Results of an area-wide soil moisture survey conducted last fall by officials at the South Plains Research and Extension Center are now available to farmers as a guide in determining the amount and timing of preplant irrigation.

Oliver H. Newton, agricultural meteorologist, spearheaded the survey to obtain an estimate of subsurface moisture two to six feet beon preplant irrigations was provided by James S. Newman, assistant superintendent and coordinator of irrigation research. The area covered in the survey includes Bailey, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Hockley, Crochran, Lubbock, Terry. Lynn Crosby and Dawson Counties.

"The maps enable each farmer to locate the approximate position of his farm and determine within reasonable limits the amount of deep soil moisture that has been carried over from the previous season," explains Newton.

Complete results of the survey can be obtained at the Lubbock Center. The Lynn County office will be mailing out copies of the survey.
