

## SOME SCHOOL HISTORY OF LYNN COUNTY SINCE 1903

SCHOLASTICS INCREASED FROM 147 IN 1903 TO 519 IN 1914  
FROM TWO ORGANIZED SCHOOLS IN THAT YEAR  
TO SIXTEEN NOW—BETTER BUILDINGS

At the invitation of County Judge Stokes, The News man went over to the court house one day the first of the week to get the number of scholastics for the school year 1914-15. While there we became interested in looking through the records for the eleven years since Lynn county has been organized, and finding some figures we thought would be of interest to our readers we give below the result of our research:

In the school year of 1903-4 there were only two schools in the county; No. 1, known as the Lynn school, about 11 miles north-east of the county seat town, Tahoka, had a scholastic enrollment of 50 and district No. 2, or Tahoka school had an enrollment of 97, making a total of 147 for the entire county.

For the year 1904-5 there is no record, but the record for the year 1905-6 shows seven districts laid off although two of them had not yet been named. The scholastic census by districts was as follows: Lynn, No. 1, 22; Tahoka, No. 2, 71; County Line, No. 3, 12; T-Bar, No. 4, 24; Moore's Draw, No. 5, 46; No. 6, 7; No. 7, 17; a total of 199, an increase of 52 in the two years.

With seven districts, the 1906-7 scholastic census shows in No. 1, 33; No. 2, 92; No. 3, 12; No. 4, 36; No. 5, is down on the record as McDonald with 62; West Point, No. 6, 15; Lakeview, No. 7, 13; gives a total of 263, an increase over the year before of 64.

The year 1907-8 was the best year Lynn county ever enjoyed from a school standpoint, until this year: With an increase of five new districts and 96 scholastics, it was a year of which to be proud. The census by districts was as follows: No. 1, 22; No. 2, 111; No. 3, 11; No. 4, 49; No. 5, with its name changed to South East, 27; No. 6, 13; No. 7, 20; Drrw, No. 8, 31; Midway, No. 9, 34; Morgan, No. 10, 14; Bailey, No. 11, 12; Minor, No. 12, 15; a total of 359.

1908-9 shows an increase of one district and 35 scholastics as follows: No. 1, 26; No. 2, 119; No. 3, 10; No. 4, 62; No. 5, with name changed from South East to McDonald, 12; No. 6, 13; No. 7, 25; No. 8, 35; No. 9, 25; No. 10, 13; No. 11, recorded as Joe Bailey, 20; No. 12, 23; No. 13, 11; a total of 394.

The year 1909-10 also shows an increase of 41. The records for the several districts were as follows: No. 1, 29; No. 2, 121; No. 3, 11; No. 4, 71; No. 5, is known on the records as McDonald-East Draw, 7; No. 6, 18; No. 7, 27; No. 8, 30; No. 20; No. 10, 18; No. 11, 28; No. 12, 26; Edith, No. 13, 29; a total of 435 for the 13 districts.

The two years of 1910-11 and 1911-12 do not show upon the records anywhere, so we have to jump to the year 1912-13 with an increase of only three scholastics for the three years. There were two new districts laid out however and we find the scholastics by districts to be as follows: No. 1, 18; No. 2, 148; No. 3, 50; No. 4, was divided into two schools having 10 scholastics each making 20 for the district;

while No. 5 shows no scholastics at all; No. 6, 12; No. 7, 21; No. 8, 14; No. 9, 7; No. 10, 17; No. 11, 23; No. 12, 38; No. 13, 21; No. 14, Three Lakes, 23; No. 15, O'Donnell, 24; total 438.

The year 1913-14 is the only one in the eleven years since the organization of the county that shows a decrease, and although another district was created there was a decrease of 21 scholastics for the county. No. 1, 24; No. 2, 120; No. 3, now known as Pride, 36; No. 4, 26; No. 5, 9; No. 6, 13; No. 7, 21; No. 8, 16; No. 9, 13; No. 10, 14; No. 11, 19; No. 12, 83; No. 13, 13; No. 14, 16; No. 15, 24; No. 16, Wilson, 20; a total of only 417. While six districts show small gains seven show losses especially Tahoka with its loss of 28 that more than offsets the gains.

