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

Bill Griffin, County Agent, Says

Don't be in a hurry about pruning rose bushes, suggests County Agent Bill Griffin. The plants are cut back early, warm days plus abundance of soil moisture will force new growth from the base of the plants. A severe freeze between now and spring could kill the roses to the ground. On unpruned plants the new growth will take place in the top and this is usually the only part of the plant damaged should a late freeze occur, explains the county agent. Griffin suggests delaying the rose pruning job until early March. And he adds, don't prune climbing roses until after the first spring flush of flowers.

With increasing emphasis on leg fashion Rheba Boyles, Extension clothing specialist at Texas A. and M. University, gives these guide lines.

With the appropriate hose, legs can be made to look more shapely, thinner, longer or shorter.

Several types of stockings, such as the "wet look," shiny and rounded, tend to de-emphasize the leg size. The eye sees the area the light strikes, the areas to either side of the shine fade in importance, says the specialist.

Vertical stripes and very small designs, generally in medium to dark colors tend to slim the leg.

Iridescent colors or lace hose change color from light to dark. The eye sees the light area, not the sides and the leg looks slimmer.

Thin legs look more shapely or heavier in white stockings, opaque hose, fishnets, geometrics and pastel or bright colors, but the wearer should blend these in with their costume.

Textured hose, Miss Boles says, are best if worn with a chunky heeled, rounded or squared shoe.

If you are going to wear the new styles, you must present the total look. The stockings are all good if they are worn properly, she stressed.

The Wilson School Board approved a Kindergarten Program and elected three teachers among other things at their regular board meeting held on Monday night, February 26. The Kindergarten Program will be for the children living in the school district who have a language barrier or who come from an economically deprived family. The school will begin on April 22 and continue through May 17. According to the census that has just been completed, there should be between 15 and 20 in the program. This program will be financed by funds from the Title I Program. The school district will receive \$14,858 from Title I Funds this year. \$1,029.00 will be used for the

Kindergarten Program. Most of this will be used for desks and equipment.

The board re-elected Mr. Bobby Lee as Agriculture teacher. Mr. Mickey Rundell as coach and teacher, and Mr. Jack Jones as Band Director for another year.

School Superintendent, Glen Mitchell, gave a report on what is being done on a self evaluation that is underway in the schools. He stated that school will be dismissed at 2:30 on the following days for this study: March 13 and 27, April 17 and 24, and May 1 and 15. Much of this time will be used to update the school curriculum guides.

Absentee voting in the school board election will be from March 13 through April 2. The school board election will be on Saturday, April 6. Three members are to be elected in this election. Deadline for filing is March 6. Anyone desiring to have their name placed on the ballot is asked to contact Mrs. Covey in the tax office in downtown Wilson.

The board approved an amendment to the budget to cover additional insurance.

All my personnel were sleeping in base at our duty stations when the initial attack came. 14 persons died in my room and some 40 others were treated for serious wounds before being sent to the hospital. My room was converted to a first aid shelter after the attack. My belongings were moved to another room in another building in the BOQ complex before I returned to see the aftermath. Write Love, Max. P. S. Thanks for the Christmas card. It was here on my arrival.

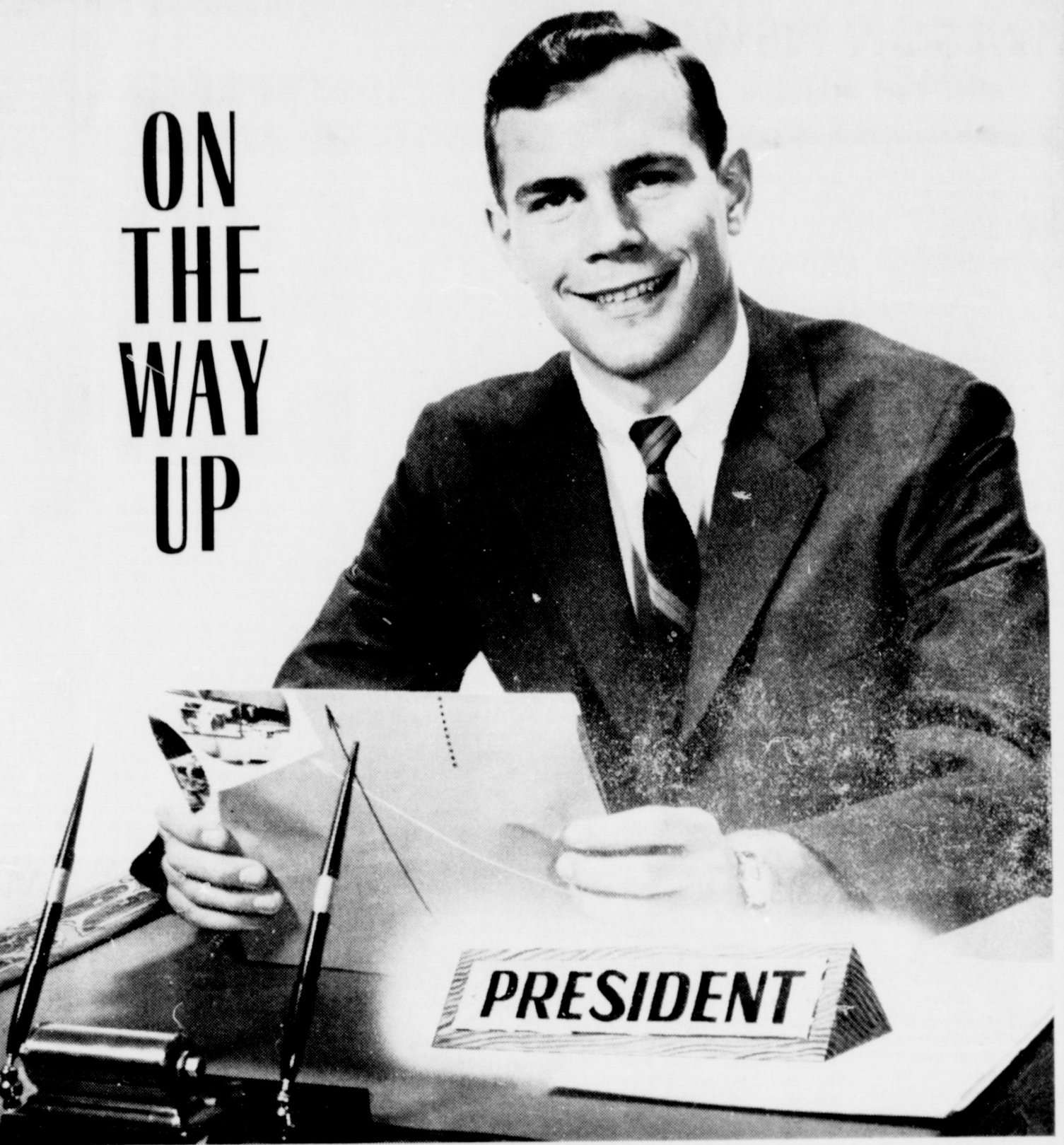

It's simple, as I understand it. All you do is stack your garbage outside your house and if the Mayor won't pick it up the Governor
