Texas Lost More on Tuscania Than Other States

Texas paid the biggest toll of lives in the sinking of the Tuscania, the nation learned today with the republication of the list of 131 known dead. Twenfour boys from the Lone Star State are buried in Scottish soil and the list will be added slightly. Texas lost twice as many men as any other state. Wisconsin, Oregon, California and Oklahoma each lost twelve.

Twenty-eight states and Hawaii had sons who were lost, the list shows.



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


