

\$254,000Approved For Highways In Lynn County

The Texas Highway Commission today approved the expenditure of \$254,000 for highway safety and betterment and for Farm and Market Road improvement in Lynn County during 1970.

District Engineer Oscar L. Crain of Lubbock said that a total of 1 miles in Lynn County will be involved in the annual program. Work will be under the supervision of E. M. Ables, Sr. Resident Engineer, of Lamesa,

The work is part of the Highway Commission's combined Farm to Market Road Improvement and State Highway Safety and Betterment Program for 1970.

The safety and betterment portion of the program will cover 1 highway mile in the county at an estimated cost of \$254,000.00. The farm to market road improvement program will cost an estimated \$ for miles of FM roads.

Mr. Crain stated that the proposed improvements play an important role in the Department's continuing highway safe-

ty program. He said that the types of work included in the program includes seal coating, surface widening, base strenghtening, and resurfacing and rebuilding of shoulders.
