At Local Bank

Pete Hegi Completes 40 Years Of Service

Fred (Pete) Hegi, President of the First National Bank, in Tahoka, completed forty years of service Sept. 1 with the local establishment. He started with the local bank in 1929.

Mr. Hegi started in the banking business here as a bookkeeper for Walter Slaton who served the bank as president for fifty years. He was farming at Petersburg with his Dad and Brothers and working in the Petersburg Bank, part time, for Mr. R. A. Jeffries, before coming to Tahoka. As Pete commented "I came to work at the bank for \$125 month, and that was a lot of money in those days".

The local banker graduated from Petersburg High School in 1925 and then took a business correspondence course in accounting. Pete, as most people know him said that banking had changed immensely since he went in to the business. He stated that, "In 1927 the First National Bank of Tahoka had deposits of 774,000 and today the bank has deposits of \$13,310,000" President Hegi said, "I remember when we reached one million on deposit, every newspaper in the district carried the story."

"Those were the days when everybody in the district played each other including Lubbock and Plainview". He is a member of the Masons, Rotary Club, and is on the Administrative Board of the Methodist Church. Pete married the former Madeline Cox, who was at that time Home Demonstration Agent in Lamesa. Pete was introduced to his wife by Judge Truett Smith.

They were married June 12, 1935. Pete's wife, Madeline, is homemaker teacher in the Tahoka school system. The Hegi's have two sons. John, a graduate of Baylor, is now serving as vice-president of the Lamesa National Bank in Lamesa. John is married to the former Sharon Jobe of Post and she is a teacher in the Lamesa schools. Fred Hegi, Jr. graduated from SMU with a B. A. then received his Masters from Harvard. He is presently working on his doctorate at the University of Texas. He is married to the former Jan Vestal of Snyder and they are both teaching in the Austin schools.

Ground School For Pilots Be Held

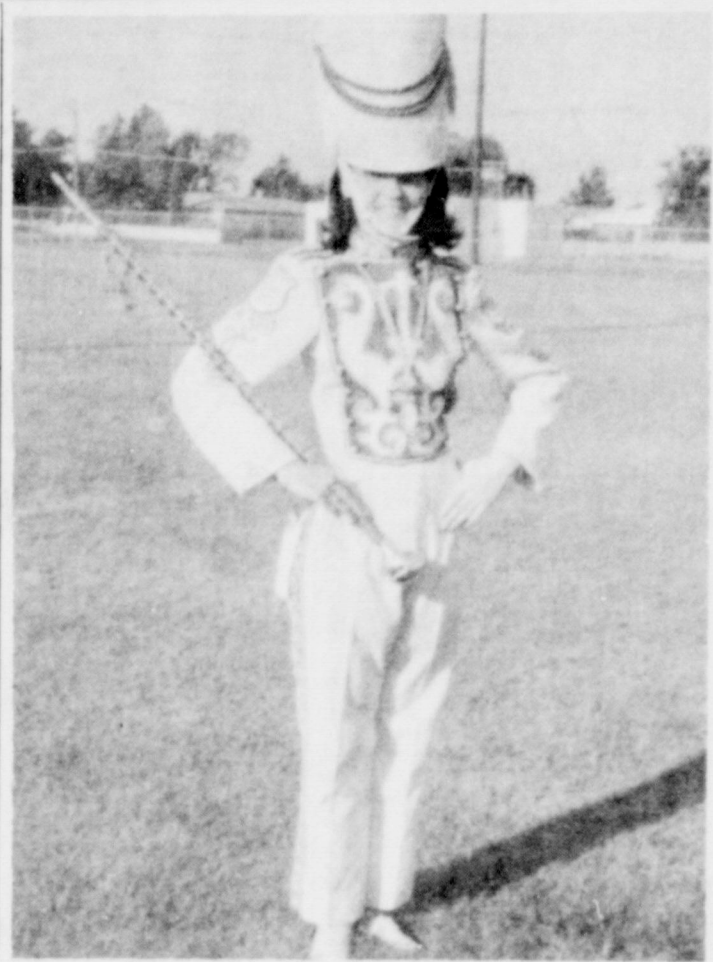
A ground school student pilot training will be at the City Hall, tonight at 7:30 p.m., Sept. 11.

Past Days In Lynn County

Copied from October 27, 1916 issue Lynn County News. The infant body of a new born babe was found in the Garnet pasture, about 14 miles southeast of Tahoka, Wednesday morning about eight o'clock.

One of the Garnet boys started for the horses about eight his attention was attracted to an object lying in a corner of the pasture, a few hundred yards from the house. Up on going closer he was horrified to find the mutilated body of an infant.

The discovery was telephoned to the county officials and sheriff Redwine. District attorney Lockhart, County Judge Stokes, and County Physician were for the scene of the discovery.

How death came to the child is a mystery. The body was badly mutilated, supposedly by wolves or dogs; only the head one leg and a part of the body. Diligent search of the entire community failed to reveal a single clue, and it is the belief of officers that the mystery will be cleared up.

