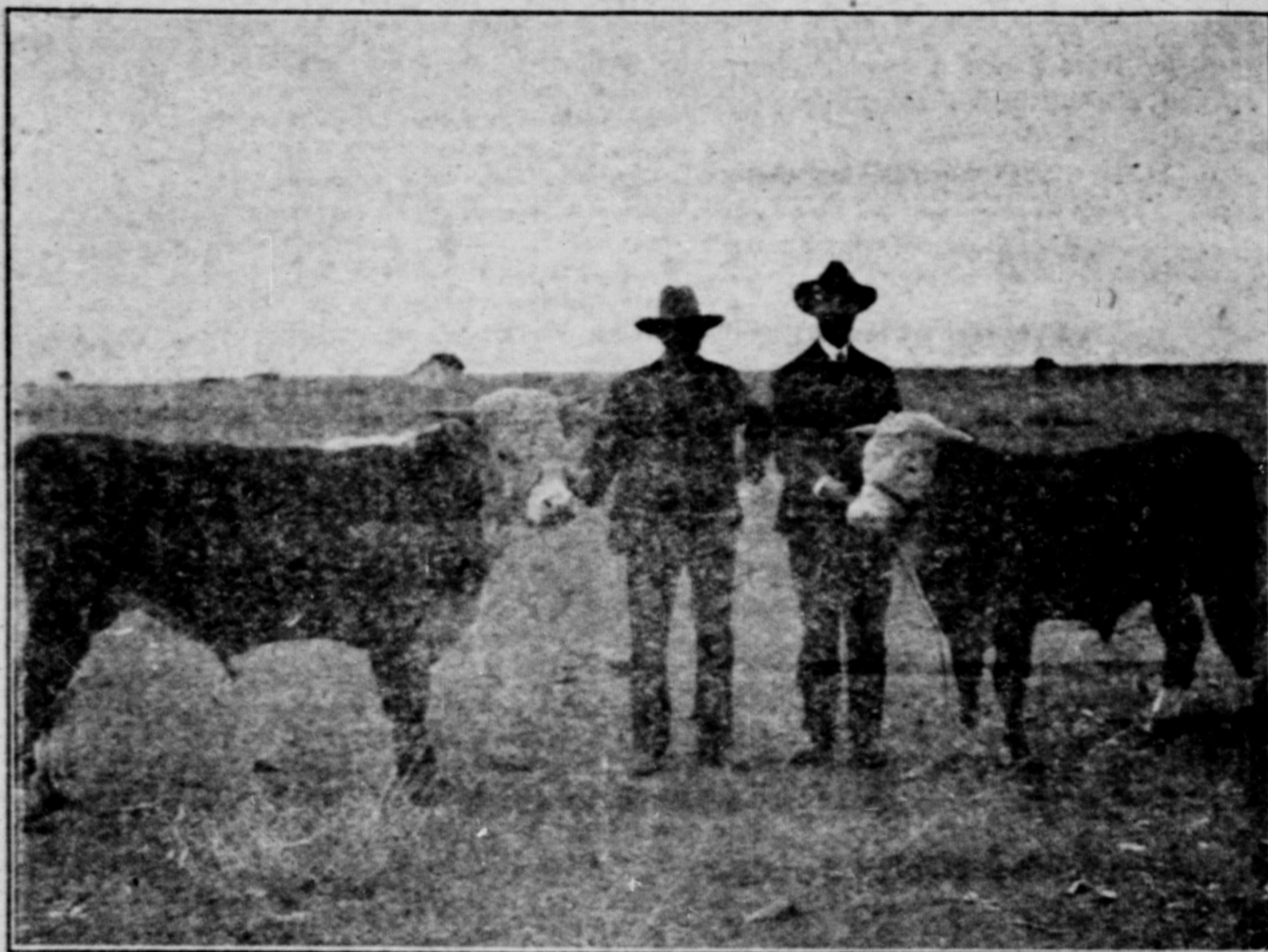

LYNN A CATTLE FARMERS COUNTY



FOUR LYNN COUNTY DEVELOPERS

The Ideal County for the small Stock Farmers, and the breeding of Thorough-bred Stock of all kinds.

Just a few facts about it.

The resources of the Plains country as a Stock farming country are not generally known. Thirty years ago this section of the country was regarded as a desert. A place forgotten of God, where no water blessed the earth, and the Way Farer must carry his supplies with him, or suffer the agonies of thirst if he failed to reach some friendly Canyon, where occasional Springs furnished water for the Buffalo and Antelope the only denizens of this vast expanse. About fifty years ago a Colony of Quakers settled near Esta Cado, and with the courage inherited from their fore Fathers sought water and found it in abundant quantities. They built substantial houses and planted orchards, which are now the pride of their owners. The original Quaker settlers deserted their homes and went back some to their old homes and some to other places. The cause of their desertion being some calamity of which we know little.

