The very, very few instances of harm from excessive or careless use of additives, or from their unanticipated effects, are overwhelmed by their many beneficial effects." Vital statistics, with respect to longevity, general physical well-being, to say nothing of the rising number of babies in our population, support Doctor Stare's conclusions.

A Tornado Watch means for people to go about their business but to keep an eye on the sky and in touch with weather statements and warnings issued by the weather bureau.

A Tornado Warning tells people of an actual sighting or an indication by radar and urges those in the danger path to prepare to take immediate cover.

Through the cooperation of the City Police Department, Sherriffs Department, DPS, fire department and auxiliary policemen there are spotters out as watchers each time we have turbulent weather in our area. They are certainly to be commended for the service they are rendering the citizens.

Her future plans are to attend South Plains Jr. College and her ultimate goal in life is to become a high school teacher and live on a huge ranch.



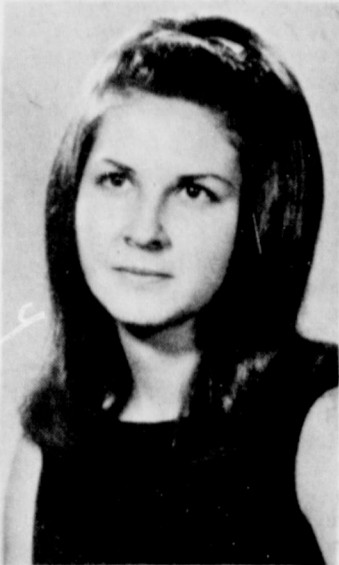
STEVE VAUGHN

Linda Huffaker, CHD Agent, Says.....

Your food freezer is not a bank, so don't put food in and expect it to draw interest. Fodds get no better with age; in fact, there is bound to be some loss in quality. But a food freezer is something like a bank in at least one respect. In both cases, you need records. Listing what is in the freezer you placed it in the freezer is fine but that is not enough. You also need a written record that shows your deposits and withdrawals. A written record shows what is in the freezer and how long it has been there. Use the record when making a shopping list.

Use the freezer as often as possible. It is all too easy to "loose" packages of frozen foods in the back or bottom of the freezer. Food thrown away because it was stored too long soon makes the food freezer an expensive kitchen item.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK LEMON ICE BOX COOKIES 1/4 cups sifted flour 1/4 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon baking powder 1/2 cup butter or margarine 1 cup sugar 1 egg 1 1/2 teaspoons grated lemon rind 1 tablespoon lemon juice

Sift together flour, salt and baking powder. Cream butter; add sugar gradually and beat until light and fluffy. Add egg, lemon rind and lemon juice; beat well. Stir in sifted dry ingredients. Shape into rolls 2 inches in diameter. Chill in refrigerator overnight. Slice 1/4 inch thick and place on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake in 375 degree oven for 12 to 15 minutes. YIELD 4 dozen cookies.

After graduating from Tahoka High School, Rudy plans on going to Commercial College in Lubbock, Texas and study for IBM Computer Programming.

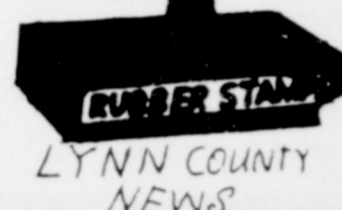
