If Snyder were to do a thing like that the people would never get through talking about the royal reception it gave the singing convention. It is worth the time and trouble.—Snyder Signal.

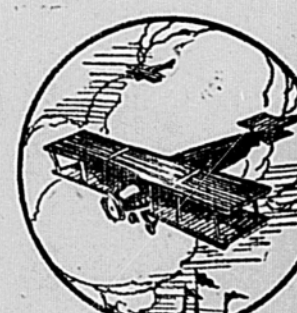

TAX COLLECTOR CANDIDATES TIE IS AMICABLY SETTLED

The final returns in the August 26th run-off, found S. C. Spikes and A. J. Clark, candidates for Tax Collector of this county tied for the nomination. Of the 2720 votes cast they had 1360 votes each, and the decision had to be made according to election law, Article 3124, Revised Civil Statutes, which provides that the chairman of the County Democratic Committee shall cast lots before the candidates to determine which shall receive the nomination, which was done with the result that Mr. Spikes was the lucky candidate.

Both men were willing to accept the decision of the lot, and though Mr. Clark might wish he had had better luck, he took the decision as a fair method to settle the tie, and has ill will toward no one.—Lubbock Avalanche.

What's This World Coming to

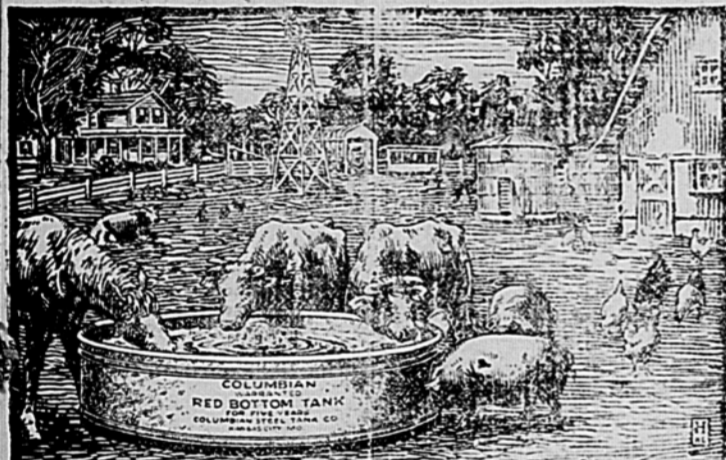

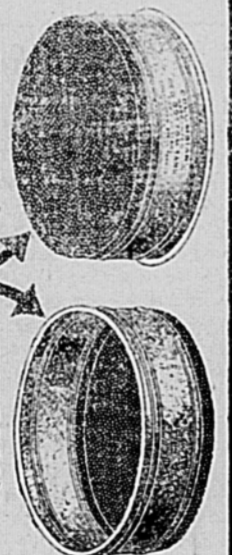