This year of 1914-15 however we have come alive again and show an increase of 192 for the county, although four districts show a combined loss of 14. The census returns just finished for this school year shows as follows: No. 1, Lynn, 20; No. 2, Tahoka, 155; No. 3, Pride, 35; No. 4, T-Bar, 37; No. 5, East Draw, 10; No. 6, West Point, 19; No. 7, Lakeview, 17; No. 8, Draw, 22; No. 9, Midway, 8; No. 10, Morgan, 16; No. 11, Joe Bailey, 24; No. 12, New Home, 42; No. 13, Edith, 20; No. 14, Three Lakes, 12; No. 15, O'Donnell, 37; No. 16, Wilson, 38; a total of 519.

We give below this years census for Lynn county by age and sex: Seven years old, male 29, female 24, total 53; eight, male 24, female 25, total 49; nine, male 34, female 25, total 59; ten, male 27, female 23, total 50; eleven, male 29, female 23, total 52; twelve, male 35, female 30, total 65; thirteen, male 22, female 26, total 48; fourteen, male 31, female 22, total 53; fifteen, male 30, female 24, total 54; sixteen, male 19, female 18, total 37; total males 280, total female 239; all white, Americans 500, Germans 18, Bohemian 1 total 519.

Of course the above does not show how many pupils each school had enrolled during any of the past terms or how they will stand this coming term, as there will be many transfers and then there the overs and unders, which may run the actual attendance in the county by the time schools begin this fall up to the 600 mark, and will likely change the individual district attendance considerably, but the census for this year is what the state apportionment is based upon.

There are not many counties in Texas that can make a better showing in school statistics for a period of eleven years, especially the first eleven years of their existence, than the above showing of Lynn county. An increase of 372 onto a start of 147 in eleven years, with a steady increase every year but one, is not so bad after all.

The Tahoka High School, of the First Class, has 155 scholastics for the coming year. Will employ six teachers exclusive of the Music, Expression and Art. Four of the teachers have al-

ready been employed in the Tahoka school: Prof. Hazel, superintendent; Prof. Carl Montgomery, principal; Misses Kate and Lucy Gathings, the two lower rooms. Two other schools in the county have contracted for their teachers: West Point, Miss Vera Noble, a Lynn county girl, and Three Lakes, Miss Lenora Rogers, of Dawson county. While we understand the O'Donnell trustees have not signed up any contract as yet, it is practically decided that Prof. W. B. Bishop of Tahoka, will hold the position of principal, and Mrs. Clarence Keever also of Tahoka, the primary.

Tahoka has a splendid \$16,000 brick building well equipped, O'Donnell is now building a new \$2,500 building. Wilson has a building which although not a large one is as nicely finished as one could wish for. New Home, Lynn and Edith schools are well housed, and most of the school houses in the county are above the country school house of the State, although a few are nothing but rat traps and should be sold for barns and decent houses built in their places.

After making improvements on some of the houses, considerable improvement in equipment for most, the thing we will need most is the laying out and working of good roads to the various school houses throughout the entire county. If we will only put as much thought and effort into looking after the interests of our children as we do our farms, livestock, business and profession, we will advance much more rapidly the next decade than we have in the past.

## DO NOT STOP CULTIVATING THE CORN AND COTTON

HAVE YOU "LAID YOUR CROP BY?" YOUR YIELD DEPENDS  
ON THE AMOUNT OF WORK YOUR CROP RECEIVES  
BETWEEN NOW AND HARVEST TIME

In the country correspondence of the press of the State, the statement is becoming frequent that "the farmers are almost ready to lay by their corn and cotton." Texas has had an unusually wet spring, which very probably indicates a dry summer and it is a well known fact that plants do not root so deeply in the wet springs. Therefore, if there has ever been a time when the crops should receive frequent shallow cultivation up to the time of making the ear or opening of the boll that time is now. Maintaining the soil mulch by cultivation will keep all the moisture in the ground, moisture that will be greatly needed if there should be a season of drouth. Two or three late plowings of corn have been known to make a difference of from five to twenty per cent in the yields, and this difference expressed in dollars and cents will mean a good deal later on. Farmers should not be too ready to "lay by," since keeping at it will make the crops more profitable. HERE IT EHE ADVICE GIVEN TO THE FARMER BY COL. EXALL.

