Classes Begin September 3

## School Registration Opens Next Week

Tahoka students will resume new term classes Tuesday, September 3, following the Labor Day holiday. Pre-registration for all classes will be conducted August 26 and 27.

High School students planning to enroll for the first time in Tahoka must contact the High School office this week and bring their transcript. All beginners should have a birth certificate or baptismal certificate and be six years of age on or before September 1. Smallpox vaccination is also required for all beginners.

Registration for Seniors, Juniors, and Sophomores will be held Monday, August 26. Seniors will register between the hours of 8:00-10:00 a. m. Junior registration is 10:00-12:00 noon and Sophomores from 1:00-3:00 p. m. Freshmen will register Tuesday, August 27, beginning at 8:00 a. m.

Junior High students will also register Monday and Tuesday, 8:00-10:00 is set aside for the 8th Grade, with

7th Graders registering from 10:00-12:00 noon. The 6th Graders will register Tuesday morning from 8:00-10:00.

North Elementary students will register August 26, beginning at 8:30 until 12:00.

South Elementary students will observe the same period on that day.

Class schedules for grades six through twelve will begin

five minutes after the first bell at 8:25. Classes will dismiss at 3:47 p. m. Grades four and five of North Elementary will also observe the above class periods.

South Elementary students report inside the building at 8:20 each morning, with classes beginning shortly thereafter. Classes end at 3:00 p. m. each day for first through third grade students except during the first three weeks of school, when the First Graders will be dismissed at 1:00 p. m. The reason for the early dismissal is to give the first year students a chance to adjust to the school routine. Parents may pick the First Grade students up at the 1:00

p. m. hour, but for those living in the country, a special bus room will be maintained with full supervision until the time the busses run.

Mr. W. B. Smith, representative of S.R.A. will meet with all elementary teachers Thursday, August 29, at 1:30 in the cafeteria.

Teachers, new to the Tahoka School system will meet in the High School Library at 9:00 a. m. August 29. A general staff meeting will be held Friday, August 30 at 8:30 a. m.

### Rotary Members Hear State Report

Sgt. C. A. Dempsey, public relations officer of Texas Department of Public Safety, was speaker at Tahoka Rotary Club Thursday noon.

He stressed in his talk the terrible toll being taken on our highways in vehicle accidents. During 67 years since introduction of the automobile, 1,696,113 Americans have died on U. S. Highways compared to total during nine U. S. Wars from 1775 through 1967, a half million less, or 1,146,415 men died.

Last year Texas had 3,367 traffic fatalities, three times its quota of the 52,000 killed in the nation on highways.

Lynn County's contribution to the 1967 Texas traffic cost was one killed, 85 injured and property damage estimated above \$96 thousand dollars.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of July according to Sergeant A. E. Roberts, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

back on the highways. The Sergeant reminds all drivers of the state law regulating traffic in regard to school buses. "The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside of the limits of any incorporated city or town upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may then proceed past school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children."

The crashes resulted in one person killed and an estimated property damage of \$2,525.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1968 shows a total of 36 accidents resulting in five persons killed, 25 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$42,185.

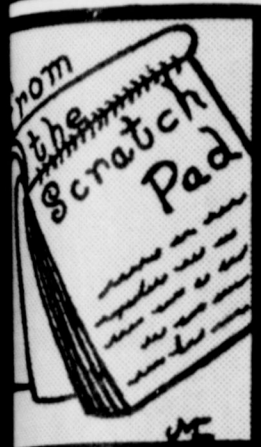

**Dove Season Opens Sept. 1**  
Mourning Dove season in the North Zone will open September 1st according to official information received from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

A statewide census of dove shows the bird population to be down some 12% except in 4 areas, one of which is ours. The dove population has actually shown an increase in the Plains area.

This writer traveled extensively over the county last week and saw many dove on high lines and on the road sides bordering grain fields. There should be no shortage of dove this year for the capable hunter.

Be sure to have a valid 1968-69 season hunting license with you before you take to the field. The TP & W recently shipped 1.9 million licenses to the states 3000 license-deputies and these licenses officially went on sale August 12th.

The daily bag limit has been set at 12 with a possession limit of 13.  
Hunter who intend to hunt on opening day won't have to get up with the chickens because the legal hunting time doesn't begin until 12 noon Central Standard Time. (1:00 p. m. Central Daylight Savings Time)

Shotguns must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity and may not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting doves with rifles is prohibited.

