INCOME TAX IN A NUTSHELL

WHO? Single persons who had net income of \$1,000 or more or whose gross income was \$5,000 or more, and by married couples living together, whose aggregate net income was \$2,500 or more, or whose aggregate gross income was 5,000 or more. The exemptions are \$1,000 for single persons and \$2,500 for married persons living together, plus a \$400 credit for each development. A person may have a gross income of \$5,000 and, by reason of deductions for business expense, bad debts, losses, etc., a net income of less than \$1,000. A single person may have an exemption of \$2,500 as the head of a family. Nevertheless, returns are required in both instances.

WHEN? The filing period is from January 1 to March 15, 1925.

WHERE? Collector of internal revenue for the district in which the person lives or has his principal place of business.

HOW? Instructions on Form 10, 40A and Form 1040; also the law and regulations.

WHAT? Two per cent normal tax on the first \$4,000.00 of net income in excess of the personal exemptions and credits. Four per cent normal tax on the next \$4,000. Six per cent normal tax on the balance of net income in excess of \$10,000.

YOUR INCOME TAX No. 11

Where by reason of illness or absence form home additional time for filing an income tax return is required, the taxpayer should address to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, Washington, D. C., a request for an extension. Collectors of internal revenue are not, as under preceding acts permitted to grant such extensions. The request must be made before the return is due—on or before March 15, 1925, if made on the calendar year basis—and must contain a full recital for the causes of the delay.

An extension of time for filing the return does not extend the time of payment of tax unless so specified in the extension. As a condition of granting an extension, the commissioner may require the submission of the tax, and the payment of at least one fourth of the estimated amount.

YOUR INCOME TAX No. 12

Under the revenue act of 1924, thousands of persons are required to file returns of income although the incomes are not taxable. The act provides that returns shall be filed by

every single person whose net income for 1924 was \$1,000 or more or whose gross income was \$5,000 or more, and by married couples living together, whose aggregate net income was \$2,500 or more, or whose aggregate gross income was 5,000 or more. The exemptions are \$1,000 for single persons and \$2,500 for married persons living together, plus a \$400 credit for each development. A person may have a gross income of \$5,000 and, by reason of deductions for business expense, bad debts, losses, etc., a net income of less than \$1,000. A single person may have an exemption of \$2,500 as the head of a family. Nevertheless, returns are required in both instances.

Heavy penalties are provided by the act for failure to file a return and pay at least one-fourth of the amount of tax due within the time prescribed on or before March 15, 1925.

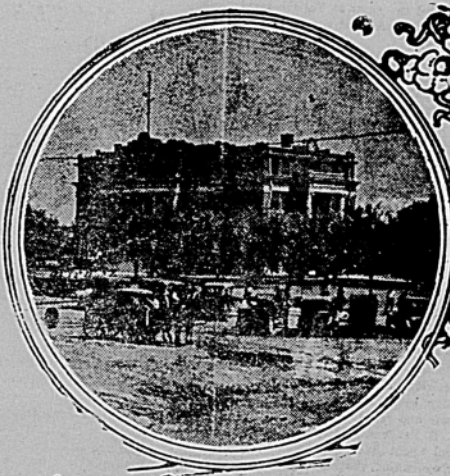
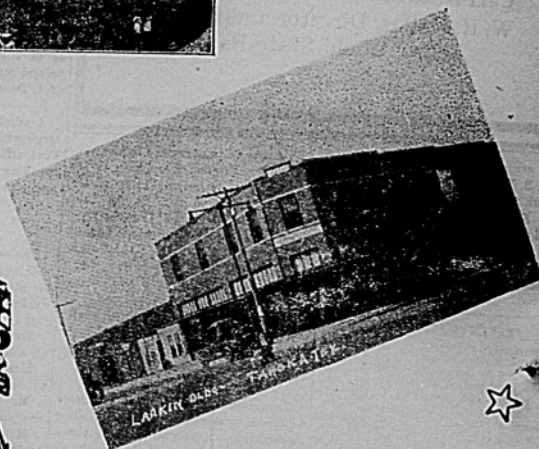
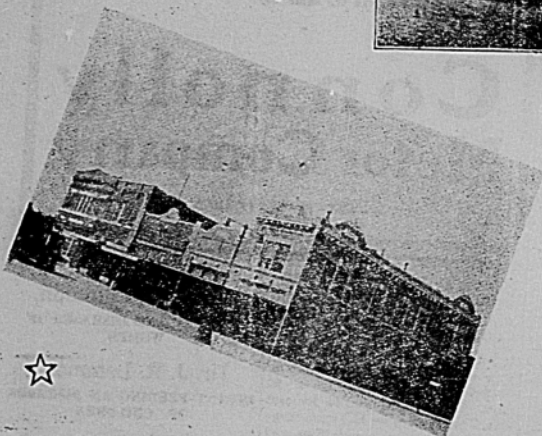
Graphic Story of the Growth of Tahoka



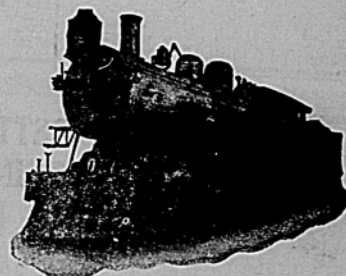

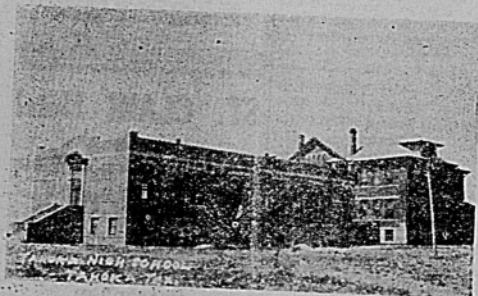

Perfume's Many Uses Throughout the Ages

Perfume, which we define as a sweet fragrance, was one of the most useful and interesting of ancient commodities. It was used for innumerable things, but mostly for religious and medicinal purposes.