"We quit cultivating all of our crops too soon; laying by a crop, which means throwing a little earth to it and deserting it, costs this country a hundred million dollars a year. If I should tell you that the Fair Association

had offered \$500 as a premium for the best yearling steer that would be shown this year, and that I had bought a good calf on the first of January that would be just the right age to show in October, that I had fed him properly balanced ration, right in quantity and quality, had taken first-class care of him in every way and that he had responded splendidly to the treatment and that on the first day of July he weighed 900 pounds and I had said to him:

"Buck, you have often heard me say that I am going to show you at the Fair and hope to win a premium. Now, it is true that the grass is a little short and the water is somewhat scarce and there are ticks and mosquitoes and other things to contend with but you have had such an unusual opportunity in the early part of your life, you are so vigorous, big and strong that it seems to me that you ought to be able from now on to take care of yourself. I want to go fishing; there is the pasture; do the very best you can and meet me on the first of October and we will show, and I hope that we can win a prize."

You have possibly carefully prepared your land. I hope that you have selected your seed with care, that you have planted and cultivated it, keeping up a constant mulch cultivation, so as to lose no moisture by capillary attraction or unnecessary evaporation, and that you have not allowed any weed to get any nutriment or moisture that the crop should have, that you have religiously done all of these things until the corn is four feet high, vigorous and strong with a large amount of live weight to sustain and is just getting ready to determine whether it will raise one ear to the stalk or two ears, big ears or little ears, or no ears, according to whether there is enough food to sustain life, and then produce a crop, you as a rule, treat it just as I treated Buck—throw a little earth to it, say that you have "laid it by" and go fishing or somewhere else and leave it to fight the hot winds, the dry earth, the suckers and the weeds and get ready to perform its life work. You cannot expect, under such circumstances, to win any more than I could expect to win with my prize steer Buck."

Other crops of like nature should be cultivated with shallow cultivation that cuts no root but does prevent loss by evaporation and loss by growth of weeds, until they are fully matured.—Texas Industrial Congress.

## No Hatred of Mexicans and No Enmity Toward Mexico; Task One of Duty

THE WORK WHICH WE HAVE DETERMINED UPON AS TO MEXICO AND THE OBLIGATION WHICH WE HAVE WILLINGLY ASSUMED TOWARD THE PEOPLE OF MEXICO ARE A RESPONSE TO A CLEAR CALL OF DUTY, WITHOUT ANY REFERENCE WHATSOEVER TO THE WAY IN WHICH WE, AS INDIVIDUALS, MAY BELIEVE THE WORK SHOULD HAVE BEEN OR SHOULD BE DONE.

There seems to be no elation in this country over the task which the administration, with reluctance, has taken up. There does seem, however, to be a widespread sense that whatever shall be done in Mexico shall be done in the spirit of obligation toward the people of Mexico, toward Mexico as a neighbor and toward the peoples of the world who have aided in Mexican industrial progress.

IT IS NOT SINGULAR, THEREFORE, THAT THERE SHOULD EXIST ON THE PART OF THOSE TO WHOM HAS BEEN GIVEN THE LEADERSHIP AND CONTROL IN THE WORK IN WHICH WE ARE NOW ENGAGED NO HATRED OF THE MEXICANS AND NO ENMITY TOWARD MEXICO. THE TASK IS ONE OF DUTY, AND IT WILL BE ACCOMPLISHED AS A DUTY. NO SPIRIT OF CONQUEST ANIMATES THE ADVENTURE, AND NO ONE IS UPHOLDING THE HANDS OF THE ADMINISTRATION IN THIS TRYING TIME WITH A VIEW OF CONQUERING A NEIGHBORING NATION AND ADDING ITS TERRITORY TO OUR OWN.

