Frontier Days Rodeo Begins Today

Tahoka's eighth annual Frontier Days Rodeo opens today, continuing through Saturday, with performances each day. Each performance begins at 8:00 p. m. with the grand entry. Frontier Days officially be-

gins with the parade at 5:00 this afternoon. The parade will feature riding groups, bands, and miscellaneous local entries, including floats and displays. An added feature is the first official appearance of the four rodeo

queen candidates. The queen candidates are sponsored by various organizations and the winner will be announced during the grand entry at the performance this evening. Candidates and sponsors are: Ja Jean

Jaquess, Chamber of Commerce; Vicki Renfro, Junior Chamber of Commerce; Nalene Chandler, Rotary Club; and Connie Gardner, Young Farmers. Parade winners will be announced at grand entry time of the first performance this evening.

A good slate of events are scheduled this year including a wild mare race, bareback bronc riding, barrel racing, bull riding, calf roping, junior ribbon roping, and dalley roping. Additional color and entertainment will be added by the clown acts during each performance. Each night, following the

rodeo performance, everyone is invited to attend the big dance with music furnished by one of the top western bands of the area. The Don Allen band will play each dance held at the Tahoka Community Center.

This year's stock promises to be in top condition and will give the contestants a tough run for the money. Rodeo prizes will be awarded from entry fees and the entry books close at noon today.

Tahoka Loses Patrol Station

Sergeant Argel E. Roberts, Texas Highway Patrol of Brownfield, notified the Lynn County News this week, that the patrol station at Tahoka was officially closed as of April 15.

Action prompting the closing of the station was a result of personnel shortages due to several reasons. Trooper Jim Burdette was granted a voluntary transfer for duty in the San Antonio area. Trooper Curtis Pray was transferred to Mineral Wells to strengthen personnel in that high accident area.

It is not known at this time if and when the local station can be re-opened. Service for the area will be handled by the Brownfield and Post units. The Highway Patrol can be contacted through the Tahoka Police Department or the Lynn County Sheriff's Office.

Severe Weather Film Shown At Rotary Club

Severe weather and tornadoes was the program theme at Rotary last Thursday, presented by Pat Patterson, Tahoka Fire Chief. The program included a tornado film produced by the United States Weather Bureau, giving information about severe weather operations. Patterson brought out in detail, the operation of the local severe weather watch and the duties of the fire department under such conditions. The department works in close cooperation with the weather bureau and all local law enforcement depart-

ments. Movement of severe storms and tornadoes are relayed by radio to all units and to the city fire station for sounding of the alert alarm. Under alert conditions, the alarm siren will be sounded with a series of up and down tones. At this time, residents should take cover and stay off the streets. Patterson pointed out that at previous times, storm watchers have been hampered by residents phoning the fire or police stations and crowding the streets with automobiles.

Qualifiers for the teams had to be classified as seniors, maintain much better than average grades and must have been selected to represent his school on an all district team.

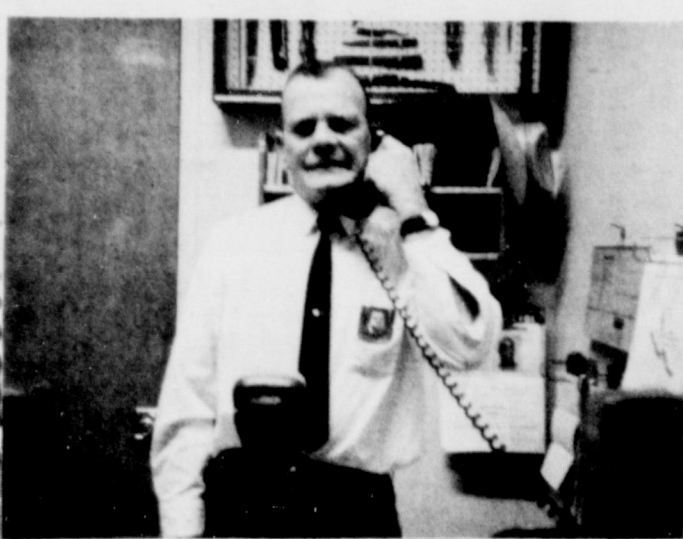

Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says

With the cotton planting season almost here, Lynn County producers should give careful consideration to proper seeding rates, advises County Agricultural Agent Bill Griffin.

