

This patch will turn out a little better than onefourth 30 acres that will not make more than a bale or two.

The next planting of 15 acres, Mr. McLaurine says that next he planted with the rows the year he will plant all his cotton usual distance apart, and he will with the rows wider apart than not make quite one-fourth of a usual, but, not so far apart as bale to the acre. ### Lynn Leads The South Plains

a Cotton Country. Last Year's Crop 1038 Bales. Indications Are That We Will Nearly Double that this Year

The way cotton is coming into the afternoon train. Tahoka this season is proof positive of several things that the man "from Missouri" can easily gure out for himself.

First, Taboka is right in the enter of a rich, cotton growing ountry, for the Tahoka gin has lready turned out 270 bales and Lynn county is the cotton county of the South Plains for the Riley in has turned out 130 bales, naking 400 bales for the county and the season is just begun. Another thing is the fact that ahoka has, and always has had gin and ginners that make an exceptionally fine turnout of otton. This is so well an estabshed fact that many farmers ome here in preference to going a nearer gin. Our ginners e only charging 60 cents per undred for ginning, and are aying \$17 a ton for cotton seed. We have three cotton buyers nd as we go to press they are aying 9.67%. Or if a farmer ants to hold his cotton, he kes it to the yard, gets it inred and goes home perfectly
