## City Council Sets Tax Rate At \$1.50

### TAX RATE LOWERED Court Approves '69-'70 County Budget

Commissioners' Court in session on August 25th approved the Lynn County budget for the year 1970.

Estimated receipts for the year are \$398,526.00.

Estimated expenses for the year are \$385,870.00.

The county tax rate for 1969 and for 1970 will be a rate of \$1.05 which is a reduction of 10 cents over 1968 rate. This reduction in rate is due to retirement of road indebtedness.

Outstanding bonded indebtedness of Lynn County on January 1, 1970 will be \$145,235.00.

### Lynn Countians Asked \$163 For Camille Victims

Updated survey information released by the American Red Cross shows that the property destruction caused by Hurricane Camille is much greater than previous estimates. The national headquarters now estimate the cost of the emergency and rehabilitation services by the Red Cross will require a minimum of \$15 million. Including those families suffering losses due to heavy rains spawned by the hurricane in Virginia, the Red Cross estimates a total of 69,000 families have suffered serious losses.

Hundreds of Red Cross disaster specialists and other workers are on the scene throughout the disaster areas. The initial Red Cross activity included the furnishing of food, clothing, shelter, first aid and supplemental medical care for the hurricane victims. Many other organizations have cooperated with the Red Cross in this initial emergency effort.

The next phase of Red Cross activity will assist the families in planning for their own rehabilitation. The total destruction of homes and furnishings in this severe storm will require a much larger amount of money than the Red Cross first estimate. Therefore, the Lynn County Chapter of the American Red Cross is being asked to raise \$163.00 as their portion of a total of \$15 million to be raised nationally.

The Red Cross in the disaster areas will assist those families lacking resources for their own rehabilitation with funds for building and repair of household furnishings and loss occupational equipment and supplies; food, clothing, temporary maintenance; and long term medical care. All funds thus expended by the Red Cross are outright grants with no repayments required. The latest estimate indicates more than 19,000 families will be assisted by the Red Cross in their rehabilitation.

W.B. Griffin chairman of the Lynn County Chapter, American Red Cross expressed confidence that the citizens of this community will respond generously with the funds to meet the goal of \$163.00 assigned to the chapter and thus help their neighbors recover from this serious emergency. Checks can be made payable to the American Red Cross and marked for "Hurricane Camille Relief." All contributions should be sent or brought to the Red Cross Chapter Office located at Court House (C.W. Roberts office), Tahoka.

### Federal Land Bank Slates Annual Stockholders Meet

The Federal Land Bank Association of Tahoka will hold the annual stockholders meeting Saturday, September 6th, at 3 p.m. at the Tahoka Cafeteria. The Tahoka Association

serves Lynn County, Garza County and a portion of Borden County.

Events for the annual meeting include a business session, program refreshments and door prizes will be given away. Two directors will be elected at the meeting. Directors of the organization are Fred McGinty, Vernon Willhoit, and L. A. Forsythe from Lynn County and J. D. McCampbell and Avery Moore, Jr. from Garza County. The manager of the association is Ross Smith.

The Texas Highway Commission today approved the expenditure of \$254,000 for highway safety and betterment and for Farm and Market Road improvement in Lynn County during 1970.

District Engineer Oscar L. Crain of Lubbock said that a total of 1 miles in Lynn County will be involved in the annual program. Work will be under the supervision of E. M. Ables, Sr. Resident Engineer, of Lamesa, Texas.

The work is part of the Highway Commission's combined Farm to Market Road Improvement and State Highway Safety and Betterment Program for 1970.

The safety and betterment portion of the program will cover 1 highway mile in the county at an estimated cost of \$254,000.00. The farm to market road improvement program will cost an estimated \$ for miles of FM roads.

Mr. Crain stated that the proposed improvements play an important role in the Department's continuing highway safety program.

He said that the types of work included in the program includes seal coating, surface widening, base strengthening, and resurfacing and rebuilding of shoulders.

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### Wilson School Board Adopts New Budget

The Wilson School Board met in regular session on Tuesday, August 26, 1969. Items of business included adopting the budget for 1969-70, and the amended budget for 1968-69, approving the purchase of additional lights for the football field, electing a delegate and alternate to the Texas Association of School Boards Convention to be held in Austin on September 21 and 22. In other action, the Board approved participation in the Consolidated Federal Programs and the Neighborhood Youth Corp. The Board also heard a report from Mrs. Wanda Stegemoller, Tax Assessor Collector for the school, concerning the tax rolls. The Board approved the delinquent tax roll and approved errors on the 1968 tax roll.