The queen of Sheba is said to have given to King Solomon an abundance of spices and wood of which perfume was made. These were reported as being of very high value.

In the ruins of Pompeii were found large, costly bottles of perfume. Oriental ladies also used great quantities of costly perfume to preserve their personal charm. When the knights came home from the crusades, they brought their sweethearts expensive bottles of perfume from the East.

During the reign of Charles II the "wooly monarch," hair powder was introduced and continued to be fashionable for over 200 years.

Perfume was so popular during the reign of Louis XV that a different perfume was used each day in certain households.

Alcoholic perfumes were first introduced during the Fourteenth century when Elizabeth, queen of Hungary, invented the celebrated Hungarian water, with which she is said to have retained her beauty until she was past seventy years of age.

Perfumes were often used for other than their sweet, fragrant odor. Spicy perfumes were used by the ancient Hebrews for fumigating their beds and embalming dead bodies. People were executed on piles of burning aromatic wood. In India perfumes were used in the form of incense. They were offered as sacrifices in their temples and upon their altars. It was the custom for priests to color their faces with oilment of saffron.

The use of perfume for medicinal purposes was very widely practiced. Rose water formed the basis for many remedies, while during plagues perfume was used extensively as a preventive.

The savage and barbarous nations, as well as the civilized and refined, used perfume extravagantly. African chiefs anointed their bodies with it—perhaps as a sunburn protection.

Oldest Known Pen

Among the recent discoveries at Kish is a great treasure in the shape of the oldest known pen. Professor Langdon, the director of the Weld-Blundell and Field museum archeological expedition, who was delighted at finding this bone stylus for writing cuneiform, says that many scholars had vainly tried to reconstruct the instrument. This stylus is a triumph of simplicity. It is a bone, six inches long, with a triangular cross section and parel ends. After a little practice Professor Langdon was able to make cuneiform inscriptions on clay with fair rapidity. Professor Langdon considers that the mound 20 miles southeast of Nippur may be identified as the site of the city of Isin. Isin was the capital of a dynasty which ruled over a great part of Babylonia after that of Ur from about 2280 B. C. to about 2050 B. C.

Service Without Blame

Manuel Astorga Y. Soperinas, chief of the claims department of the United Railways of Havana, recently completed 30 years of service with the company without being absent a single day. As a reward, three months' leave with pay was granted him, and he and his wife have gone to England to place their son in school. Senior Astorga, a Cuban, started in March, 1894, as a clerk when fourteen years old. He will be pensioned when he becomes fifty years of age.

O'DONNELL NEWS

(From the O'Donnell Index)

Work on the Harrison and Williams gin was started this week. A splendid well of water was obtained at a depth of eighty feet and as soon as the material is assembled, the building will be pushed to completion.

H. H. Williams, who has charge of the installation of the gin, and will also be its manager, states that the plant will be modern in every respect. It will be equipped with a battery of 580 saws of the Centinive type and the power will be furnished by steam, made by a mixed fuel of coal, oil and burrs.

The company expects to have the gin completed and tried out before the cotton season opens up next fall. This gin will give O'Donnell its sixth gin.

Mrs. A. W. Thompson passed away last Saturday morning at 9:30 o'clock and was buried at the O'Donnell Cemetery Sunday afternoon.

No death to occur in recent years shocked the community as did that of Mrs. Thompson, her friends being numbered by her acquaintances. She had complained of the muscles in her neck being sore the first of the week, but continued with her duties and on Wednesday morning went to Dr. Thompson's office to assist him and shortly after her arrival collapsed. She was immediately taken home where she soon lost consciousness which she never regained. Specialists were summoned from Lubbock and a skilled nurse secured and everything that medical skill could do was of no avail. It was thought that a hemorrhage of the brain was the cause of her death.

The funeral procession was one of the largest ever seen in O'Donnell and the floral offerings evidenced the popularity of the deceased. Rev. W. C. Hart preached a touching sermon at the grave.

W. R. Sanderson has been here too long for the dry weather to interfere with his plans. The dryer it gets the harder he works to be ready for the rains when they come. This week he let a contract for the construction of a brick and tile building to be erected on the corner of Doak and Eighth Streets and work will start at once. The building will have a frontage of 52 feet and 110 feet on Eighth street and when completed will have five rooms and a filling station on the corner. One store room fronting Doak street will be 24x80 and has been leased to a large dry goods concern. Morris Sanderson will occupy the corner with a filling station and two of the rooms on eighth street with automobile accessories and Joe Sikes and W. E. Guye have leased the other room fronting eighth street for a grocery and dry goods store.

The walls will be constructed so as to permit of another story to be added when a demand is created for it. Thus O'Donnell grows.

Frost and Bailey have started the construction of a brick and tile building on their lot on 8th street, west of the Warren building. The building will be occupied by A. Alter, the baker. Alter plans to resume business as soon as the building is completed.

Fourteen thousand and forty four bales have been weighed in the O'Donnell yards to date, which sets a new high record. The gins are running only on Saturdays and it is thought that the end of this month will see the last bale ginned.

This wonderful production of cotton was made during one of the driest summers the country has experienced in many years, there being practically no rain during the growing season, but there was moisture in the ground to begin with, and coupled with twice the acreage to be planted plant grew and continued to fruit until killed by frost.

This crop is about double the number of bales ginned last year, and with twice the acreage to be planted this year, it is a safe guess that we will have 28,000 bales to our credit when this crop is ginned, with the proper amount of rainfall equally distributed, 50,000 bales would be a conservative estimate.

Come to the O'Donnell country and see trich growing cotton.