Hunters should take note of existing game laws that make it unlawful to shoot from or across a road or public highway. Shooting birds from high lines is not only dangerous and illegal but highly unsportsman like. Hunters should also respect the "respass law and obtain permission (preferably written) from the landowner before hunting begins.

Hunters will have a two month season this year. The season will close officially on October 30th.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR20)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 11a. In addition to the bonds enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Board of Regents of the Permanent University Fund in securities, bonds or other obligations insured, or guaranteed in any manner by the United States Government, or any of its agencies, and in such bonds, securities, or obligations, and in common stocks owned by corporations, associations, or other institutions of the University of Texas System may deem to be proper investments for said funds; provided, however, that not more than one per cent (1%) of the fund shall be invested in securities of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for five (5) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase which, except for bank and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or successors. In making each and all of the investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the same care and under the same circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR4)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof.

## BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age of fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund. "Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Section III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other state pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other state pension or retirement fund, contributed by the state, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this Section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words: "FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas." "AGAINST the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas." Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the state constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof. Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following: "Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices." "AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices." If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.



#### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR39)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 39 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the state, so as to create as an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, vesting the general administration and responsibility of the proper operation of said system in a state board of trustees to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other restrictions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that contributions of members and the state shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication; and declaring legislative intent that the adoption of this Joint Resolution shall constitute repeal of Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, previously adopted by this the 60th Legislature, so that the proposition as set forth in this Resolution may be submitted to the voters of this state in lieu of the proposition contained in Senate Joint Resolution No. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the state, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this state as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the state who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the state, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of judicial districts of this state as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection, and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection except as permitted by Section 63 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 62, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the state to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state.

"There is hereby created as

an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, the rights of membership in which, the retirement privileges and benefits thereunder, and the management and operations of which shall be governed by the provisions herein contained and by present or hereafter enacted Acts of the Legislature not inconsistent herewith. The general administration and responsibility for the proper operation of said system are hereby vested in a State Board of Trustees, to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, which Board shall be constituted and shall serve as may now or hereafter be provided by the Legislature. Said Board shall exercise such powers as are herein provided together with such other powers and duties not inconsistent herewith as may be prescribed by the Legislature. All moneys from whatever source coming into the Fund and all other securities, moneys, and assets of the Employees Retirement System of Texas shall be administered by said Board and said Board shall be the trustees thereof. The Treasurer of the State of Texas shall be custodian of said moneys and securities. Said board is hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, hold, manage, purchase, sell, assign, trade, transfer, and dispose of any securities, evidences of debt, and other investments in which said securities, moneys, and assets have been or may hereafter be invested by said Board. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to invest and reinvest any of said moneys, securities, and assets, as well as the proceeds of any of such investments, in bonds, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued, or assumed or guaranteed in whole or in part, by the United States or any agency of the United States, or by the State of Texas, or by any county, city, school district, municipal corporation, or other political subdivision of

the State of Texas, both general and special obligations; or in home office facilities to be used in administering the Employees Retirement System including land, equipment, and office building; or in such corporation bonds, notes, other evidences of indebtedness, and corporation stocks, including common and preferred stocks, of any corporation created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any of the states of the United States, as said Board may deem to be proper investments; provided that in making each and all of such investments said Board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as probable safety of their capital; and further provided, that a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may now or hereafter be provided by law. Herein investments authorized herein are hereafter further restricted by an Act of the Legislature, no more than one per cent (1%) of the book value of the total assets of the Employees Retirement System shall be invested in the stock of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid cash dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its

successors; and provided further, that not less than twenty-five per cent (25%) at any one time of the book value of investments of said Fund shall be invested in Government and Municipal Securities as enumerated above. This Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall become effective immediately upon its adoption without any enabling legislation."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 5, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

## PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR41)

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services for:

(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years;

(2) Needy individuals who are citizens of the United States who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

(3) Needy blind persons who are citizens of the United States and who are over the age of eighteen (18) years;

(4) Needy children who are citizens of the United States and who are under the age of twenty-one (21) years, and to the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may define the residence requirements, if any, for participation in these programs.

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, and in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate Federal Statutes as they now are or as they may be amended, to the extent that Federal matching money is not available to the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such Federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of state funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children shall never exceed Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

## PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR49)

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. Section 21 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 21. All stationery and printing, except proclamations and such printing as may be done at the Texas School for the Deaf, and paper, except that for the Judicial Department, shall be furnished under contract, to be given to the lowest and best bidder under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law. No member or officer of any department of the government shall be in any way interested in such contract."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment removing certain provisions relating to purchase of fuel and furnishing the rooms and halls of the Legislature and the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller must approve certain contracts of purchase."

## PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR16)

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 1-f, to read as follows:

"Section 1-f. All merchandise, products, goods or wares in the temporary custody of a public warehouseman, who has no financial connection other than as bailee for hire with the owner, shipper, or consignee of the merchandise, products, goods, or wares, are exempt from ad valorem taxation if they are shipped to or from the warehouse by regulated or bona fide private carrier, are held by the warehouseman not longer than six (6) months, and have a pre-determined out-of-state destination at point of origin. The books and records relating to out-of-state shipments covered hereby of such public warehouseman shall be available for reasonable inspection by the proper taxing authorities. This amendment shall not act as a validation of any present statute or law, but only those passed specifically pursuant hereto; provided, however, that enabling legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

## PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR41)

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services for:

(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years;

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### County Officials Will Attend State Convention

The biennial state conference for all Agricultural Extension Service employees will be held on the campus of Texas A & M University, August 26-30, reports County Agent Bill Griffin.

He said both he and Home Demonstration Agent Linda Cribbs would be out of their offices all next week, but that the office secretary would keep the office open.

He added that the announced theme for the conference is "Working Toward Perfection in Extension Educational Programs." In addition to outstanding speakers for each of the morning sessions, Griffin said that each Extension worker would have an opportunity to participate in 3 different special training programs during each of the afternoon sessions and he will present a part of the program on Entomology. These programs, he added, cover many of the major subject matter areas and were planned not only to present new information in the various fields but also to give county Extension workers educational techniques which may be used in the many new programs now underway.

#### LINDA CRIBBS CHD Agent Says:

##### Safeguard Against Food Poisoning

Food poisoning can dampen a picnic spirit quickly - and the only safeguard against it is caution.

Poisoning can be caused by handling food too much, improper cooking and leaving food exposed for several hours.

Foods prepared in advance and left outside can be infested with organisms which multiply quickly and do not affect food taste, smell or appearance.

Since you can't tell if a food is safe to eat, extra precautions are necessary. Foods most vulnerable to poisoning are potato salad, egg products, fish products, sauces, dairy products and pastries, especially custard and cream pies.

Food definitely should not be kept at room temperature more than 3 or 4 hours. It may be cooler or warmer, but room temperature is critical.

Principal cause of food poisoning, staphylococcus bacteria, can be spread by unclean hands and utensils. The cook can spread the bacteria by a sneeze or cough.

Flies, which spread salmonella infection, are another major source of contamination. But when spraying for insects, be sure to cover all food and dishes.

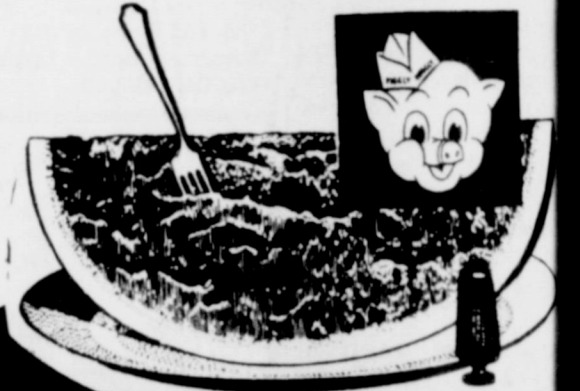

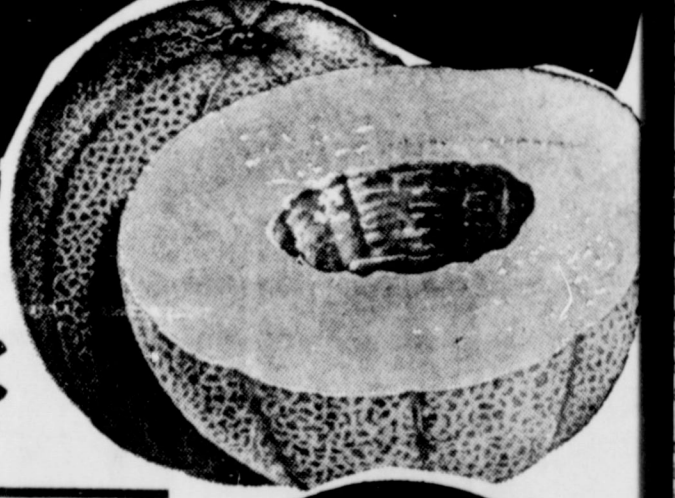
