### Start Conference Play Friday

The Tahoka Bulldogs lost last Friday night to State Ranked Seagraves, 28-0. The Bulldogs played one of their best games of the season against the Eagles with the game being a lot closer than the score made it appear.

The Bulldogs repeatedly moved the ball against the Eagles, but couldn't come up with that vital play when they needed it. The Seagraves Eagles passing game was a decisive factor in the Eagles scoring.

The Eagles scored twice in the first quarter with the score coming when Fields threw a jump pass to Taylor. The PAT was no good on a run by Fields. The second TD for the Eagles was a 44 yard pass play with Knight rolling out for the PAT making the score 14-0.

Fields threw a TD pass to Taylor in second quarter to make the score at halftime 20-0 in favor of the Eagles.

The last Eagles score came in the third quarter when Knight went back to pass, couldn't find a receiver and ran 36 yards for a TD. Fields ran the conversion to make the final score 28-0.

Neither team scored in the fourth period.

The Bulldogs are now 3-2 for the season and will play Post this Friday at 7:30 to start conference play for the Bulldogs.

### New Features Of Cotton Program

Full understanding of the new features of the Form A Cotton Loan Program is needed by cotton producers, their marketing agents, and others participating in loan transactions. New features of the program are designed to reduce cotton marketing costs, speed up redemption of loan cotton, permit cotton to move more freely into trade channels, and reduce Government costs.

The major new features are: 1. A producer may pool his loan cotton with other producers for marketing. To do this, the producer signs an annual marketing agreement with an agent to whom he has given power-of-attorney. The agreement authorizes the agent to market the cotton, redeem the cotton or transfer the producer's equity in the cotton, pool sales proceeds, and make a settlement with producers on a pool basis;

2. After a producer has placed his cotton under loan, he can contract with a buyer to sell his cotton loan equity at a set price to permit the buyer to redeem the cotton;

3. A buyer of equities or other person authorized by the producer to redeem the cotton has 30 calendar days after the producer has signed a Release of

Warehouse Receipt (Form CCC-813) in which to redeem the cotton from loan.

Loan Papers for 1969 cotton may be prepared at county ASCS offices or by approved loan clerks. All Form A loans will be disbursed by the county office after a nominal fee has been deducted.

All loan records will be kept in the county ASCS office which will enable cotton buyers to find out the amount and quality of cotton that is under loan.

The loan rate for Lynn County is 20.20 cents per pound for middling white one-inch upland cotton.

More information on these and other features of the Cotton Loan Program may be obtained at the ASCS office.

The Tahoka ISD Board of Education met for their regular monthly meeting on Thursday, October 9, at the Board Room in the high school. Members present were: Edward Bartley, President; James Brookshire, Vice-President; J.T. Miller, Secretary; Dan Curry, Ruben McElroy, Elmer Owens, and James Roberts. Staff members present were Harold Reynolds, Superintendent; Melvin Burks, Director of Guidance and Federal Programs; and Mrs. Peggy Elliott, Director of Business Activities and Secretary to the Board of Education.

Minutes of the September regular meeting and the special meeting of September 29, were approved as well as the monthly bills in the amount of \$4,451.74.

In other action the Board approved an amendment to the current budget, changing some anticipated expenditures in the instructional category to the Capital Outlay Category.

In addition to routine monthly reports lengthy reports concerning all Federally Financed programs and the school district's testing programs were presented by the administration. Federal funds estimated to be in the amount of \$61,696 are included in the current year's operation of programs.

