Seven Accidents Investigated By Highway Patrol

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of January according to Sergeant A. E. Roberts, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed, four persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$9,840.00.

April 15 is the deadline to have your motor vehicle inspected. During the past five and one-half months approximately 2,800,000 or 35 percent of the approximately 5,750,000 registered vehicles in Texas have been inspected. This leaves 3,750,000 vehicles to be inspected in approximately two months.

The Sergeant reminded car owners that under new provisions of the law there will be additional inspection this year including: steering, wheels and rims, and front seat belts where the anchorages are part of the manufacturer's original equipment.

Motorists who wait until the last weeks of the inspection period may find that they will need to install seat belts.

Rotarians Learn Of New School Reading Program

"Reading is the basic tool of learning. Until a student has mastered the art of reading, he is not going to do well

in any subject." This was a statement made by Floyd Tubbs, North Elementary principal, in a talk before Tahoka Rotary Club last Thursday noon during which he explained the new reading program in his school. This new program recently initiated in the fourth and fifth grades is a variation of the so-called "Joplin Reading Plan."

More emphasis is being placed on learning to read in all grades, but this special program is designed to bring more students up to par in speed reading, understanding of words, increase of vocabulary, etc.

The program was initiated when tests showed more than 50 percent of local students in these grades were reading below their national average grade level. This is due mainly, Tubbs said, to the fact the local schools have so many bilingual students whose parents speak Spanish at home.

The problem of teaching children in the local grades is complicated by the fact that the top 25 percent get bored because they are held back by weak students, and the bottom 25 percent suffer from frustration and failure.

Tubb declared marked improvement is already being shown by students in these grades as a result of the program. Tubb was introduced by Supt. Harold Reynolds, who stated more and more is being expected of the public schools and this is one of the areas where the local schools are seeking improvement.

Melvin Burk, director of

guidance service in the local schools, spoke briefly on proposed extension of the reading program.
