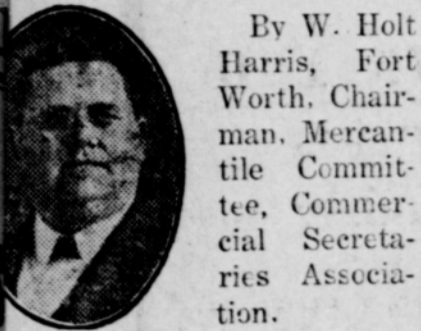

Another Half Inch of Rain.

Sunday was cloudy and damp with considerable moisture in the air but not enough to measure. Monday, however, the wind was from the north and it was colder and damper until after midnight when it began to blow and by morning .26 of an inch of rain had fallen. Tuesday morning dawned rainy and continued off and on all day until midnight the rain gauge measured an inch more of rain. Wednesday morning was foggy and damp and .02 of moisture fell during the night. About midnight the sky began to clear off and by night the sky was clear and the moon and stars were shining brightly at ten o'clock. Thursday morning, however, was again damp and foggy with a chilly wind from the southwest.

Thirty Inches of Rain in 8 Months

The month of October was another rainy one for Lynn county, the record being 9.85 inches, June being the only one that exceeded it, having 10.93 inches to its credit. We have no record of the rainfall in Lynn county prior to March 4th, this year, and taking the rainfall up to November 4th the record is 30.36 inches. Now, if we estimate our rainfall for January and February from the records of Lamesa (1.28) on the south and Lubbock (1.38) on the north, taking the mean of the two, we have 1.33 making 31.69 for the ten months of 1913. Taking the mean of the same two points will give us 13.95 for the entire year of 1912. In many of the counties in Texas a third less than the normal rainfall, as we had last year, means almost a total failure; we made half a crop. On the other hand, a third more than the normal rainfall to many Texas counties means a crop failure with the added loss of thousands of dollars worth of property and many lives from the floods; we have no loss of life, little or no property damage and we raise a crop and a half.

CLASH OF FEEDS.

Fort Worth Show, November 22 to 29, Will Be Virtual Education to Producers.

A significant clash of "feeds as well as breeds" will be witnessed in the magnificent hog exhibits that will be made in the National Feeders and Breeders' Show, which will be held at Fort Worth November 22 to 29.

Hog producers throughout Texas and Oklahoma have been forwarding entries in great numbers and it is learned that the hogs that will be on display have been fattened on a variety of feeds—principally kafir corn, milo maize, Indian corn and peanuts. The supremacy of corn as a feed for hogs will be questioned and feeders and breeders are awaiting with interest the decisions of the judges. From the Panhandle is coming the hog that has never eaten a grain of corn in its life, but is sleek and well-finished on kafir corn and milo maize. From other sections of the State will come hogs that roamed at will through acres of peanuts and have attained the "battleship" state. And the corn-fed variety, pampered with the "golden" grains, will be on hand to defend the title he has held so long. It is expected that the latter will not have altogether easy going.

The awards in the hog department will be more liberal than ever before and a number of new classes have been added. Entries have already been received in great number. Producer, big and little, will meet in competition.

The grass-fatted sheep of South Texas, that section which has been in such a flourishing condition this year, will compete with its more pampered relatives that have been nurtured and carefully fed on the stock farms of North Texas. This will be the first time that South-west Texas sheep have been entered in the show, but the producers, who have raised the standards of their breeds greatly within the past few years, anticipate carrying off many prizes. Additional classes and more prizes have been added in the sheep division. For the first time, Oxford Downs and Rambouillets will be given recognition. All of the standard breeds will be represented in the magnificent exhibit. The foremost breeders in the State have already entered and the small farmer is showing greater interest than ever before.

HORSE SHOW PAGEANT.

Oriental Splendor Will Meet Occidental Fashion at Fort Worth Show.

Oriental pomp and splendor will meet with Occidental fashion in the gorgeous ceremonies that surround the coronation of the Queen of the Horse Show Pageant, which will feature the opening night of the National Feeders and Breeders' Show, which will be held at Fort Worth November 22 to 29.

Following the beautiful equestrian inaugurated at last spring's show, which caused the opening night to be a State-wide society event, unparalleled in brilliance, the management of the National Feeders and Breeders' Show is going to even greater expense this fall to make the event one long to be remembered in Texas society circles.

The magnificent spectacle of coronation, which is being granted by a committee of Fort Worth society women, will have to do with the reception of ten Oriental queens and their retinues, garbed in the exact costumes of the different Eastern courts, before the Queen of the Horse Show pageant, her maids of honor princesses of the realm and loyal retainers. For color, no Oriental bazaar will outstrip it; for fashion of the present day, the women of Texas need not go to cities afar.

More than fifty beautiful princesses, representing an equal number of cities throughout Texas, will visit the show and be members of the royal party. A round of social entertainment, more brilliant than ever before, has been arranged. These princesses will come from representative families in the different cities and will be symbolic of the manner in which the National Feeders and Breeders' Show represents the State.