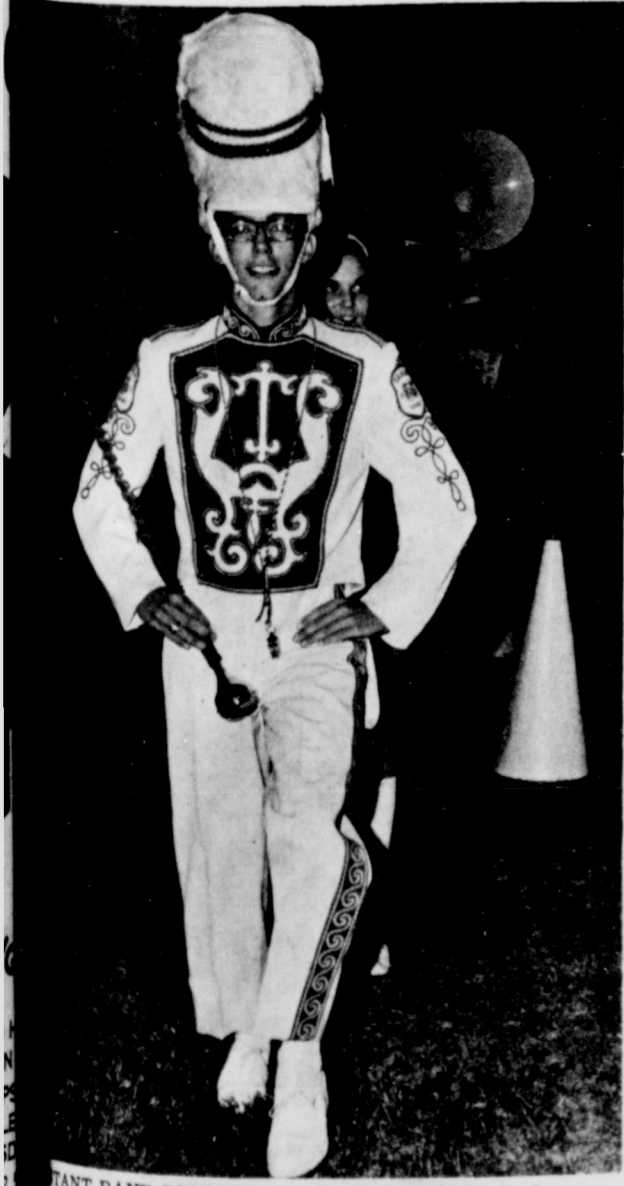
### Hootenanny Is Saturday Night

**Fire Insurance: A "Good Bet"?**

Suppose you notice that a neighbor's children have a habit of playing with matches. Could you, if you were so inclined, take out a fire insurance policy on your neighbor's house? It would be a "good bet," because of the relatively strong chance of a fire.

But the law would not recognize such insurance, because you do not have an "insurable interest" in your neighbor's house. That is, destruction of the house would not hurt you at all. The insurance thus would be gambling, pure and simple.

And, as one court said, it is "a fundamental postulate of all insurance that it must not be a mere bet."

It isn't only that the law frowns on gambling. There is another reason for requiring an insurable interest: to keep you from temptation. If you have fire insurance on a house in which you have no real stake, you might be tempted to burn it down.

Of course, you have an insurable interest in your own home. But as a rule, that interest ends when you sell the property. Take this case:

A woman sold her house, but continued to "hold over" her fire insurance. Sure enough, the house did burn down a few months later. But a court ruled that the woman could not collect on the policy.

"She suffered no loss," said the court, "because the property destroyed was not hers."

On the other hand, you may have an insurable interest in a piece of property even though you don't own it—and never did. For example:

A man took out fire insurance on a house he was occupying as a tenant under a four-year lease. When this house burned down, he demanded payment on his insurance policy—and a court upheld his claim. The judge said a leasehold, too, is a valuable property interest, an interest that fire insurance could protect.

But the tenant could collect only to the extent of his leasehold interest, not for the full value of the house. In short, fire insurance is supposed to let you come out even. It is not supposed to let you make a profit.

