

March weather in this area has been very much out of the ordinary with several records having been set and others threatened, according to Frank Hill, local observer for the U.S. Weather Bureau.

A new precipitation record of 3.48 inches was set this

March in Tahoka. There were 15 days in which there was rain, snow, sleet, mist or fog.

There were 17 days when the thermometer hit a low of 32 degrees or less, the lowest point being 20 degrees on March

There were only two days when blowing dust was recorded no days recorded as a sand-

Although farmers report the soil is soaked "to the bottom", there have been several years in which more rainfall was recorded the first three months

This year, Tahoka has had 4.23 inches of moisture, all coming in February and March against an annual 42-year average of 1.94 inches and a March average of .66 inches.

Previous record for March was in 1968, when 2.84 inches was recorded here. Also, an all-time record for the first three months was set that year with 6.06 inches of precipita-

In 1969, Tahoka received 3.33

inches of mositure the first 3 months of the year; 4.52 inches in 1958; 4.67 in 1949, 4.65 in 1941, and 3.76 in 1915.

Average for the first three month locally is 1.94 inches.



#### WHAT SHOULD MY WILL CONTAIN?

An "executor" is the one who, after the death of the will maker, carries out the instructions in a will, pays the debts and protects and manages the property until it can be delivered to those who get it. If a will does not appoint an executor, the probate court will ap-

It is also desirable that the will name another executor to serve in case the person first named can't serve

The will should state that the executor need not post a surety bond. Otherwise, the probate court will require the person named as executor to furnish a bond to the court. The cost of the bond is paid out of the estate.

#### PROVISION FOR INDEPENDENT ADMINIS-TRATION

Texans enjoy the advantages of a probate procedure known as "independent administration," which greatly reduces the costs and delays in

#### PROVISION FOR PAYMENT OF DEBTS AND TAXES

The law requires the executor to pay debts and taxes. It usually is better for the will

not to say "pay my debts" because this might require payment in full of a mortgage which otherwise could be paid in monthly installments over a period of years. If property is to be inherited tax free with the death taxes being paid out of other property in the estate, this must be stated in the will.

#### PROVISIONS DISPOSING

OF THE PROPERTY In Texas a person may leave his property to anyone he chooses - relative or not for a good reason, a bad reason or no reason. He can give the property outright or provide that the person receiving the property is to enjoy it only during his lifetime (or for a certain period of time), and thereafter the property will go to another

The will should be written so that it covers all of the property. If this is not done, costly court proceedings may be necessary regarding omitted property.

A common mistake is giving away too much in the will. Cir cumstances may change between the time the will is signed and the time the maker

For example, say a person had property worth \$75,000 in 1966 when he made his will. He wanted his children to receive the biggest part of his estate, so he worded his will to give five relatives \$5,000 each with the rest of the estate go-

ing to the children. However, if his estate has shrunk to \$25,000 by the time he dies, the \$5,000 gifts will use up the entire estate and the children will get nothing. PROVISION FOR ALTER-NATE

#### DISPOSITION OF THE PROPERTY

When a person provides in his will that most of his property is to go to a certain person, it is wise to name a secondary person in the event the first one dies before the will

#### PROVISION FOR DEATH FROM A

COMMON ACCIDENT Suppose a husband's will leaves all his property to his wife, or to his parents if she dies before he does, and the wife's will leaves all of her property to the husband, or to her parents if he dies first.

Then, in a common accident the husband dies first and the wife dies 10 minutes later. Immediately upon the husband's death, his property goes to his wife and 10 minutes later, when the wife dies, the property goes to her parents, eliminating the husband's family entirely.

This is not wnat the parties really wanted and two estates within 10 minutes could result in two federal estate taxes and two Texas inheritance taxes. It happens often.

To avoid these problems, every will should contain a "common accident clause." It provides that if one spouse dies within 60 days of the other, the estate would go to

#### POWERS FOR THE EXECUTOR

So that the executor can administer the estate with the least amount of time, trouble and expense, he should be given broad powers. Special wording should be used in the will to provide those powers. Without it, his job is made more difficult.

#### PROVISION FOR GUARDIANSHIP

When the will maker has minor children, the will should appoint a guardian to serve if the other parent dies before the will takes effect.

#### REQUIRED FORMALITIES A will, of course, must be signed by the maker. Unless it is entirely written and signed

Action was taken under terms of a Travis County district court order enjoining the commission from permitting entry into Texas of cattle from Mexico in violation of health regulations. Associated Milk Producers of Texas filed the suit.

Early this year the Health Commission put TB testing requirements into effect on the border but suspended them two weeks later at the request of Governor Smith pending a hearing in El Paso on objections to the order. 

In most cases, insecticides

must be used to keep the pests under control. Insecticides come in several forms, such as dusts, wettable powders, liquid emulsified concentrates,aerosols and granules. Of major importance is the proper identification of the insect

which is causing the damage. Since some insects do their damage by sucking plant juices, they must be controlled by a contact insecticide. Insects which have chewing mouth parts can be controlled by an insecticide which they eat with their food.

Some manufacturers combine two or more chemicals into a singe preparation which have a wide range of use. It is always desirable to know what bug you are fighting.

As an aid to gardners, entomologist of the Texas Agriculural Extension Service have repared a leaflet, "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants" which lists the recommended insecticides for controlling most of the pests found around the yard and garden. Copies of this publication and others on insect and disease control are available in my

Label directions on all insecticide containers should be closely followed and application should not be made on windy



Polio vaccination with Salk killed-virus vaccine by a single booster dose four years later.

While rubella (German Measles) vaccine may be desirable for adults - except pregnant women . it will be available only in limited quanities in the near future. Consequently, much of the vaccine is being reserved for young children who are the major reservoir of

Marty, a divorced man, was fit to be tied when he found out that his former wife was doing a lot of drinking. What irked him most was that he was still sending her an alimony check once a month.

Finally, Marty went to court to demand a reduction of his alimony payments.

"I work mighty hard for that money," he informed the judge. "Why should I have to pay for her alcoholic binges?

However, he failed to win the reduction he sought. The judge said once his ex-wife had possession of the alimony, she had a right to spend it any way she pleased.

Most courts have taken a similar, hands-off attitude regarding the behavior of a divorcee. In fact, they have refused to cut her alimony even when she has engaged in immoral conduct with other men. One court summed up the mat-

er this way: "After the divorce, the parties go into the world as strangers to each other. (The wife) no longer

owes any duty of purity to the usband." Nevertheless, judges sometimes do reveal a degree of uneasiness bout the gay divorcee, as well as degree of sympathy for the exhusband-forced to foot the bills

for a woman who is not behaving the way she should. Accordingly there is a tendency to grant a reduction in alimony if, is a result of her misbehavior, the divorcee's financial needs are actually less than they were before.

That kind of situation arises, aid one court, when some new boy friend has taken on the task of supporting her.

And another court gave at least measure of consolation to a disgruntled husband. The court pointed out that if his former wife's misconduct would not be grounds for moving the alimony figure down, either would his own misconduct be grounds for moving the alimony







A) Scholarships are generally not taxable and do not have to be reported for tax purposes. Since there are many different types of scholarships, you will want to check with the organization that gave you the scholarship to see if they have information on its tax status.

Q) Why did IRS drop the short form 1040A?

A) One important reason was to make it easier for taxpayers to claim all the credits, deductions and exclusions they were entitled to under the tax laws. In recent years more and more taxpayers have found it to their advantage to itemize deductions as their income increased.

The new Form 1040 is one basic page and actually calls for just about the same information that had to be entered on the front and back of the old card form. Over 30 million returns will need just the one-page Form 1040 to be
