## Tahoka Blast Indians 22-15 Christmas Seal Campaign Begins

### Meet Denver City Here Friday

The Tahoka Bulldogs blasted the Morton Indians last Friday night by a score of 22-15. The Bulldogs put together a brilliant offense with a rough and tumble defense to upset the favored redskins.

The Indians scored first on a safety when punter Reggie Stark was tackled behind his own goal line. Mr. Morton then scored a TD in the first period when Quarterback Keith Embry threw a pass to Tailback Elton Patton for a 42 yard touchdown play. Mike Bryan kicked the PAT for a 9-0 lead for the Indians at the end of the first period.

Tahoka got in the scoring columns in the second period when Quarterback Martin Warren threw a pass to Johnny Martin for 22 yards that ended on the Indians 1 yard line and Martin went over from the one on a keeper over center. Jimmy McCord kicked the PAT.

The first half ended with Morton out front by a score of 9-7. In the third period the Bulldogs went ahead for the first time when Larry Durham bucked over for a six-pointer and again McCord kicked the PAT to go out front 14-9.

The Bulldogs then pushed Morton into a hole and tackled the Indian Quarterback in the end zone for a safety and ended the third period leading Morton 16-9.

Scoring in the fourth period began when Warren scored on a 19-yard keeper play behind some good blocking by Bulldog offensive linemen around left end. The PAT was no good to end Bulldog scoring and bring their total to 22 points. The Indians ran a 16 yard TD in the fourth period to end the scoring for the night with a 22-15 victory for Big Blue.

West Texas Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association has announced November 12 as the opening day of the 63rd Annual Christmas Seal Campaign. Over 110,000 letters will be delivered to the citizens of the twenty-three county West Texas Area. Dr. Taylor Evans, Lubbock orthodontist, area campaign Chairmansaid, "Although the actual work of fighting tuberculosis and other respiratory diseases falls upon the medical researchers, and official health agencies, the responsibility for continuing the fight lies within the generosity of every West Texas resident."

He added, "Ninety-three percent of the amount raised from Christmas Seals in Texas stays here to support these local programs: Adult health education, public school anti-smoking education, skin testing for tuberculosis, mobile x-ray unit surveys, tuberculosis clinics, and respiratory disease classes."

Jay Eagan, CLU, is Campaign co-chairman, Kenneth Freeman, PhD, is university chairman, and John Christmann 111 is publicity chairman. Honorary Chairman for West Texas is Football Hall of Fame great, Sammy Baugh of Rotan. Local chairman for the campaign is Mrs. Wayne C. Huffaker. She is serving her second year as board of director in the West Texas Association. Members also from Tahoka are Mrs. Ronnie Nettles and Mrs. Tommy Sterling.

Helping with the campaign are Sheila Tankersley, Donna Edwards, Vicki Owens, Cathy Leaveritt, Yolanda Chapa, Connie Miller, and Betty Owens. These girls are doing this as their community goal in their state degrees.

Mrs. Huffaker stated, "Because last year 3,216 Texans had TB, 440,000 Americans had emphysema, and 913,000 in all found for the first time that they suffered from a disabling lung ailment, we ask you to show the world that you are doing something about it. Use Christmas Seals. It's a Matter of Life and Breath."

### Four Accidents In Lynn County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of October according to Sergeant Hal Pirtle, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in five persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$5,175.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1969 shows a total of 63 accidents resulting in four persons killed, 64 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$63,612.00.

Traffic wise, November and December are noted as dangerous months for pedestrians. During the last two months of 1968 in Texas there were 86 pedestrians killed and 843 injured in collisions with motor vehicles. Some of the attributing factors are: Longer hours of darkness, bad weather, holidays, and lack of drivers' and pedestrians' attention.

The veteran patrol supervisor listed some tips to aid both pedestrians and drivers. Always wear something light colored when walking after dark. If possible carry some kind of light and walk on the left side of the road facing traffic. If you have a dark colored raincoat or overcoat, put a strip or two of reflectorized material across the back and front when walking on the street or highway.

