> Capt. W. C. Day has received and granted a request from the New York World for a Texas flag which it has proposed to float from the dome of the Pulitzer Building in New York on special state holidays celebrated in Texas, the flag to be floated side by side with the American flag. In writing for the flag the New York World says that Texas is one of only a few states in the Union that boasts a flag.

In a statement given out by Secretary of State Townsend it is shown that during the administration of Governor Bampbell 3,833 new corporations have been chartered and 246 permits taken out by foreign corporations doing business in the state. This is estimated to cover an investment of about \$100,000,000.

Lhe railroad commission has issued an order requiring all railroads in the state to make monthly reports of earnings, eperating expenses, passenger and freight traffic, etc. This rule is not a nomial one but it appears that some of the lines have been slow in complying and the commission makes it understood that these reports shall be made.