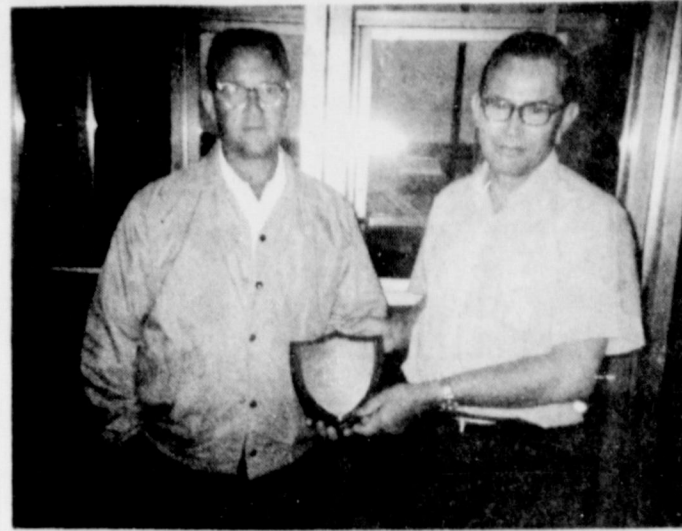

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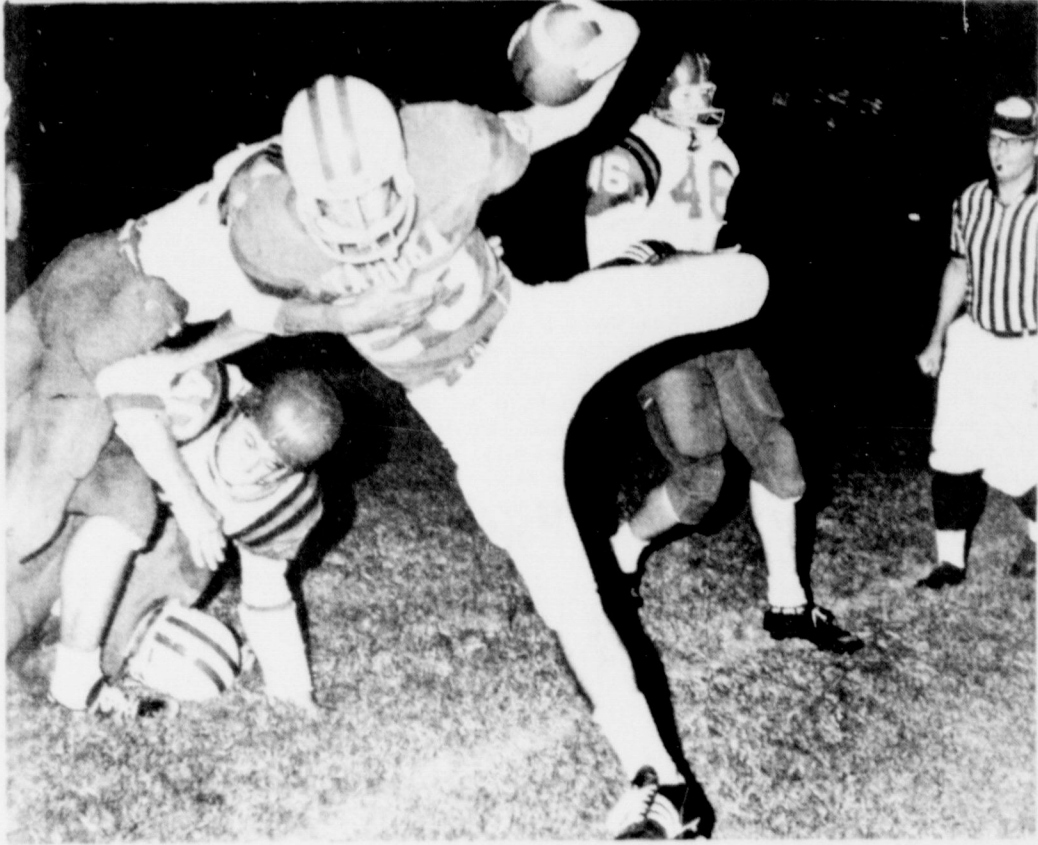

A boll weevil monitoring report for the period of September 29 to October 3.

This report shows the estimated number of weevils per acre on three fields that are checked each week. On August 26, September 2, field one had an estimated population of 500 weevils per acre. Spray applications were applied September 5 and September 17. On the check September 29 to October 3, weevils were not found in field. Field 2 had 250 weevils per acre on September 18 to September 25, was sprayed on September 17 and September 25. Weevils were not present in this field October 3.

Field 3 in the monitoring report did not have weevils present in any check from August 26 to October 3. This field was sprayed on September 7, September 18 and September 25.

homemakers are challenged with buying and storing perishable fresh foods. The expiration of ethylene gas by some fruits affects the storage life of vegetables. When crispers are filled with apples and pears during the winter months, this gas could turn the salad greens brown.

- The Home Demonstration agent adds these storage suggestions:
1. Keep apples, pears and melons separated from: carrots, celery, cabbage, potatoes, onions and salad greens.
  2. Keep celery and onions separated.
  3. Keep potatoes and fruits separated as the potatoes can give an earthy flavor to the fruits.
  4. Keep oranges away from eggs and butter.
  5. Keep dairy products away from fruits and vegetables.
  6. Keep ripe pineapple wrapped in a plastic bag to hold in the aroma.
- Normally, potatoes and onions are stored in a cool, dry place outside the refrigerator.

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK:**  
Apple Crunch

1/4 Cup rolled oats  
1/4 Cup all-purpose flour  
3/4 Cup firmly packed brown sugar  
1/4 Cup peanut butter  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 Cup butter  
6 or 8 medium-size apples  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
3 tablespoons water  
Combine oats, flour, sugar and salt. With pastry blender or two knives, cut peanut butter

and butter into oat mixture. Pare, core and slice apples into shallow buttered baking dish. Sprinkle with lemon juice and water. Spoon peanut butter mixture over apples and bake in oven at 375 degrees F. for about 40 minutes, or until apples are tender. Serve hot or cold with cream, whipped cream or soft-ened ice cream.