Later men who foresaw great possibilities came, and procuring land in large bodies began the breeding of cattle, mostly Native cows and pedigreed Sires. However there were some who turned their attention to the breeding of Registered cattle. The Plains now boast of some of the finest herds in the State. It has been our good fortune to see a fine herd of Black Polls. New blood being added every year from the best breeds in the Northern States.

There are a good many small farms that have their thoroughbred cattle. The day of the long horns is a thing of the past. The small Stockraiser having found the returns to more than balance the cost where good stock is concerned. Thirty years ago C. C. Slaughter established a ranch on Blanco Can-

yon, and began the raising of the Texas long horns. Jack Alley of Tahoka was his foreman and had charge of the ranch. Hereford Sires were added and the Stock were gradually graded up to abig standard. In 1882 he marketed several cars of steers that brought \$70.00 per head.

The Tahoka Lake Ranch was established about this time and stocked with good Hereford cattle, and remained a paying proposition until about two years ago, when the land became too valuable for pastureland. The cattle were then sold to the small Stockmen all over the country and the land sold

with hardships and Adventures, which goes with life in the open. The house remains and is a beautiful country home. Boasting all the comfort and modern conveniences some City Homes lack. A L. Lockwood another of the Pioneers of Lynn country, has been raising cattle here for 20 years. The cattle on his place have come through all the stages of development from the long legged, spread horn variety to the broad backed, deep chested Hereford, which can carry more beef to the amount of standing room, than any other member of the bovine family.

Every year Mr. Lockwood has added a few choice animals to his herd, besides raising a good crop of registered calves. Last fall the last of the graded cattle were sold, and now Mr. Lockwood's place boasts one of the finest herds of Herefords in the state.

E. D. Skinner, another Lynn County man, bred and raised registered Herefords successfully on his farm six miles southeast of Tahoka. His herd was second to none, and furnished some of the best blood our stockmen claim. Mr. Skinner's town interests claimed so much of his time he was obliged to sell his cattle to his neighbors, who, knowing their pedigrees, were only too eager to buy. Dr. Windham, who has been a leading physician here ever since the county was organized, has found time in the intervals of his

practice to superintend his ranch, he home of another herd of registered Herefords.

The doctor is a very enthusiastic cattle fancier as well as a success-physician. The Red Polls come in for their quota of favor, and several farmers of the county devote most of their time and energy to the care of the red beauties, which having no horns, are close feeders and easy handled.

I. W. Myers, east of Tahoka ten miles, has a small herd of registered Polls, which would be a credit to any farm. They are only one of the sources of revenue upon which this thrifty farmer depends.

M. M. Anthony, 8 miles south of Tahoka, has a Jersey farm, stocked with some of the best the market could afford. Their milk and butter record is a source of pride to Mr. Anthony to say nothing of the money they turn in every year.

Mr. Johnson a new comer to the county, has bought part of the La Verne Kershner herd of Red Polls and expects to engage in butter and milk farming. He intends to purchase a separator and go into business for every penny there is to be made. The demand for good butter far exceeds the supply, and we foresee a snug bank account for this farmer who has so recently arrived.

11; O'clock Address

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The North Plains ranges consist of the curly mesquite, the richest pasture grass known to the stockman but only this one variety is seen until the South Plains is reached, where there is a great variety of rich nutritious grasses, giving stock a variety on which they thrive much better than on just one kind of grass.

Lynn county is about the center of the section known as the South Plains and with our variety of grass some of which, the Texas blue grass and the sage grass, grow plenty high for cutting. The pastures winter cure giving the grass all the beneficial qualities possessed of bright hay without the work and expense of cutting, baling and storing.

Our winters are cold, but as the moisture that falls during the winter months is usually snow and hurts the stock very little. The per cent of stock lost in Lynn County from cold or poverty can always be traced to the neglect or carelessness of the owner or manager.

Lynn County is not a dream of future possibilities in cattle, but a living paying present. Needing only a look into the flou-ning white face of the kingly Hereford, a walk through the home of the aristocratic Jersey, or of a visit to the pasture of the sturdy poll, either red or black.

To convince the home seker and home strayer that the money to be made in cattle farming is only limited to the amount of time and effort devoted to the different breeds that claim Lynn County, as the home of their birth.

Any one of the above named Citizens could give more information in a short time about their chosen breeds of cattle, and methods, of management, than could be told in a dozen written letters.

Texas, Cattle, Fever
 Texas Fever, which is a disease peculiar to cattle only, can never be absolutely stamped until the cattle tick is eradicated, but the mortality has been decreased by the inoculation process as practiced at the A. & M. College of Texas, by Dr. Mark Francis, professor of veterinary science and surgery, who has for twenty one years been experimenting with the disease. However in course of time the tick can be eradicated. It is estimated that the cattle tick cost annually forty million dollars, in the losses of cattle, in the expense of carrying for cattle, in the administration of quarantine law etc. According to Dr Veranus Alva Alva Moor, B. S., M. D., New York State Veterinary College, the disease of Texas Fever made its first impression upon the American people in 1868. In June of that year, Texas cattle were shipped up the Mississippi river to Cairo, and thence by rail into Illinois and Indiana where great losses were caused during the summer. The distribution of the disease correspond with that of the cattle tick, and this has led to the establishment of the Texas fever line by the Federal government. Cattle from below the line cannot be shipped over the line, except for immediate slaughter.

