

Our winters are cold, but as the moisture that falls during the winter months is usually snow and hurts the stock very little.







Texas, Cattle, Fevor

Texas Fever, which is a disease pecular to cattle only, can never be absolutly stamped until the cattle tick is eradicated, but the mortality has been decreased by the inocculation process as practiced at the A. & M. College of Texas, by Dr. Mark Frances - profesor of veterinary science and surgery, who has for twenty one years been experimenting with the diseas. However in course of time the ick can be eradicated. It is estimated that the cattle tick cost annually forty million dollars, in the losses of cattle, in the ex pense of carring for cattle, in the administration of quarantine law etc. According to Dr Veranus Alva Alva Moor, B. S., M. D., New York State Veternity College, thorizing the const the diseas of Texas Fever made its tension of its railway first impresion upon the American of Paducah, in Cottlet people in 1868, In June of that its present terminu year, Texas cattle were shipped up Crosby, Floyd, Hale, D the Mississippi river to Cairo, and Hockley, Cochran, thence by rail into Illinois and Indiana where great les es were cau ed during the summer. The distributio of the diseas correspon with that of the cattle tick, and this has lead to the estaclishment of the Texas fever line by the Federal government. Cattle from below the line cannot be shippe over the line, except for immedite slaugher

The disease of Texas fever is caused by a piroplasm in the blood which destroys the red corpuscles. It is a disease that is peculiar to cattle only.

It is infectious but not contagious, It can be transmitted from animal to another only by the tick.

Animals infected and those not infected can be together and no contagion exist, but the tick will carry it. Calves dropped by immune chws are not immune by nature. Therefore it has been demonstrated that every native calf will have the disease from the tick.

The Fever Tick is big fat tick which drops from the cattle in the pasture and after dropping during the week will lay from one to two thousand eggs.

Under favorable conditions the the eggs will hatch in twenty

According to Dr. Mark Francis, Texas Experiment Statson, and Dr. R. P. Marsteller, his assistant, pasture rotation is the best plan for tick eradication.

This plan is to pasture the cattle until the greater part of the ticks are dropped. Then move them to another pasture. Close up the pastures in which the ticks have been dropped, without animal life the ticks will starve. It is a peculiar thing that only a tick raised on a fever animal will transmit the disease. A tick from a horse well not do this.

For twenty one years Dr. Mark Francis has had Texas Fever under observation. He says that while the disease is usually fatel to mature cattle, young ones usually survive it, and posesses an immunity which last for life.

According to the bulletin of vital statistices for march, race sucide in Texas cannot be charged. Nearly 5000 birhs were reorted for the month. Up to date, one set of triplets, and frty-five sets of twins have been reported for Febuary, with several cotnties yet to be heard from.

Austin, Texas, april 4, 1910. As an indication of the commercial development of the state, the records of the state department shows that the receips for the mouth of march amounted to \$60,455.25 which is nearly double the receipt for the same month in 1909, when the receipts aggregated \$31,465.48. The recipts of this depart have been gradualy increasing, as only five years ago the avergage receipts for one month were carcely over \$10,000. Of the March 1910, receipes the sum \$37,544.60 were from franchise tax payments. If the Thirty-second legislature would enact an employes' compensation law in the state, all common law or statury defnse base upon the princibles of contridutory or compartive negilenc would be completly overthrown. It woud mean that where an employe was injure d while at work, not as a result of his wilful act, compensation would be paid by employer, according to a fixed scale, usualy based on his wages, and the cost passed over over to the consumer. The necesity instituting legal proceedings woud be opviate and in case of dispute special arbritration resorted to.

This would result in great economy in court expense. Twenty- two fore g nations enacted empldyes' compnsation aws The industaries usualy coverp are those involving a considerable hazard.

Texas, Cattle, Fevor

Following this idea the question naturally arose as to the best method of producing a mild attack, that would be non-fatal, and thereby justify the purchase of strictly first class cattle for breeding purposes. According to his records the study of the Texas fever proolem was commenced at the Texas Experiment Station in October 1888 and for several years he tried to produce immunity by the injection of the blood serum of immune cattle, but the results were only partially successful.

About 1897 he began to use virulent blood and continued to do so ever since. The result of this work Woodman Hall every first and third have been very successful. Before this treatment came into use, the death rate from Texas fever ran from fifty to eighty percent on all cattle brougt to Texas.