The Queen of the Horse Show pageant will be a Fort Worth girl, whose identity will be a guarded secret until the night of the coronation, when her royal chariot, surrounded by gallant retainers, will be drawn into the vast Coliseum building. She will be accompanied by her maids of honor, who will be debutantes of the present season.

The management of the show promises an unrivaled spectacle, in which more than 300 people will take part and it is certain that the event is one that will be long remembered in State society circles. The Coliseum will be bedecked in appropriate fall colors.

Leads the Field on Quality, E. C. Value and Condition

But, Falls Way Behind When it Comes to Arrangement, Neatness and Number of Varieties Exhibited at the State Fair.

In the above table of ten counties making above 50 per cent, the first column of figures show the per cent on the Arrangement of the exhibit with a possible score of 20 per cent. Lynn county, through inexperience, lost 11 points on arrangement.

The second column (N15) means neatness, with 15 per cent possible. Lynn county scores 10 points on neatness. In quality, (Q25) Lynn county moves up into the front rank with a score of 20 points, equal to Hopkins, Hunt and Denton counties.

In number of varieties (NV25) we drop way back to last position with a loss of 13 points, but in E. C. Value (ECV10) we again come to the front taking first place with the loss of only one point of being perfect. In the condition of our exhibit (C5) we again take a front rank with Hopkins, Hunt, Denton, Wood and Matagorda counties losing only 1-2 point, giving us a total score of 54 1-2 points and ninth position.

Had our experience enabled us to make a proper display of our products and our county been older and more thickly settled so we could have scored on the number of varieties we would have taken first place. However, next year Bro. Crouch will take first place on arrangement and neatness, we will go two or three points ahead of the State on quality, all it will take is a little more care, judgement and experience in making selections for the exhibit. Lynn county will produce the quality all right, it always has. The only thing that can keep us out of first place next year in the county exhibit contest will be a possible lack in the number of varieties shown. Let's all begin now to work for this prize next year. Pick out those things in which you excel and do your very best to have something to exhibit next year.

We quote below from the Dallas News of Wednesday the 27th, in which they put Lynn county on the map. Read what most of the geographers have to say about the Staked Plains, keep in mind the fact the Lynn county is nearly in the middle of this so-called "desert"? And read what the Dallas News has to say about an exhibit from a county of not over 250 farms and 400 voters.

LYNN COUNTY HAS EXHIBIT.

Directly across the aisle from the Denton County exhibit is

that of Lynn County, another one from the the Panhandle. In a modest manner the banner proclaims Lynn County as "The Pride of the Plains," and the showing made is one to bear out the assertion.

This is the first year Lynn County has exhibited at the State Fair, but W. J. Crouch of Tahoka, who is superintendent of the display, says that it will not be the last and that his county can make a much better showing in the future than it has done this year.

"There was a week of rainy weather in Lynn County just as we were preparing our exhibit," said Mr. Crouch, "that interfered with us considerably. In addition to that, this being our first year, we did not know just exactly how much of each product to bring. Lynn county raises fine alfalfa although our exhibit does not show it."

Only two stalks of cotton were brought, although the county produced 2,000 bales this year. There are big watermelons, averaging sixty pounds; sweet potatoes that took the second prize and the baled sorghum that took the first prize. An interesting showing is made of Kaffir, milo, feterita, Jerusalem corn, Egyptian wheat, Soudan grass, millets, ribbon cane and corn.

Big, plump ears of yellow, white and red corn were brought, winter cantaloupes, apples, peppers, peanuts, onions, pumpkins, squashes and kershaws. There is a bunch of dwarf maize and one of white maize, but the exhibit was shipped in a coal car and it is white no longer. There are tall stalks of of corn and seeded ribbon cane and a variety of peaches, plums and grapes.

THE NEW GEOGRAPHY AND THE BIBLE.

And the New Yorker was compelled to remain two weeks longer until the Englishman returned from his hunt, when the business was finished in twenty minutes.—Indianapolis News.



all of which did well in Lynn County this year.

A huge star in one corner of the booth, is made of maize and feterifa, with a big red apple in the center. The chufa grass nut, claimed to be excellent feed for hogs, is one of the unusual features of the display. There are jars of beans, monderberries, tomatoes, plums, apples, peaches, cherries, beets and other small vegetables and fruits. Some of the grains are as fine as can be found any place.

"Maize, Kaffir and sorghum are perhaps our principal crops," said Mr. Crouch, "and we have shipped out over 100 car loads this year. We are getting \$20 a ton for maize and it runs a ton and a half to the acre. Our land makes a fine yield of speckled Mexican beans, black-eyed peas, butter beans and everything of that sort. Corn runs from forty to sixty bushels to the acre. And, as a rule, we get plenty of rainfall, in addition to which we strike an abundance of water at about seventy feet."