The disease of Texas fever is caused by a piroplasm in the blood which destroys the red corpuscles. It is a disease that is peculiar to cattle only.

It is infectious but not contagious. It can be transmitted from animal to another only by the tick.

Animals infected and those not infected can be together and no contagion exist, but the tick will carry it. Calves dropped by immune chews are not immune by nature. Therefore it has been demonstrated that every native calf will have the disease from the tick.

The Fever Tick is big fat tick which drops from the cattle in the pasture and after dropping during the week will lay from one to two thousand eggs.

Under favorable conditions the the eggs will hatch in twenty days.

According to Dr. Mark Francis, Texas Experiment Station, and Dr. R. P. Marsteller, his assistant, pasture rotation is the best plan for tick eradication.

This plan is to pasture the cattle until the greater part of the ticks are dropped. Then move them to another pasture. Close up the pastures in which the ticks have been dropped, without animal life the ticks will starve. It is a peculiar thing that only a tick raised on a fever animal will transmit the disease. A tick from a horse will not do this.

For twenty one years Dr. Mark Francis has had Texas Fever under observation. He says that while the disease is usually fatal to mature cattle, young ones usually survive it, and possess an immunity which last for life.

Our Austin News Letter

Austin, Texas, March 28, 1910.
Tuesday, April 5th, Austin is to hold an election to determine whether or not the big dam across the Colorado river shall be rebuilt. So sanguine are the people here, that the prop will carry, they have already arranged to celebrate the victory, April 16th, on a large scale at the old dam site. The I. & G. N. railroad company, has agreed to put their track, leading from Austin to the dam in shape for service, and it is expected that practically the entire city will take part in the big celebration.

According to the bulletin of vital statistics for march, race suicide in Texas cannot be charged. Nearly 5000 births were reported for the month. Up to date, one set of triplets, and fifty-five sets of twins have been reported for February, with several counties yet to be heard from.

Austin, Texas, April 4, 1910.
As an indication of the commercial development of the state, the records of the state department shows that the receipts for the month of march amounted to \$60,455.25 which is nearly double the receipt for the same month in 1909, when the receipts aggregated \$31,465.48. The receipts of this department have been gradually increasing, as only five years ago the average receipts for one month were scarcely over \$10,000. Of the March 1910, receipts the sum \$37,544.60 were from franchise tax payments. During the past month there were filed in the department 188 charters, notwithstanding the fact that the law requires that 50 per cent of the capital stock be paid in and the remainder paid up in two years, while under the old law it only required that 50 per cent be subscribed and only 10 per cent paid.

A great amount of interest is being manifested in the to be held at Galveston Tuesday night, April 12, which is the opening day of the big labor convention, where the subject of employer compensation laws will be discussed. The following speakers have been invited to address the meetings Clarence Cusly, Frank Putnam, commissioner of Labor W. E. McEwen of Minnesota, Thomas B. Love, William D. Williams and Walton Petten. Others of equal promise are expected. Employers' compensation laws change the basis of recovery for personal injuries sustained to employees during the course of their employment from negligence to that of a risk of the industry.

If the Thirty-second legislature would enact an employees' compensation law in the state, all common law or statutory defense base upon the principles of contributory or comparative negligence would be completely overthrown. It would mean that where an employee was injured while at work, not as a result of his wilful act, compensation would be paid by employer, according to a fixed scale, usually based on his wages, and the cost passed over to the consumer. The necessity instituting legal proceedings would be obviated and in case of dispute special arbitration resorted to.

This would result in great economy in court expense. Twenty-two foreign nations enacted employees' compensation laws. The industries usually covered are those involving a considerable hazard.

That girl would be horrified if you told her that she had committed a theft and yet she was even more guilty than the boy she goaded into wrong doing.
There are hundreds of girls who allow young men to spend more on them than they can afford.

He will do anything to give please and the girl knows it. Sometimes that longing even blunts his sense of honor, he is obsessed by one idea that of finding favor in her eyes.

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Texas, Cattle, Fever

Following this idea the question naturally arose as to the best method of producing a mild attack, that would be non-fatal, and thereby justify the purchase of strictly first class cattle for breeding purposes. According to his records the study of the Texas fever problem was commenced at the Texas Experiment Station in October 1888 and for several years he tried to produce immunity by the injection of the blood serum of immune cattle, but the results were only partially successful.
About 1897 he began to use virulent blood and continued to do so ever since. The result of this work have been very successful. Before this treatment came into use, the death rate from Texas fever ran from fifty to eighty percent on all cattle brought to Texas.
Now the death rate is from five to eight per cent.
At the Texas Station he has treated about five thousand head in this way. It is not known what the value of these cattle were, but a conservative estimate is that they averaged an outlay of \$200 per head to their owners.