## Permanent Trouble In Mexico Unless United States Sends Army There

IT is either intervention or continued trouble south of the Rio Grande. The situation has reached such a stage that it is an ABSOLUTE NECESSITY THAT THE UNITED STATES SEND TROOPS INTO THE COUNTRY TO RESTORE PEACE, and I think that there is no other way that peace can be restored and the lives and property of Americans and citizens of European countries be protected.

every farmer had begun in time to get ready for the exhibit. Lynn county will have a Fair this fall. Will you be ready for it.

On the front page of this paper is an article from the Texas Industrial Congress about "Laying by your crops." It will be time profitably spent for every farmer in Lynn county to read this article; it is fairly saturated with truth. This very week we had a farmer tell us he had laid by his corn, which was "mule back high." Now perhaps this farmer is like most farmers in this country, over-cropped. Nevertheless, he should not lay a crop by on that account. He should keep right on plowing, cultivating and hewing just as long as his crop is growing, both to keep out the weeds and keep in the moisture. We knew a farmer in Hood county who always plowed his corn after every body else had quit and the last time he plowed his corn he planted cow peas between the rows of corn. The cow peas did not hardly take any

moisture from the corn until it was too hard to feed it, and anyway they keep the weeds down so well that they did not take as much moisture from the corn as the weed would have. After he had gathered his crop he had the best pasture of anyone in the country. Besides when he plowed under the pea vines he added more to the soil than the crop had taken away. The time to lay your crop by is when it is harvested.

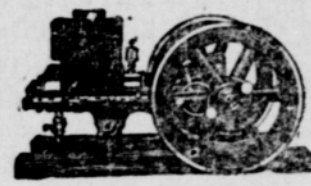

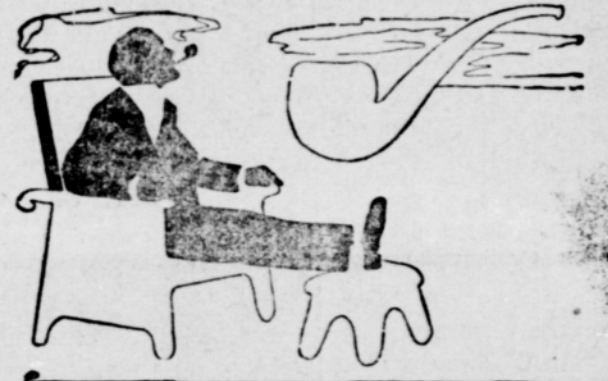

## COL. BALL'S CHALLENGE ACCEPTED

Farmers' Union Officials Will  
Defend Their Organization  
and Suggest Joint Debate.

Statement Issued Showing Rela-  
tion of Farmers' Union With  
Texas Business Men's  
Association.

Fort Worth, Texas.—We notice from the press that Col. Thos. H. Ball, prohibition candidate for governor, has charged the Farmers' Union with receiving funds from improper sources and making improper application of the funds.

We will accept his challenge against the honesty and integrity of the Farmers' Union and will meet him in twenty joint debates and defend our organization from his charges and insinuations. We will, of course, expect Col. Ball to answer a few questions which we will propound to him during the debates.

We want it distinctly understood that the Farmers' Union is non-partisan and this position must be protected in the proposed debate, as we will, under no circumstances, be drawn into a discussion in which the political fortunes of any candidate are involved. Our only purpose is to defend the Farmers' Union against adroit attacks made upon it by Col. Ball and his political associates.

We, as the authorized representatives of that vast body of men who bare their backs to the summer sun and who feed and clothe the world, ask that Col. Ball at least give us an opportunity to correct his misrepresentation before his own audiences and to answer the charges that he and his authorized representatives have made against the organized farmers during the past few months.

We hope that Col. Ball will not insist on sending a hired hand to substitute for him in this discussion, as the charges have been made by him personally and he should personally meet the issue, or apologize and discontinue slandering our organization.

**Too Much Free Advice.**

We have been receiving with patience and long-suffering a large volume of advice from political experts telling us how to run the Farmers' Union. Our constitution forbids any one belonging to the Farmers' Union except those who follow the plow and, certainly, we could not accept counsel from politicians who have been dodging the plow handles all their lives. We want to say that the Farmers' Union is an organization of farmers and is being run by farmers in the interest of the farmers, and we will not wear the brass collar of the political bosses.

