merce has designated the week starting May 4th as "Clean Up and Beautify" Week. The cooperation of businessmen and other property owners will be needed to clean up some of the eye sores in our town. The City has a portable spraying rig and is going to spray the sidewalk around some of the vacant buildings to keep the grass and weeds from growing up through the cracks.

Businessmen are asked to clean up trash and litter around their stores and put it in boxes to be hauled off. Most of the stores have weeds growing at the back of the store that need to be cut. Tall weeds and grass are brooding places for mosquitoes and flies.

Property owners are asked to clean up around their homes and vacant rent houses. The City has a grass shredder that can be used on vacant lots. There is a minimum charge of \$3.00 for this service. Tahoka also has a street sweepter in operation but keeping the town clean still rests largely upon the individual. There are trash barrels located around the business district and people are urged to use them to dispose of litter.



TUITION RAISE PROPOSED ... Cordinating Board of Texas College and University System is urging legislation to boost tuition fees in senior institutions from \$50 to \$125 a semester.

Spokesmen said students should pay at least 25 per cent of the cost of education, and that is what the tuition fee hike would produce.

Board at the same time postponed action on a staff recommendation that it place new enrollment ceilings for the University of Texas at Austin (35, 000) and for Texas A.&I. University at Kingsville (7,500).

Private and independent college spokesmen, meanwhile called on the board for aid, including a "tuition equalization program" to place them in a better competitive position with state - supported schools.

Tuition recommendation calls for \$500 a semester fee for outof-state students. Junior college local boards would set their own tuitions but not at more than 75 per cent of senior college fees for in'district students or 90 per cent for out-ofdistrict enrollees.

Prepackaged slices, cubed or grated cheese usually cost more than wedges or sticks. Store brands usually cost less than national brands, but there may also be quality or flavor differences.

#### Farm Bureau Strives To Build Better Image

Lynn County Farm Bureau is making a special effort this year to build a better image for agriculture, according to R.L. Dulin of New Home, president of the local farm organization.

"We hope to do this by explaining to the consuming public how farmers and ranchers are helping hold down the cost of living," the Farm Bureau leader said. Food continues to be a tremendous bargain for consumers primarily because farmers and ranchers have almost doubled their productivity in the past ten years, he added.

The statewide campaign, which is being coordinated by the Texas Farm Bureau, will utilize publicity in newspapers and on radio and television as well as some locally-sponsored messages on those media, Dulin said. He added that others in agriculutre , particularly agri-business firms and grocery stores, would be asked

As an example of how farm ers have increased their efficiency, Dulin said that a farmer today feeds 45 persons, the average investment per May God Bless all of you, farm has jumped from almost \$44,000 to almost \$93,000 in the

The farm leader said that the average American family spends only about 16 percent of its after-tax income for food, compared to some 30 percent spent in Europe and 50 percent in Russia. Also, the A. merican housewife has a large variety of wholesome foods, attractively packaged and even pre-cooked in some instances, to choose from, he pointed out.

The Farm Bureau leader pointed out other examples showing that the consumer is still getting a bargain where food is

1. To buy a pound of white bread 40 years ago required 91/2 minutes of factory labor.

and takes only 41/2 minutes to-

2. It took 50 minutes of factory labor to buy a pound of round steak 40 years ago, compared to only 24 minutes today. 3. A dozen eggs required

341/2 minutes of factory labor 40 years ago, yet a dozen eggs today can be purchased with wages from only 11 minutes of factory work.

4. It took 151/2 minutes of factory labor to buy a quart of milk 40 years ago, compared to just 6 minutes today. 5. An hour's wages today will buy 57 percent more fruits and vegetables than an hour's would buy 20 years ago.

What all this adds up to, is that the American consumer of today spends less and less of his income for food, leaving him more money for better housing, medical care, recreation, and all the other things
