TE live in an age of extremists. We live in an age of iconoclasts. We live in an age of radical reformers who have the ear of many of the people. The danger to the people is that in a HYSTERIA OF SUPPOSED REFORM AND A HOPE OF AN IMPOSSIBLE MILLENNIUM the structure of our government may be so seriously affected and the relation between the government and the individual so substantially changed that it will take years to retrace the unwise step.

IN SUCH A TRANSITION PERIOD, IN SUCH A TIME WHEN THE SUDDENNESS OF PROGRESSIVE MEASURES SEEMS MORE IMPOR-TANT THAN THEIR WISDOM, WE NEED THE STAYING, CONSERVA-TIVE HAND OF THE SUPREME COURT NOT TO PREVENT REFORM BY THE EXERCISE OF POPULAR WILL, BUT TO PREVENT CHANGE BY POPULAR WHIM.

Collin County, which has more farmers than any ther county in the State and is the only county that has every foot of its tillable land under cultivation, has 4475 white and 135 negro tenant farmers. Ellis County, which produces more cotton than any other county in the State or any equal area on the globe, has 4005 white and 563 regro tenant farmers. We have a few Mexican farmers classed as discussing the tenant farmer, we whites but very few of them are in the black land belt of the State. The heavy negro farm population is in East Texas near the border. Harrison County leads with 3306 negro and 1295 white farm-

The Texas tenant farmer made that time he was not classified. ant farmers or 37 per cent of all of 219,575 and the per cent of increase to 53 and 2400 farmers per annum are now passing from home owners to tenants.

The Farm Laborer Has His Problems.

We have approximately 100,000 farm laborers in Texas and when they board themselves they receive \$1. 35 per day. Object of Scholarship to Know Mankind's Need; More Fruitful When Associated With Religion



By President WILSON, at Formal Opening of American University

HERE are races whom we despise, and it generally turns out that we despise them because we do not know them. We have not found the same common footing of humanity with which to touch and deal with them.

THE OBJECT OF SCHOLARSHIP, THE OBJECT OF ALL KNOWL-EDGE, IS TO UNDERSTAND, IS TO COMPREHEND, IS TO KNOW WHAT THE NEED OF MANKIND IS.