Col. Ball has recently taken extraordinary interest in the welfare of the Union and has been giving considerable FREE advice to our organization—a very unusual thing for a lawyer to do—but the farmers of this State have learned by bitter experience to avoid a corporation attorney as they would a leper and, in any event, when we want advice we will select our own counsel. We are duly authorized to act for the Farmers' Union, understand it's

constitution and by-laws and likewise understand the farmer and his needs, and we will run the job.

Why is it Col. Ball wants to keep the farmers' organization out of politics and the church organization in politics? If he is as much a stranger to the cross as he is to the plow handles we do not believe he is competent to direct their affairs.

**Beware of Campaign Slanderers.**

We want to warn the farmers against campaign liars. Any person who wants to circulate a campaign lie should be compelled to take out a license and be properly tagged. We think this State is suffering as much from liars as it is from drunkards. We believe the man who lies when he talks is as dangerous to society as a man who staggers when he walks. We think honesty is as much a virtue as sobriety and we want the youths of Texas saved from a liar's hell as well as from a drunkard's grave. There is no more pitiful sight in civilization than an innocent preacher circulating a campaign falsehood, and there is no more disgusting spectacle on earth than a preacher-writer wilfully misrepresenting facts. The Farmers' Union stands for truth, sobriety and progress, but not for any one of these virtues at the expense of all others.

**The Wisdom of Peace.**

Much has been said about the Farmers' Union asking for a temporary cessation of liquor strife and that seems to be the bone of contention in this campaign, but we point to the present state of the public mind as proof of the soundness of our position in contending that agricultural legislation can not receive proper consideration while the liquor question is in the way, and as forcibly demonstrating a condition that will exist at the state capitol next January if the legislature deals with this matter, for there can be no simpler form of handling the subject than to vote yes or no to a liquor controversy as now presented to the public. We wish there were some way whereby the liquor warriors could fight it out without disturbing those who desire to engage in peaceful pursuits, but that seems impossible.

It shall not be our policy, as a rule, to reply to enemies of the Farmers' Union, or to make explanations to political critics. We have no authority and no desire to report to anyone except those who have commissioned us to act. Our work is open and above board and there will be no change in the course we are now pursuing. We are carrying out the instructions of the State Convention of the Farmers' Union and we will continue to perform the task assigned to us with such ability as we possess.

We are receiving funds for the work from sources regularly authorized by the Union and from no other channels and in no greater amounts this year than last; we are spending it for identically the same purposes, employing the same methods and insofar as we are able to do so, the same men. The time of the undersigned is devoted exclusively to the cause of the Farmers' Union and not a moment is given to any other cause, industry or interest.

The minutes of all meetings and the books of the Union are open for inspection to all members of the Farmers' Union in good standing, and at our annual meeting in August the usual re-

### Relation With Texas Business Men's Association Explained.

Our constitution announces co-operation as one of the fundamental principles of the Farmers' Union and we have solicited and received the co-operation of the business interests in promoting the welfare of the farmers. With their assistance we have for two seasons been able to finance distress cotton at six per cent, which is more than all the politicians of Texas ever did for the farmers. We are planning to build warehouses, to provide money through rural credits to build homes and to better marketing methods. In order to carry on this work in a comprehensive manner, organization is essential and legislation necessary. The Texas Business Men's Association is helping us bear the burden of organization work, and we hope they will assist us in securing the proper legislation. That organization has never requested or suggested that we support any measure in the legislature or before the people, or any candidate for office, and the platform of principles adopted at our annual meeting is the Farmers' Union's own document. The Farmers' Union at its State meeting last January adopted a resolution requesting farmers and other business men to run for the legislature and many patriotic citizens have responded heartily to our call.

We are proud of our associations with two of the most honorable and influential organizations, composed of upright, progressive and religious men of this State, viz., the Farmers' Union and Texas Business Men's Association. It is through the work of these two organizations that the farmers and the city business men must look for results.

The farmers of this State are tired of listening to platitudes and denunciations of politicians, and we shall look to co-operation with the business men for relief and let the demagogues howl. We await Colonel Ball's reply with interest.