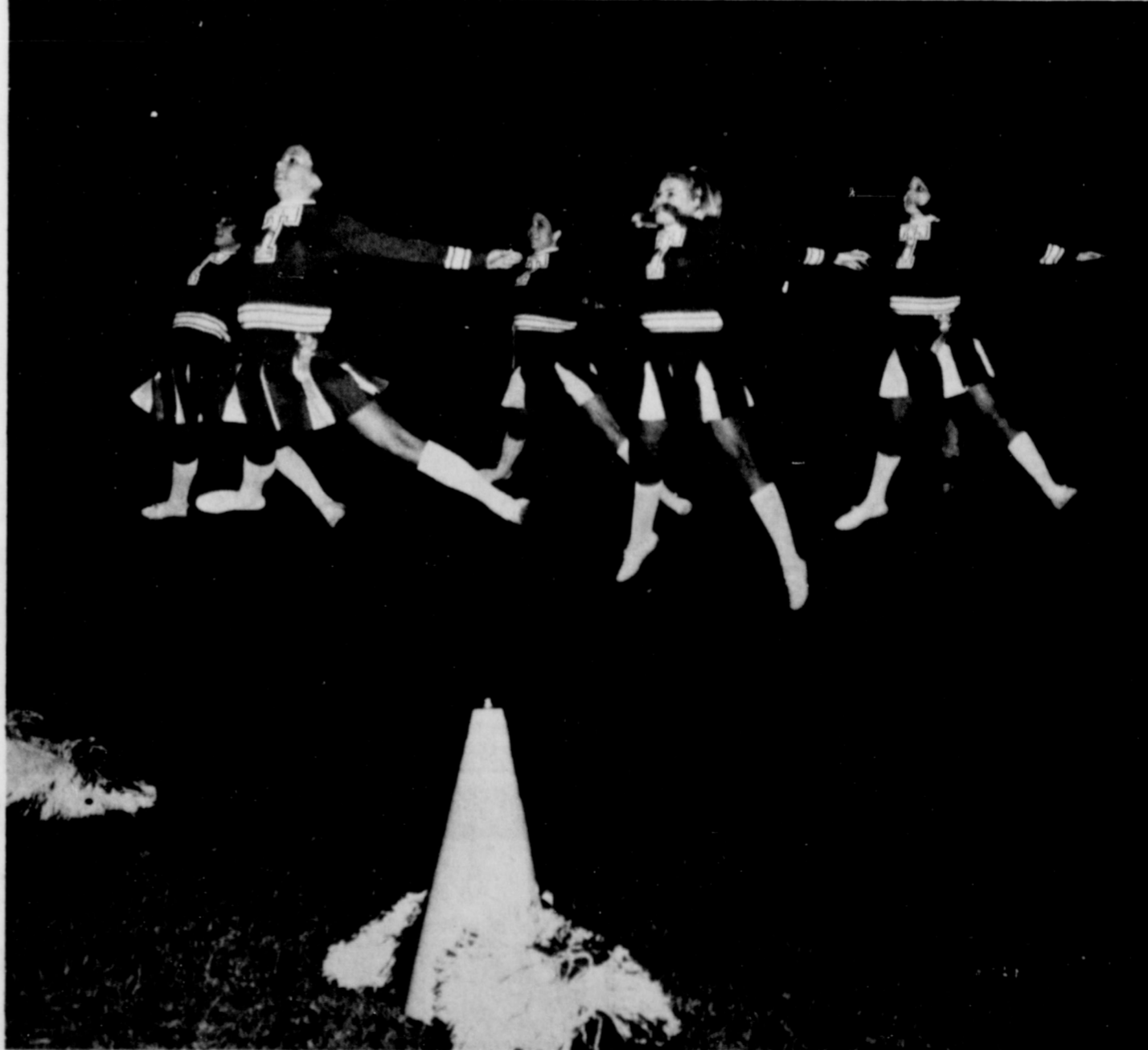
### Servicemen's Club Meets

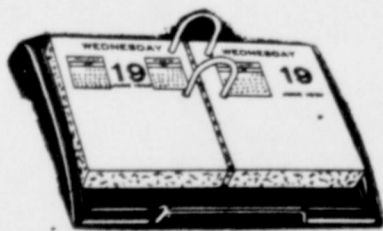

Mrs. Wilmer Smith, President of the National Ext. Homemakers Council, View, Texas, was in Chicago Oct. 26 attending the fourteenth annual meeting of the Women's Conference of the National Safety Council and the brunch immediately preceding it, in the Embassy Room of the Sheraton-Blackstone Hotel. The meeting was prior to the opening session of the 57th annual National Safety Congress.

Mrs. Smith is a member of the Women's Conference which comprises leaders from national women's and parents' organizations, as well as members-at-large from business, government and civic groups.