Studies at the South Plains Research and Extension Center show that an optimum plant population ranges from 10,000 to 50,000 plants per acre on 40-inch rows.

A planting rate of twenty pounds of good quality acid treated seed per acre will provide a sufficient number of plants, points out the agent. In fact, if every seed produced, there would be more than enough plants required for maximum yields.

With an average of 4,000 seeds per pound, a 20-pound per acre planting rate could produce 80,000 plants. However, under actual field conditions about 60 percent emergence may be considered, explains Griffin. Therefore, the plant population would number about 48,000 per acre with a spacing of slightly more than three inches between plants. Under crop row conditions the planting rate may be increased to 10 to 20 percent.

Farmers in the county sometimes use excess planting rates to compensate for

possible adverse planting conditions or loss due to hail, adds Griffin. Actually, this practice is rarely justified and would be of benefit only if hail took out 50 to 90 percent of the seedlings.

Why this range of hail damage? With an initial population of 48,000 plants per acre, a hail destroying up to 50 percent of the seedlings would leave 24,000 plants per acre, enough for maximum yields. On the other hand, if hail damage of 90 percent or more occurs, replanting would be necessary even if a planting rate of 40 pounds were used.

Often stands are replanted which should be left, it's always best, if possible to leave that early stand. Replanting in June places the boll maturation period in an unfavorable environment for producing high quality fiber. An early crop, even with a reduced stand of a plant every six to eight inches, will usually make the producer more profit in quality lint than thicker stands of replanted, later maturing cotton. As hail damage occurs later in the season, the decision on whether or not to replant becomes more critical.

Excessive planting rates may cause more problems than they solve, adds Griffin. Seedling disease is usually greater with high planting rates. This is particularly true if higher rates are used to compensate for poor quality seed.

Furthermore, high plant populations will result in tall-

er plants with higher set bolls which delay maturity and contribute to lower micronaire fiber, explains Griffin. Equally important is the fact that many new varieties with improved fiber quality are less tolerant to high plant populations than the familiar rapid fruiting varieties grown in past years.

Cotton seedling disease can greatly affect total yield from your acreage, says County Agent Griffin. Organisms associated with cotton seedling diseases are fungi, bacteria, and nematodes. They are most damaging during periods that favor their development but unfavorable for plant development.

Preventing disease from affecting seedlings can be accomplished only by following the proper combination and use of control practices.

It is important to bury all surface trash below the planting level and plant the seed on beds to allow proper drainage. Shaped beds and precision planting can greatly aid in the control of seedling disease.

Seeds should be treated with a chemical fungicide to control seed surface-borne organisms and prevent seed rot.

The seed should be of good quality and should give a high germination of normal seedlings at 65 degrees in seven days. Lower quality seeds require higher temperatures and longer to germinate.

To test the seed quality for

early planting, run a cold germination test at 60 degrees.

After seven days at the 60 degree temperature, high quality seed will germinate and have a straight root about 1 1/2 inches long. Low quality seed will have poor germination and roots which are coiled or nubbed. Any mold growth on the seeds will indicate deterioration, he says.

To assure a satisfactory stand it may be necessary to apply an in-covering fungicide when seedling disease has consistently been a problem. Sprays, dusts, or granules may be used and they should be thoroughly mixed with the soil used to cover the seed in the furrow.

Specially selected farmers in Lynn County will find a very important document in their mailboxes in the next few days, according to Bill Griffin, county agriculture agent.

It's the annual spring Acreage Survey of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas State Department of Agriculture.

Carey D. Palmer, agriculture statistician in charge, said that forms will be mailed to Lynn County from Austin on May 13 for counties in Districts 10, 11, and 12; May 29 for counties in District 1 through 9.

Crop reports for more than 100 years have been important aids to farmers in planning their production and marketing activities, Griffin said. By responding promptly to the questionnaire, farmers can increase the accuracy of our next crop report and make it even more valuable to time, he added.