The total budget for 1969-70 is \$480,243.00 with \$200,000.00 being used for the new building program.

The Board approved placing two additional lights on each pole at the football field in an effort to improve the lighting conditions.

another blue Monday and to make matters worse the alarm clock failed to go off, so you are late to work. Besides, there is that problem of what to do about the new member in the office who isn't cooperating and must come to a decision today.

Turn down the street to town with your mind full of the personal problem of life and your foot pressed on the gas pedal so you can get into the office not more than 15 minutes late.

Suddenly, your eyes focus on a car in the middle of your lane and it takes a second to react to this horrifying situation and by then your car has left the gas and slammed on the brakes which squeal and rattle.

But it is too late. The car skids into the young girl's sickening thud, like kicked half-pumped football but louder, roars in your ears and you see the young body sail through the air like your rag doll.

The car has come to a halt and you find yourself surrounded by people but you are unable to do anything or hear anything or see the whimpering little body on the pavement. Thank God, he is still alive. Policemen and ambulance arrive almost at once and the little body is lifted onto the stretcher to be taken to the hospital.

Questions are being asked and answers are required but your mind refuses to cooperate. How were you driving? The limit here is 20 miles an hour. It is a school zone, you didn't see the signs on this street? Where did the youngster come from? Are the brakes effective?

How do you collect what wits are left and reconstruct the scene in your own mind. You didn't see the speed limit signs, but then you were there when you drive this route to every day. Again, being honest, you were not over 20 miles an hour - - likely today, it was a - - 35 miles an hour. After you were late to work. But the most important answer to a question that wasn't asked is the one you have said to yourself, "I was over the speed limit in school zone, with my mind on a personal problem and not driving."

It could be the story many could tell but so far most have just been plain lucky.

It is underway and the results of summer driving come to halt. Youngsters on bicycles, motor - and in cars are surrounding school areas as well as parts of the city. We must not let them because they are too young to recognize dangers.

Traffic signs have been placed around town. Watch for and obey them. Several speed-hour zones are in effect around the school plants and Stop signs dot the intersections.

Law officials will be in these sections each day, and the main responsibility lies with each driver. Will the few we save by speeding be a zone be worth it if it saves the life of a child?

Driving is a full-time job and requires an alert mind and eyes. Your mind cannot be on personal activities while alert to driving conditions and hazards. When you see the wheel concealing your driving and you slip out down on the ever-increasing accident rate.

The most precious possession you own is its children. Give them the care that you are capable of hurting one of its youngsters.