Conference members, at the annual meeting this October, gave consideration to the STATES Program (Safety Through Action To Enlist Support) which focuses on the support of the National Traffic Safety Standards established by the Secretary of Transportation, and to a pre-view of the Council's new Home Safety Course, with slides an script on Poison Prevention, Falls, Home Fires, and Electrical Appliances.

The Women's Conference stimulates participation in safety activities throughout the country by women's and parents organizations.

The National Safety Council is a privately supported, non-governmental public service organization chartered by the United States Congress for the purpose of preventing accidents on and off the job -- in industry, on the farm, at home, at play, and on the road.

### Investments Available Through Production Credit

Announcement has been made by Alton Strickland, President of Lubbock Production Credit Association, that is now possible for a member of a Production Credit Association to invest in Federal Intermediate Credit Bank debentures. Strickland reported, according to the last information available, the debentures would yield an estimate of 8 percent. Anyone other than a Production Credit Member who is interested in purchasing debentures may do so, but his purchase will have to be handled through his local bank.

Dwain Lusk, vice president of the Lubbock Production Credit Association, feels that there will be several farmers in this area who will want to take advantage of the substantial return on their investments.

Lusk also reports that during the entire operation of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank, there has not been a default on a debenture payment.

Tax Collections Slightly Under October 1968

State and county tax collections for the month of October 1969, are slightly under the month of October, 1968. Approximately 61 percent of taxes were paid in the month of October 1969, compared to 63 percent for the same month in 1968. This percentage figured before 3 per cent discount allowed for October tax payment. Total collections were \$184,300.02. Being distributed as follows: \$36,767.48 is State tax, \$109,637.83 is County tax, \$1,677.82 High Plains Water District tax, and \$36,216.89 goes to the hospital district.

A 3 percent discount was given on all taxes collected in October. 2 percent discount will be allowed for November and 1 percent will be allowed for December.

Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says....

During the last half of November some 40,000 Tex. ranchers and farmers will receive a livestock survey questionnaire from Cary Palmer, State Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This is a joint endeavor of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Statistical Reporting Service, U.S.D.A., to provide a program of county estimates for Texas.

In Texas there are 254 counties and each farmer in each county is an important part of the State's agriculture. Their reports are needed to provide accurate estimates for Texas cattle, hogs and chickens. Another survey on sheep and

goats will be made in late December. We urge each farmer to fill out his questionnaire carefully and return it promptly in the self-addressed envelope to the Agricultural Statistician. This will do much to provide the accurate data for the State.

County data bulletins for 1968 are now available by writing the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Box 70, Austin, or by writing John C. White, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, P.O. Drawer BB, Capitol Station, Austin.