**Wisest Course In Mexico Would Be to Blockade All Ports**

By Former President WILLIAM H. TAFT

THE BEST EXPERT ESTIMATE OF THE FORCE REQUIRED BY US TO GARRISON THE NECESSARY TOWNS, SUPPRESS GUERRILLA WARFARE AND TRANQUILIZE MEXICO IS FOUR HUNDRED THOUSAND MEN, AND IT IS SAID THAT THIS WOULD TAKE TWO OR THREE YEARS AND INVOLVE AN EXPENDITURE OF ONE MILLION DOLLARS A DAY.

The wisest course for us to pursue, if the duty is before us of suppressing anarchy in Mexico, would be to blockade all the Mexican ports because the military weakness of the country is not in lack of hardy men, but in lack of military supplies and in lack of food provision.

If we could be content to take the seaports and blockade the country while we were making reasonable preparation for the task, then when ready for action we could do the work at the least cost of life and time and money. But the public might grow impatient with this counsel of prudence. We would probably have to act quickly and possibly meet some painful mishaps due to lack of preparation.

THE SUPPRESSION OF GUERRILLA BANDS WOULD BE DRAWN OUT. DISEASE IN THAT COUNTRY WOULD THIN OUR RANKS MORE THAN BULLETS. THEN, AFTER HAVING LOST THOUSANDS OF LIVES AND EXPENDED A TREASURE DOUBLE THAT WHICH IT HAS COST US TO GIVE TO THE WORLD THE PANAMA CANAL, WE WOULD HAVE ON OUR HANDS A HOSTILE MEXICAN PEOPLE, WITHOUT ANY GRATITUDE FOR OUR SACRIFICES.

ENGLAND IS A QUARTER OF A CENTURY AHEAD OF THE UNITED STATES BECAUSE OF THE WORKING OUT OF PROBLEMS CONCRETELY. WHILE WE STILL ARE DISCUSSING WORKING OUT THESE PROBLEMS OVER HERE AND THEREBY AVOIDING THE MISTAKES WHICH OTHERWISE ARE INEVITABLE. THEIR SOCIAL ISOLATION CERTAINLY IS IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION, EVEN THOUGH IT IS NOT GIVING UNIVERSAL SATISFACTION. TAKE THE MUCH DISCUSSED INSURANCE ACT. THERE IS DISSATISFACTION AT BOTH ENDS. IT IS COSTING THE GOVERNMENT TOO MUCH, AND THE BENEFITS ARE TOO SMALL. BUT IT ISN'T AN EASY MATTER TO STRIKE THE RIGHT MEDIUM. THAT HAS TO BE DEVELOPED BY EXPERIENCE, AND TO PERFECT THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE INSURANCE LAW ALSO TAKES TIME.

I am amused at the different treatment accorded to captains of industries and trust creators in England and the United States. They are MADE PEERS IN ENGLAND and CRIMINALS IN AMERICA.

**Japan Has Nothing to Gain by Going to War With the United States**

By Dr SHOSHUKO SATO. Assigned by Emperor of Japan to Study California Question

I HAVE MADE A STUDY OF THE CALIFORNIA SITUATION, AND IN MY REPORT TO MY GOVERNMENT I WILL STATE THAT, IN MY OPINION, THERE IS ONLY ONE WAY TO SETTLE THE DIFFERENCES BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND JAPAN, AND THAT IS BY GRANTING THE JAPANESE NOW HOLDING LAND IN CALIFORNIA CITIZENSHIP. WHEN THIS IS DONE JAPAN WILL HAVE NO FURTHER TROUBLE WITH THE UNITED STATES.

There are at present about one hundred thousand Japanese in the United States, and more than half of that number are qualified to become citizens of this country. I will also recommend that no more immigrants come to this country, for if they should it would only have a tendency to renew the feeling in Japan.

THE MATTER CAN EASILY BE ARRANGED BY MAKING AN AGREEMENT OR NEW TREATY BETWEEN THE COUNTRIES. JAPAN HAS NOTHING TO GAIN BY GOING TO WAR WITH THE UNITED STATES, AND I PERSONALLY DO NOT THINK THAT A CONFLICT BETWEEN THE TWO NATIONS WILL EVER OCCUR.