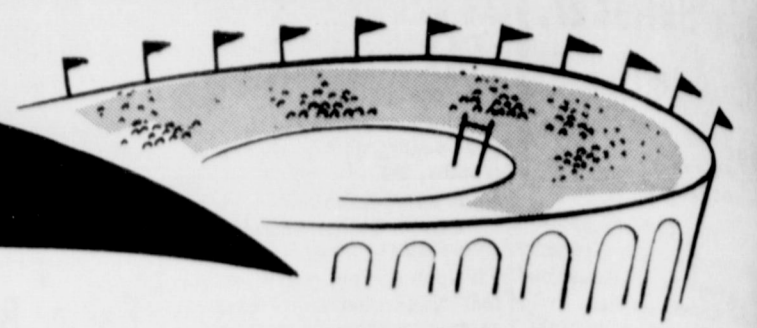

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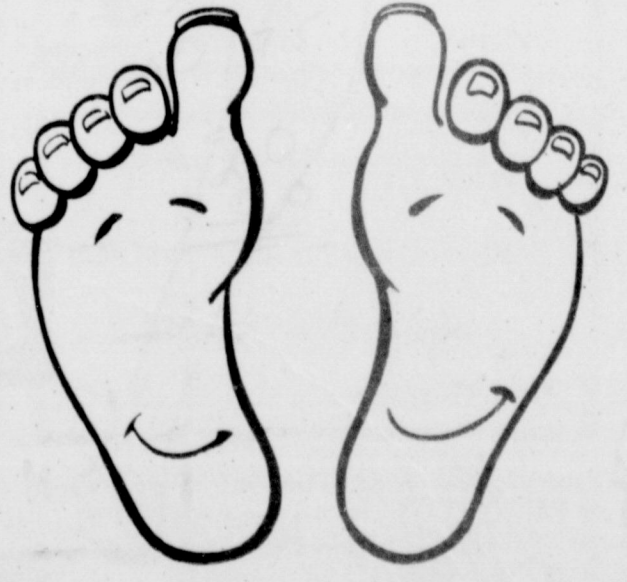

**Sparkling Fruit Pudding**



When the weather turns snappy, it's nice to serve a warm fruit pudding that features oranges and apples, and is enlivened with spice. Minute Tapioca makes an ideal thickener, since it has no flavor of its own and leaves the juices sparkling, clear, and fresh-tasting.

**Orange and Apple Tapioca**

3 cups (4 medium) peeled tart apples, cut in eighths  
1/2 cup sugar  
3 tablespoons butter or margarine  
2 teaspoons lemon juice  
1/4 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg  
1/2 cup water  
1 cup drained fresh orange sections  
1/4 cup quick-cooking tapioca  
2 cups water

Combine apples, sugar, butter, lemon juice, salt, spices, and 1/2 cup water in a skillet. Cover and simmer over medium heat until apples are transparent—about 15 minutes. Baste apples occasionally with sugar mixture. Remove apples to serving dish. Add orange sections.

Add tapioca and remaining 2 cups water to sugar mixture in skillet. Let stand 5 minutes. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a boil. Pour over fruit. Let stand 20 minutes. Stir. Let cool at least another 15 minutes before serving. Garnish with prepared whipped topping, if desired. Makes 1 1/4 cups or 8 servings.

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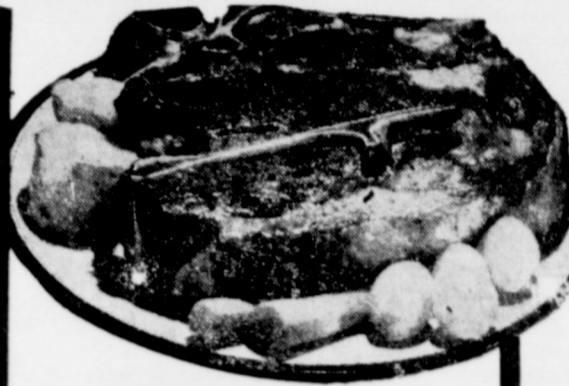
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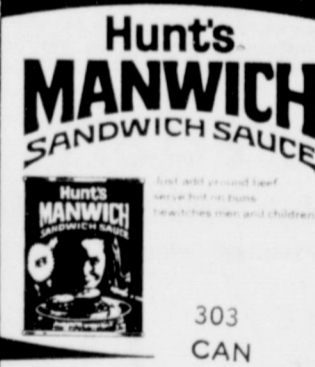
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