BOLLWORMS

Bollworm infestations continue to be troublesome across the South Plains. Populations range from light to extremely heavy and are variable from field to field in the various counties. This is an individual problem in each field and each field should be checked separately. Counties reporting light to heavy infestations of bollworms were Dawson, Crosby, Lynn, Floyd, Terry, Bailey, Hale, Lubbock and Mitchell counties. Medium infestation were reported in Swisher and Hockley counties. Beneficial insects appear to be building in many areas and some control is apparent. The cool damp weather has slowed the development of bollworms, but heavy populations are still present in many areas and a potentially damaging buildup is possible in other areas. In those counties where control procedures have been applied on small worms less than 1/2" long, good control has generally been obtained. In some fields where a subthreshold level was present earlier and no control was applied, populations have appeared to decline. However, this is not true in every field surveyed. If larger worms are present in the field, control is often difficult and extremely poor. Proper timing of applications of insecticides is of utmost importance. After an application is applied the field should be carefully checked to determine the amount of kill and the reinfestation pressure. Be prepared to follow with several more applications if need be. Once chemical treatment is started, beneficial insects will be reduced and bollworm populations will often build back quite rapidly. One spraying may be sufficient but this often opens the door for heavy infestations and two or more applications may be needed.

The producer is urged to carefully check each field and determine if an economic infestation is present. This is considered to be 2000 to 2500 worms per acre or approximately 2 larvae to 10 feet or row.

Microwave ovens may replace conventional methods of barbecuing of meats and poultry; they do the job more than three times faster.

Conventional methods of barbecuing are time-consuming and cumbersome.

Researchers at Southern Union under an Agriculture Research oven-smoking and conventional hardwood coal barbecuing on fresh pork, ham, beef and chicken. Actual cooking time by microwave was only 3 minutes a pound for spare ribs and chicken halves, 5 minutes for beef brisket, and 6 minutes for fresh ham.

A trained taste panel rated all meats barbecued by microwaves as good as meats over hardwood coals.

Pieces cooked by microwave were smoked in a separate unit were smoked during cooking. Combined cooking and smoking time a pound by the microwave technique was one-third or less than for conventional methods.

When buying clothing, it can't be repeated too often; be sure the garment is color fast. The National Institute of Drycleaning handled 6,887 complaints on color loss or change last year.

The leather and suede look will be popular again this fall. Color range from deep purple and dark green to the palest yellow. Look to the hand-tag or label for care instructions.

Leather imports present problems to buyers. Imported genuine leather trim usually is not colorfast to drycleaning and will fade onto the garment.

Orange Nut Biscuits are made quickly with ready-to-bake biscuits, frozen orange juice concentrate and brown sugar. Place biscuits from 8-oz. package in ungreased 8 or 9 inch round pan and bake according to package directions. Combine 1/4 cup undiluted orange juice concentrate with 3 tablespoons brown sugar. Spoon over biscuits. Bake 4 to 5 minutes longer.