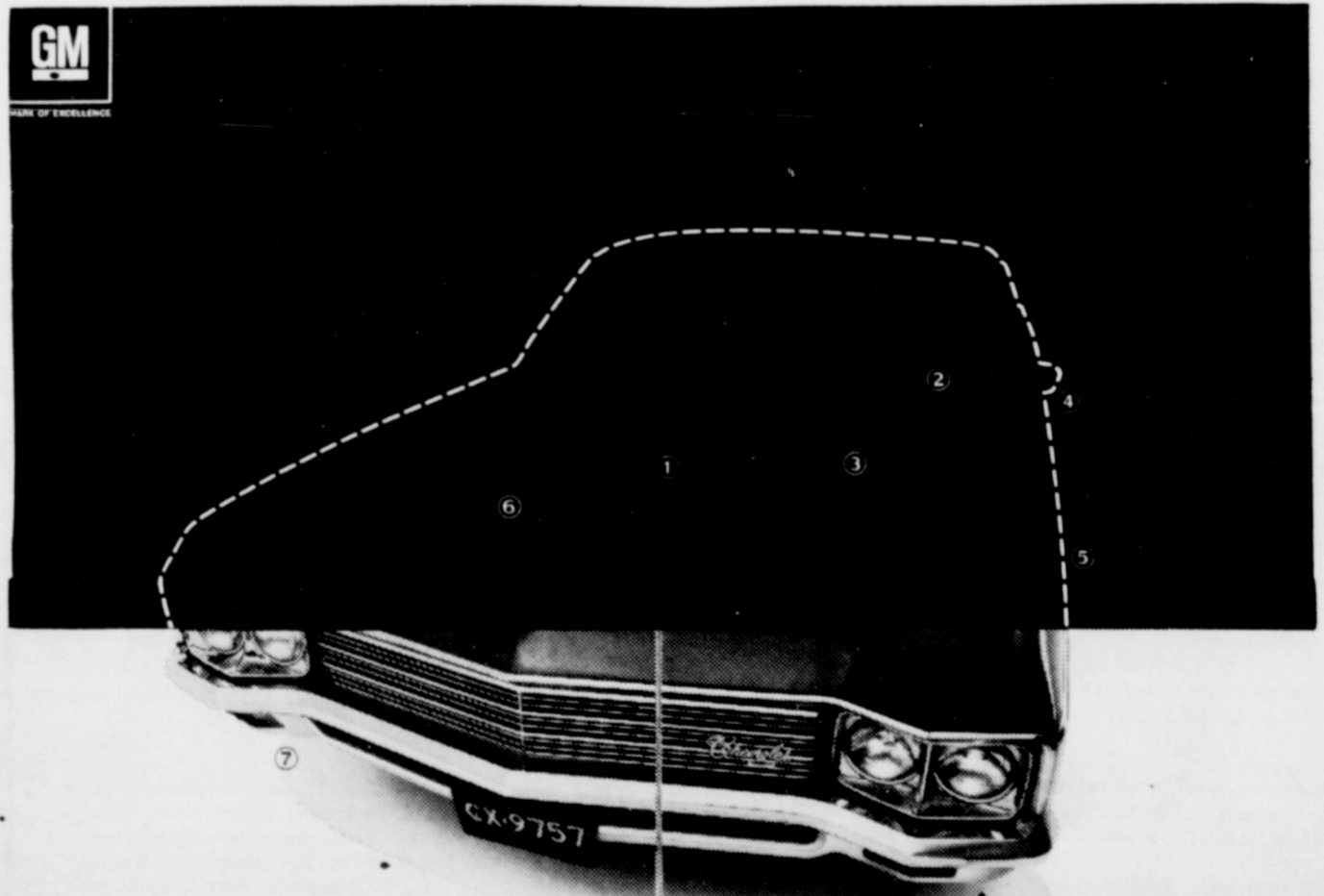

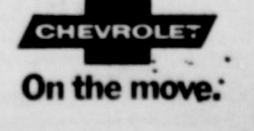
Kornegay farmed and operated a service station at New Home from 1925 until 1956. A veteran of World War I, he was a member of the American Legion.

**Drugs Topic At Lions Meeting**  
"Drugs of Abuse" and "The Effects of Drugs on the Nervous System" were the topics of discussion at the Tahoka Lions Club meeting October 30.

Pharmacist Dayton Parker was guest speaker and brought a film depicting the effects of drugs on the nervous system. Everyone is well aware of the increasingly heavy illegal use of drugs among young people in these high-gear, fast-paced modern times.

Three types of drugs, stimulants, depressants, and hallucinogens were covered in the 25 minute film. Parker handed out reprint brochures from the Food and Drug Administration Papers of July-August 1967 showing different types of drugs and narcotics in their medical form and color. The audience was then able to see what the psychedelic set refers to as "bennies," yellow jackets, goofballs, speed, downs and other names.

Parker was quick to point out that these drugs, when used under a doctor's supervision and control can be quite useful to mankind. This is especially true of the stimulants including the amphetamines and barbiturates and depressants including pentobarbital and secobarbital and other barbiturates. These same safe drugs which are a boon to mankind and his suffering become deadly killers when laid into the hands of kids out for 'kicks'. It is the misuse of these drugs that account for today's increasing narcotic problem.

Parker also pointed out that LSD, one of the hallucinogen drugs has no practical use, either medically or otherwise. LSD or Lysergic Acid Diethylamide is easily manufactured in clandestine laboratories and sold to users especially kids of high school and college age.

All in all, Parker's program was one of the better ones of late and very enlightening to the local club.

