This is due to the increase in foreign grain production, less of ours being needed.

Contrast this with a few meat items for the same petrod. There were exported during this eight month period 148,624,607 pourds of fresh meat as against 61,059. 441 pounds: bacon 383,445,770 pounds as against 160,295,260 pounds: and hams 179,517,844 pounds as against 94,747,883 pounds. These are fair samples.

Northwest Texas and eastern New Mexico are especially adapted by climate and soil for the proddction of meat. 




