## Ten Accidents In Lynn County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 10 accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of September, according to Sergeant Hal E. Pirtle, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in 12 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$7,810.00.

The rural accident summary Game Statistics for this county during the first nine months of 1969 shows a total of 59 accidents resulting in four person killed, 59 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$58,537.00.

The month of October will bring about a drastic change in driving habits. With the return to Central Standard Time on October 26, many motorists will find themselves going to and from work in darkness. The increased hours of darkness will hide dangers otherwise visible during the daylight hours.

The Sergeant listed some factors why driving is more hazardous at night than during the day. (1) Reduced visibillity prevents drivers from see. ing hazards. (2) It has been longer since most drivers have slept and the resulting fatigue increases perception reaction time. (3) It is easier for drivers to become confused and panic. (4) More drinking drivers will be on the road.

These factors in varying degrees coupled with high speed cause accidents that would not occur in daytime.



It was not until 1831 that pollens, not hay, were found to be the

The major cause of "hay fever" miseries is ragweed. Strangely enough, ragweed belongs to the genus of herbs called ambrosiaceae-or "ambrosia." Although ambrosia is usually defined as something "exquisitely gratifying in taste of scent," it is doubtful that the 8 or 9 million Americans who have "hay fever" would so classify ragweed.