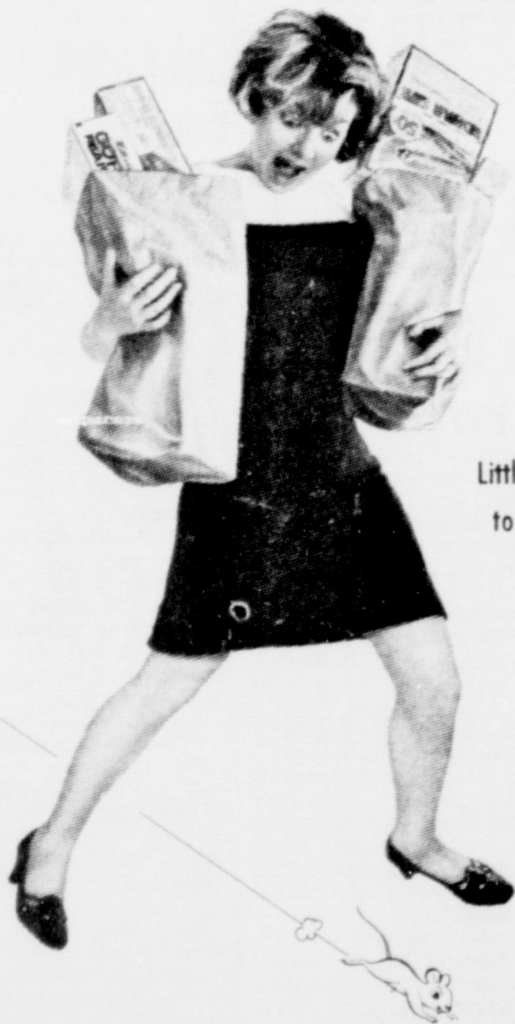

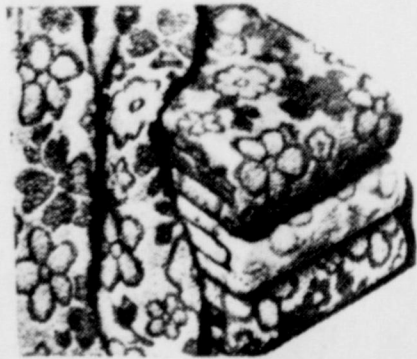

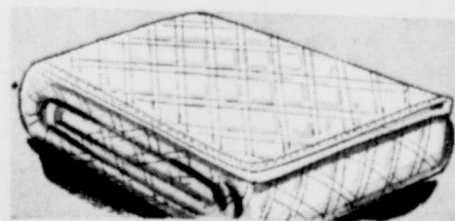

## Agricultural Field Day Set For Sept. 9th.

The 60th annual field day and open house at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center north of Lubbock will be held on Tuesday, September 9 beginning at 1 p.m.

This year's field day offers many attractions for farmers and agribusinessmen in Lynn County, reports County Agricultural Agent Bill Griffin. A large machinery exhibit will also be highlighted as well as the new cotton ginning research laboratory.

Theme for this year's field day and open house is "Research Dedicated to a Bigger and Brighter High Plains Agriculture." Griffin invites all interested individuals and groups to make plans now to attend the event.

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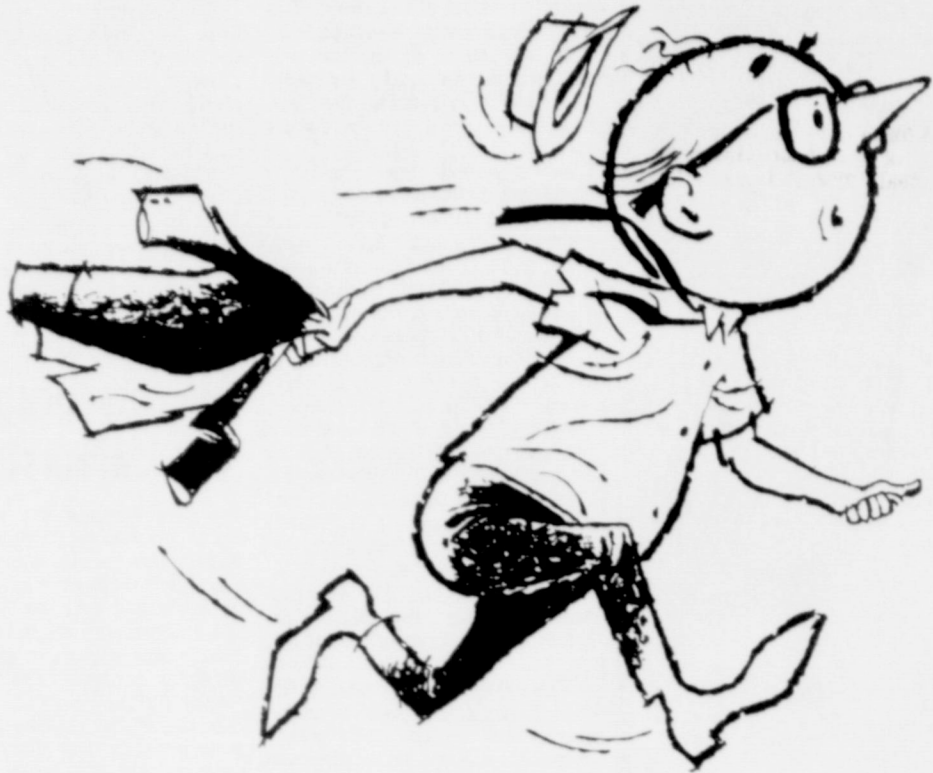