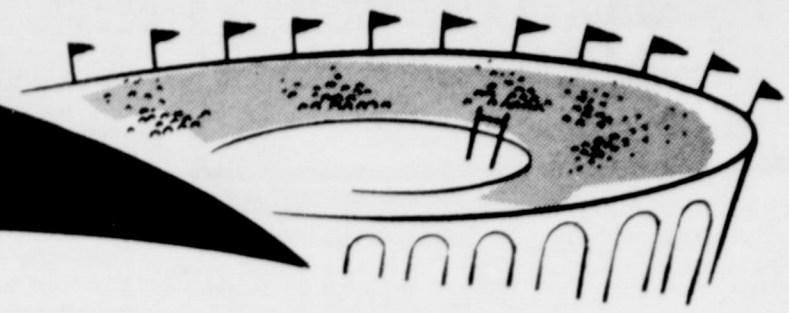

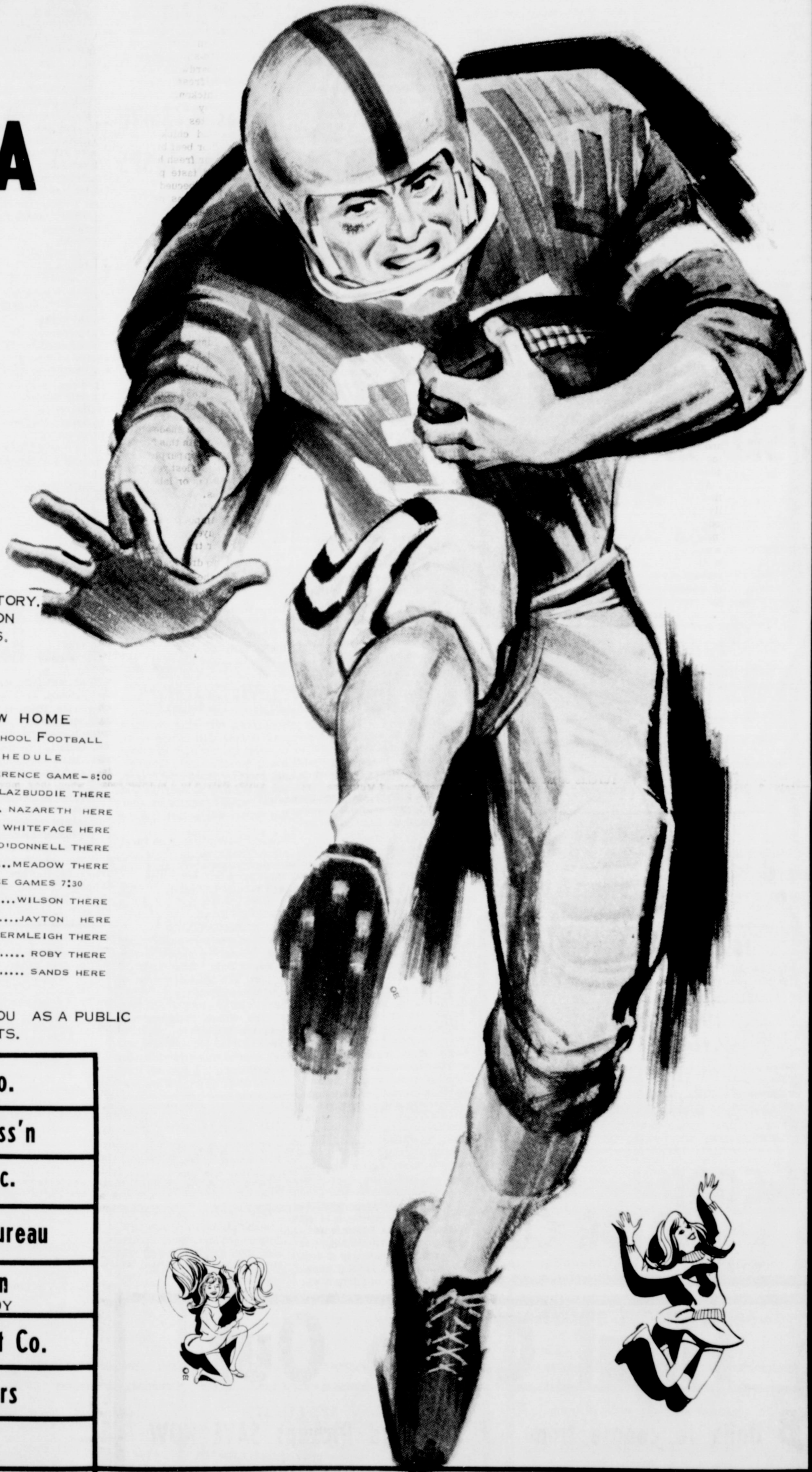

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"Taking the Fifth"

"Taking the Fifth" has already become part of the nation's slang. This is an unusual mark of distinction for what is, after all, a technical rule of evidence. What does the expression really mean? Literally, it means claiming the protection of the Constitution's Fifth Amendment, which says that "no person shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself."

The theory of the Amendment is that it is unfair to force anybody to tattle on himself. But this does not mean he may keep silent in the courtroom whenever he pleases. He may keep silent only if answering might tend to incriminate him. Consider this situation:

"Even though I cannot be prosecuted," he told the court, "it could still be mighty embarrassing for me if I tell what I know."

But the court ordered the witness to speak out. The judge said the fear of embarrassment, alone, was not a weighty enough reason to invoke the constitutional privilege.

Furthermore, the privilege is strictly personal—only for the protection of the witness himself. Thus, a witness in an assault case was ordered to testify, despite his fear that he would be getting his cousin in trouble. The judge said stretching the Fifth Amendment to protect other people would unduly hamper the courts in getting the facts they need to do justice.

Still, the basic philosophy of the Fifth Amendment is deeply rooted in our legal system. In accordance with this philosophy, it is a general rule that the prosecuting attorney may not tell the jury that a witness who "takes the Fifth" must have a guilty conscience.

"A witness may have a reasonable fear of prosecution and yet be innocent," said the United States Supreme Court. "The privilege serves to protect the innocent who otherwise might be ensnared by ambiguous circumstances."

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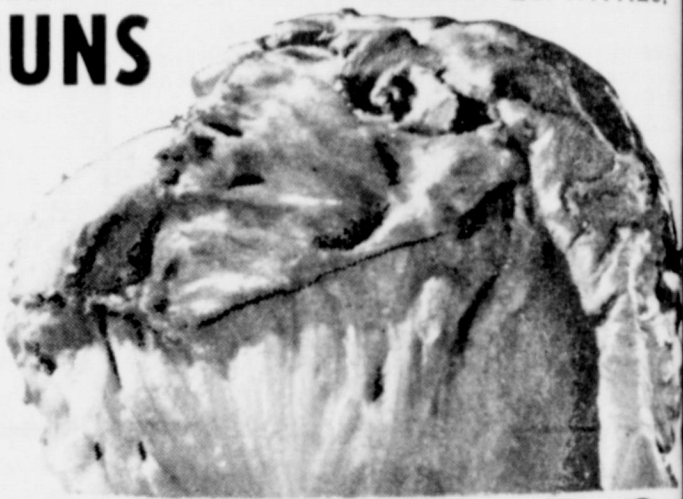
