport was the scene of extra activity Saturday, as members of the Army Special Forces Reserves converge there for weekend drill. The jump teams were made up from men in units from Amarillo, Lubbock, Albuquerque and Las Cruces.

The local airport was used as the staging area with the drop zone being near Petty. This area has been used before for jumping activity.

After a short briefing by Captain Hoover, CO, the troops formed into jump groups of four, awaiting turns to be transported to the drop zone. The aircraft used was a U-6A Beaver, single-engine, based at Ft. Hood.

The jumps were made with T-10 steerable parachutes. The chute has a 39 square foot section removed, giving the jumper a certain amount of steering control. Jumps were made from 1,300 feet altitude.

The project officer estimated that 80-90 jumpers were involved in the administrative exercise. Purpose of the drill was to maintain proficiency status.

Personnel involved in the exercise lead normal civilian lives and are known as "weekend warriors." The group is identified by the Green Beret, emblematic of the handpicked Special Forces.

## Farm Bureau Legislative Newsletter

Members of the House Interim Water Committee have introduced a series of bills dealing with legislation for the proposed Texas Water Plan. Most of the bills deal with legal aspects of the proposed Plan, none are controversial, and all seem to have the interests of all sections of the state in mind. For more information on any one or all of these bills, write Representative Randy Pendleton, requesting copies of these bills.

H. B. 266, a bill providing penalties for persons convicted of willfully killing, injuring or attempting to poison livestock or pets belonging to another person, was introduced.

H. B. 293, a bill prohibiting the feeding of garbage to pigs was introduced, since there has been evidence that this was partly responsible for outbreaks of hog cholera, however, this bill refers to commercial feeding operations, not personal farming operation.

S. B. 150 was introduced providing for the licensing of persons engaged in the business of rendering dead animals and poultry, and calls for stricter enforcement of

For every dollar's worth of food that goes into our supermarket basket, we put in 20c worth of laundry soap, insecticides, children's socks, potted plants, paper towels, hi-fi records and even multi-volume encyclopedias or children's classics.

About 90 percent of all sales of cat and dog food go over the supermarket check-out counter - along with about half of the hair spray, aspirin, and toothpaste.

Of every 10 household food dollars, convenience foods today claim three - compared with \$2.75 in 1955. Buying trends are shifting from canned to fresh fruit juices and from fresh to processed pota-

H. B. 187 is an amendment to the Texas Egg Law and is designed to improve the quality of eggs in the State of Texas, to provide for more accurate labeling of eggs, and for better enforcement of laws covering the quality of eggs sold in Texas.

S. B. 147 deals with Water Pollution, and calls for updating the Texas Water Quality act, and provides for more effective control of water quality in the state. You may write your Senator for a copy of this bill.

Regarding S. B. 121 and H. B. 156, State Minimum Wage Bills, which we reported on last week - You will need to write three men on this, to exert any influence, and these men are: Governor Preston Smith, Lt. Governor Ben Barnes, and Speaker of the House, Gus Mutscher.

# "How Conservation Helps Texas"

**Editor's Note:** The following essay was written by Glenda Ann Jackson, O'Donnell, and was judged First Place winner in the annual Soil Conservation Essay Contest.

Wildlife is so full and plentiful that the lands, and people are inspired by its great variety and beauty. Texas, with the help of interested Texans, has become the land of the rich and plentiful.

The wise use of conservation has turned Texas into a vast empire of its own. Conservation has brought Texas from dry hostile plans to one of the most beautiful, vastly productive lands in these United States of America.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of January according to Sergeant H. E. Pittle, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

There crashes resulted in one person killed, one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$3,400.00.

In comparing the rural traffic deaths of January, 1969 to January, 1968 of the 60 counties which comprise the Lubbock DPS Region there was a 37 percent increase in deaths.

The veteran Patrol Supervisor stated, "If January is representative of the next 11 months in Texas, traffic accidents will claim 3,900 lives in 1969, an all time high."