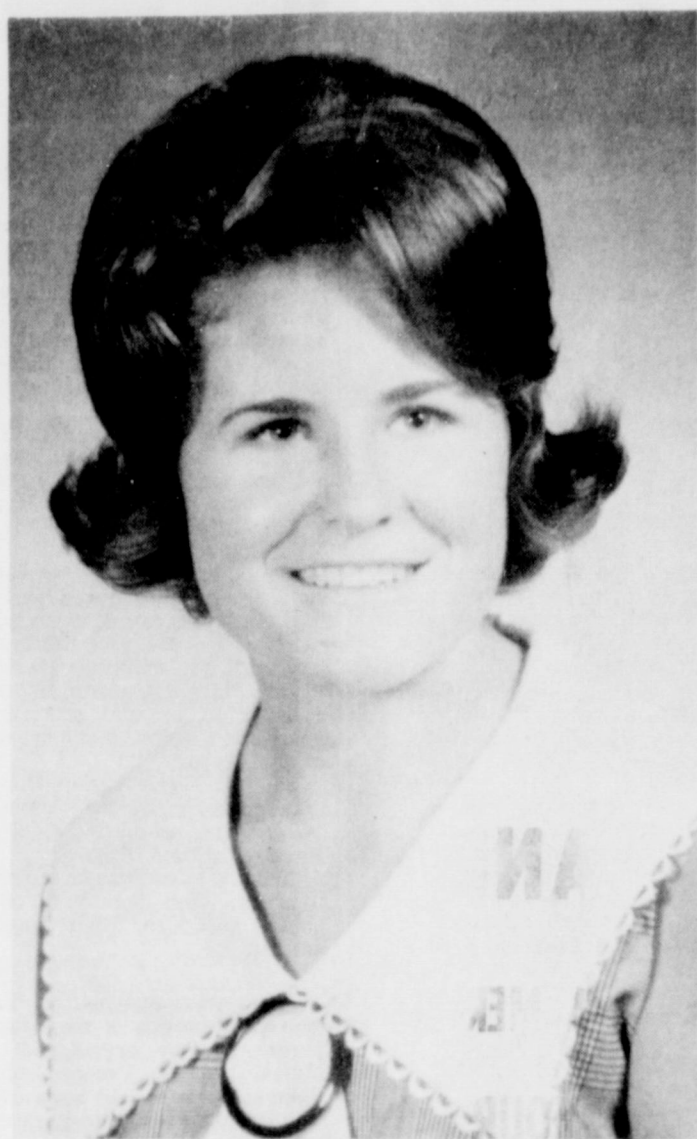

Easily confused of their similarity in both shape and flavor, smoked and picnic hams are different cuts of meat. Meat cut from the shoulder section is called picnic; meat from the leg is ham. Although both meats are baked, smoked picnic should be cooked slightly longer than ham for best flavor and tenderness.

Wonderful things happen to pork when roasted over charcoal; it cooks well done inside and delightfully crisp flavored exterior. Roast the meat over glowing - rather than flaming - coals. If you have a meat thermometer, use it. Cook pork to an internal temperature of 185 degrees whether cooked indoors or out. Pork rib ends are a good choice of barbecuing.

A new type of thread, a cotton covered polyester, will soon appear on the market. It combines the best features of cotton and polyester fibers. Im-

portant features are that it is knotless, stronger than many other threads and one size sews all fabrics.

For best flavor, choose pineapples that have changed or are changing from their green color to orange or yellow. Choose one heavy for its size. A fragrant aroma tells the buyer a pineapple is ripe and good to eat.

The secrets of successful chicken cookery are low temperatures and cooking to well-done. The secrets mean juicer meat and less shrinkage. Coating frying chicken in a prepared mix, seasoned flour, bread crumbs or crushed cereal prevents drying.