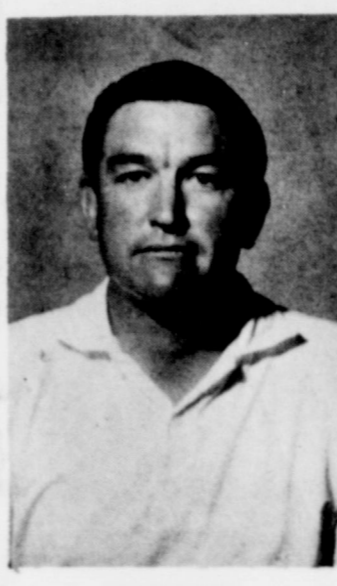

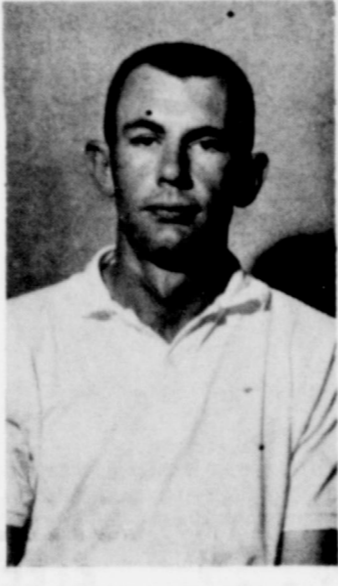
DEAN ANDREWS

## ASCS Report

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced on October 15, 1969, a revised National marketing Quota of 16,008,333 bales and a revised National acreage of 17 million acres for the 1970 crop of upland cotton.

This represents an increase of 941,666 bales in the quota and an increase of one million acres in the allotment from that announced on October 1, 1969.

The increase is brought about by the declining 1969 crop prospects caused primarily by abnormal weather conditions throughout much of the Cotton Belt. The increase in the quota and allotment is necessary in order to assure the maintenance of adequate stocks in the United States to provide and stable supply of the different qualities of cotton needed in the U.S. and in foreign cotton-consuming countries.

Also announced on October 15 were the following additional provisions of the 1970-crop program for upland cotton.

**DOMESTIC ACREAGE ALLOTMENT**  
For the 1970 crop, the farm domestic acreage allotment has been set at 65 percent of the farm acreage allotment, the minimum authorized by law.

Farmers who sign up to participate in the program and who plant at least 90 percent of their domestic acreage allotment, but not in excess of the permitted acreage for the farm, will be eligible for price-support loans and for price-support payments on the domestic allotment.

**SKIP-ROW RULES**  
The skip-row rules which were in effect for the 1969 crop will be applicable to the 1970 crop. In general, under these rules, only the land actually planted to cotton is counted as cotton land determining compliance with program provisions.

**LEASE & SALE OF ALLOTMENTS**  
The final date for filing applications for the transfer of Cotton allotment is Dec. 31, 1969. Allotments may be transferred to any farm regardless of whether it had an allotment in 1965 or has an allotment in 1970.

**PROJECTED YIELDS**  
A projected National yield of 500 pounds per acre has been established for the 1970 crop, a reduction of 45 pounds per acre from that set for the last three crop years.

Additional details for the 1970 cotton program will be announced at a later date.

Special cycles in new dishwashers include longer wash for greasy soil; shorter wash for fine china; and only for partial loads to thoroughly wash and dried dishes; plate warming; and sanitizing where water actually is heated in the dishwasher for longer at higher temperature. Models with two separate washes, each with fresh water and fresh detergent, wash dishes better. Number of rinses from one to four.

Dishwashers can be installed with casters and connections to the hot water faucet and to the sink. Because of recent developments, portable sales are making sales of installed dishwashers.

Washing action varied and each manufacturer designs a spray arm he thinks will do the best job of distributing water to the dishes.

Three types used today are blade compeller, revolving central tube and revolving arm.

The blade impeller is located in the center bottom on a motor to turn fast, sending the water in all directions at great pressure.

For hot water, this type has an advantage because there is no chance of the mechanism being plugged by water deposits since water is not heated through tiny holes.

However, blade impeller model washes may not have as fine a screen to filter food particles as they may be recirculated.

The revolving horizontal arm, attached in the upper part of the dishwasher, jets water through tiny holes along the arm as it revolves at high speeds.

The revolving wash arm is attached to the center bottom on the sides of the tub. Water jets out through holes in the arm which swings to distribute water.

Other considerations are the drying element, drain, capacity, special cycles, number of washes and number of rinses.

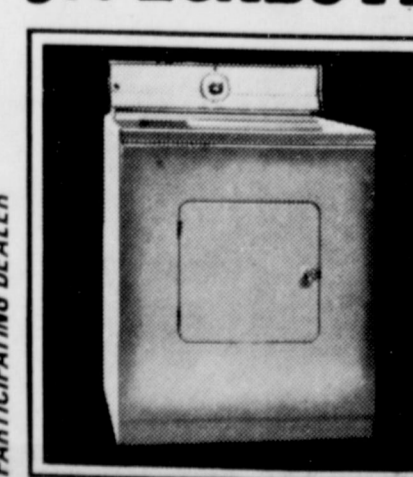
Net receipts totaled \$562.33; visitors share, \$243.38; leaving Tahoka's share of \$318.95.