Statewide, data are collected primarily from voluntary reports, including 40,000 farmers and ranchmen, 6,000 agricultural businesses and 250 county agricultural agents.

Up to 25 percent of the producers in each county, generally the larger operators, will receive the Acreage Survey form, Griffin said.

Soil Insecticides Can Control Grub Damage To Corn And Grain

White grubs, sometimes called "grub worms," can do significant damage to field crops, especially corn and grain sorghum. And soil applications of a recommended insecticide prior to planting this spring can give effective control, points out Lyndon Almand, area entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The white grub is the larval stage of May and June beetles, and overwinters in the soil, says Almand. It causes the most damage to field crops which have followed grass. White grubs are especially active in soils with a high organic matter content and feed on plant roots severely pruning them and thereby stunting plant growth and development. Grubs can easily kill seedling plants and destroy the stand.

As a control, the entomologist recommends applying an insecticide to the soil two to three weeks prior to planting. Although applying the

insecticide at planting time is more economical, the practice might be costly since the insecticide may not kill all soil insects quickly enough to prevent some crop damage.

In addition to white grubs, a soil insecticide will also provide good control of wireworms, cutworms, corn rootworms and seed-corn maggot.

Further information on this problem and recommended insecticides can be obtained at the local county Extension Office.

Mail Patrons Can Put Damper On Obscene Mail

Mail patrons offended by pandering advertisements can now take steps to curb such mail, Postmaster Charles Townes said today in announcing plans for administering a new law which gives each family the right to decide that an ad is "erotically arousing or sexually provocative."

When an advertisement sent through the mails is offensive on these grounds, a postal patron can now ask the post office to direct the mailer to send no more mail to him and to remove immediately the patron's name from all mailing lists he owns, controls or rents.

To assist patrons, the Post Office Department has published a brief pamphlet -- How You Can Curb Pandering Advertisements -- which is now available at the Tahoka post office. In addition to explaining how the law works, the pocket-size leaflet contains a form letter one can use when sending his complaints to the post office.

The pamphlet explains that when a patron receives an advertisement which is, in

his opinion, pandering, he must send the ad, its envelope and the form letter, or one which includes its language, to his post office with

the words, "Request for prohibitory order" on the face of the envelope.

If a mailer does not strike a complainant's name from

this mailing list, and the patron receives a second mailing 30 days after the first has received the prohibitory order, he may bring the matter to the attention of the postmaster issuing the initial order by writing him and enclosing the second pandering ad with its envelope. If the mailer still fails to respect the order, the Postmaster

General may ask the Attorney General to apply for a Federal Court order directing compliance. Failure to observe the order may be punishable by a fine or imprisonment.

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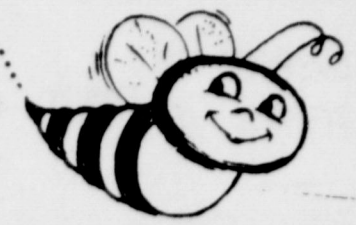

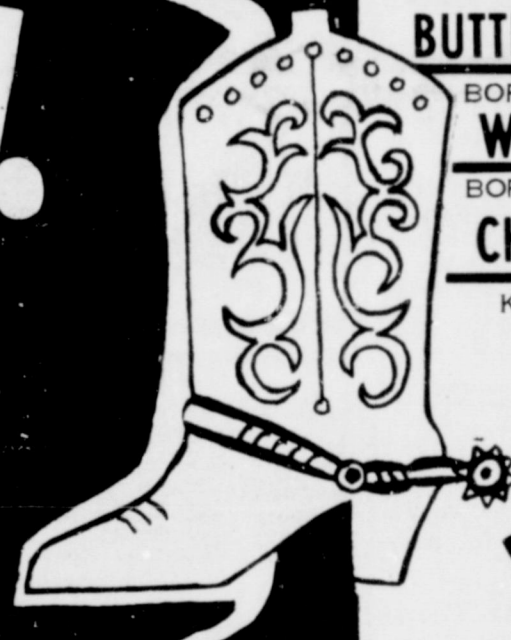