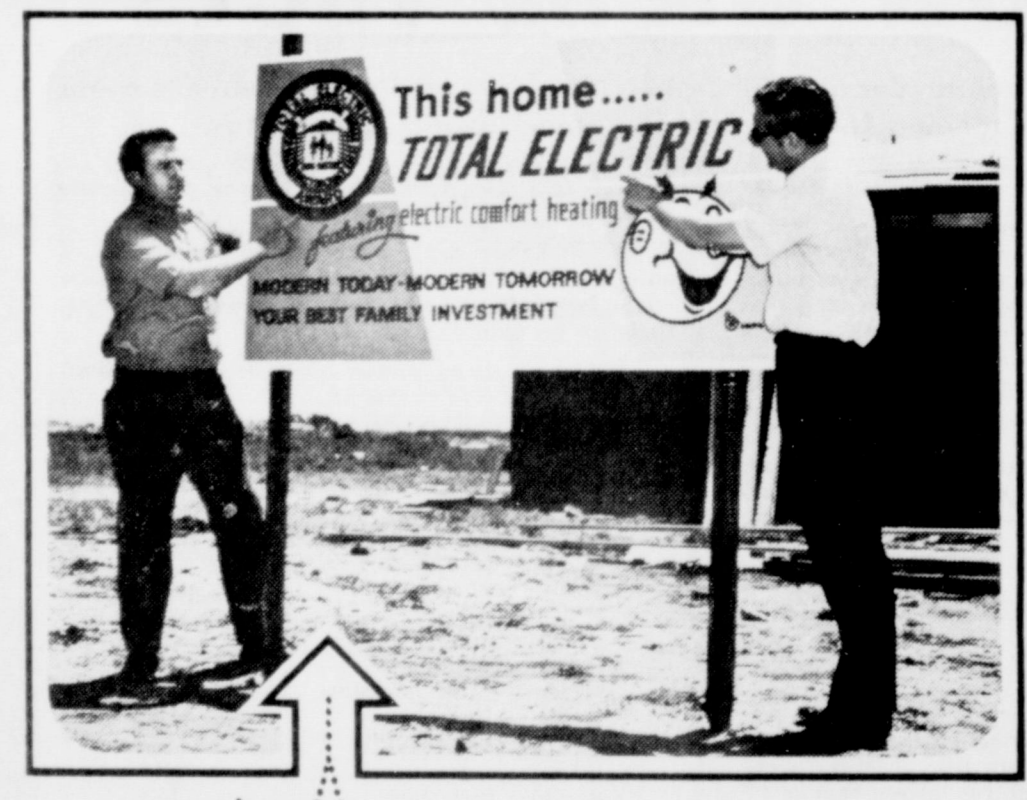

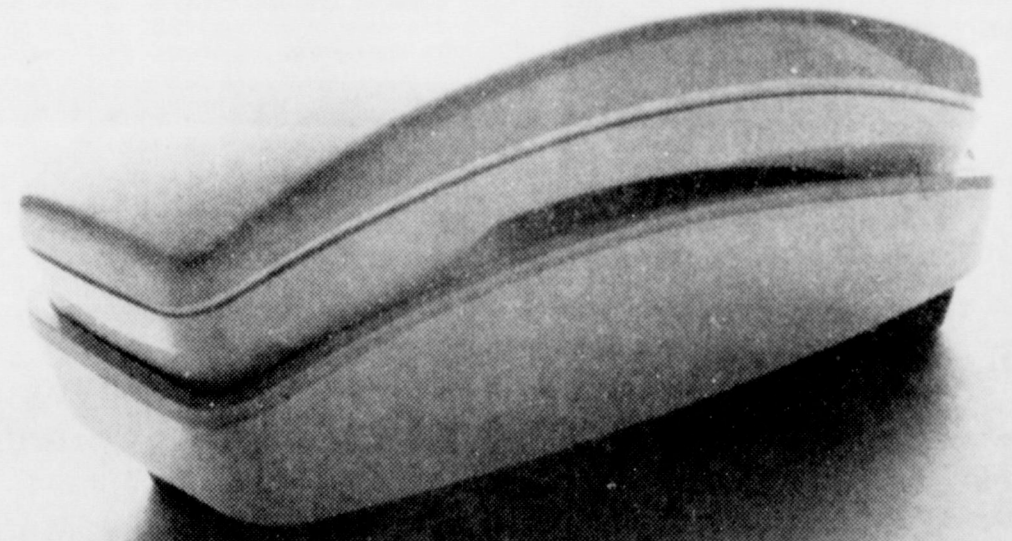

## Past Days In Lynn County

COPIED FROM SEPTEMBER, 1920 ISSUE LYNN COUNTY NEWS

Last Friday afternoon word was received in Tahoka that B. W. Turner, a farmer residing near Wilson in the north part of this county, had met his death by gun shot wounds in the hands of his wife. Officers went at once to the scene of the murder and found the dead man in a pasture several hundred yards from the house. It seems that Mr. Turner had attempted to reach a neighbor house after receiving the summons. Mrs. Turner and a daughter-in-law, Mrs. Estes Turner, together with deceased had just returned from Amarillo. From information received it seems that the women arrived home ahead of Mr. Turner, who upon reaching the residence, found it to be locked whereupon he proceeded to force his way inside. It was then that scuffle occurred and the fatal shot fired that caused the death. Mrs. Turner claims that in the scuffle over the gun it was accidentally discharged. The body of Mr. Turner was brought to Tahoka and interred in the local cemetery. Immediately after the burial, warrants were issued for the arrest of the Turner women and at once re-

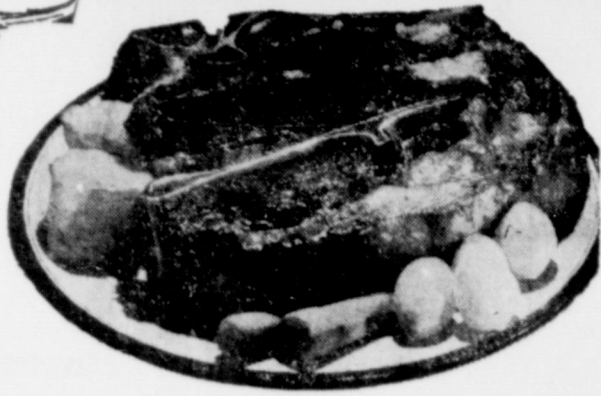
